Why is that? Have the social media networks eliminated the need and desire to get together? Are we so busy with life that we don't have the time to get together? It's a tough question, and one we all need to address.

EAA Headquarters has said for many years that we're all about three things: Flying, Fellowship, and Food. The belief is that if we offer these three things, borrowing from The Field of Dreams: "People will come Ray. People will come."

But will they? One problem I believe all organizations have after having been out of the spotlight for a while, is that no one outside of a small circle knows about them. That's a marketing problem. We have to make them aware that we exist AND that there is some benefit to them being a part of our organization.

In the current days of social media, making people aware of your cause or organization seems pretty simple. Mike and Sara proved it with our recent Young Eagles events. A small Facebook ad drew tons of interest, so we know we can get the word out when we need to.

So that begs the question: Who are we and what do we do? What is our "30 second elevator speech" that describes who and what EAA

Chapter 33 is all about? That can mean what are we now as well as who and what we want to be in the future; a compelling reason for others to want to participate in our organization.

I sat in on several EAA Chapter Forums at Airventure 2018, trying to gain insight into how we could become a better chapter. I also signed up for an upcoming Chapter Leadership Academy to continue my education.

So who are we and what do we do now? Clearly Young Eagles is a big part of who we are. Our special aircraft visits have been tremendously successful (B-17 & B -29 visits). Also, nearly all of our chapter members participate in Airventure in one form or another. In the past we have gathered there together, and we could again thanks to a rule change on the grounds. Another recent addition thanks to Justin Cook, is Eagle Flights, or as I like to call them: Old Eagles. We've tried Fly-Outs with limited success, but that pretty well caps off what we've been doing.

We have talked for many years about having a chapter "home". The trouble with that has been two-fold: #1) Money and #2) Where? I've talked to chapters that solved

the money problem by setting up a 501c3 and acquired donations. By the way, EAA HQ has a lawyer on staff who can help do this VERY inexpensively. Going forward, we definitely should consider setting up a 501c3 for the chapter. Number 2 is more complicated, because we are geographically diverse chapter and not just located at one airport. We cover roughly Belle Plaine to Monticello and Vinton to Washington, including CID, IOW and all parts between, so any discussion of where to have a home would be less desirable for anyone whose home field wasn't where the chapter's home was.

- What inspired you to learn to fly?
- How did you learn to fly?
- What adventures has flying brought you?
- If you have built an aircraft, tell us about the process.
- If you haven't built an aircraft, do you want to? What would it be? What's stopping you?
- What aviation-related activities do you want to learn about?
- Who have you introduced to aviation and what have they done with that introduction?
- We have lots of Young Eagle pilots. Tell us about your YE adventures.
- Tell us about your Airventure activities, volunteering, photo albums, flights to and from, etc.
- Any other stories you'd like to share?

Ok, I'll start: Inspiration. I grew up on a farm outside Waverly, Iowa. Our farm bordered three sides of Io-



wa's only Air Force base. Bet vou didn't know Iowa had an Air Force base did you? Well, it did. 788th Radar Squadron had about 200 service members and several high powered radar systems. You can find out more www.radomes.org. They have an online museum for all the cold war radar sites. I consider that ONE of my inspirations for flight. Not

that they had aircraft or a runway (they didn't), but they had regular flybys of some really hot, and supersonic, jets. I really loved the sonic booms of the 1960s.

My other inspiration for flight, probably like many others, was the space program. Watching launches was easy in the Mercury, Gemini, Apollo days, because there were only three networks, no cable or satellite TV, and they all switched to cover NASA's activities, so the nation watched.

I was fascinated by how high-tech The funny thing is NASA was. how self-limiting you can be when you're five years old and watching astronauts. While many kids desperately wanted to be an astronaut, I had already concluded that there were only SEVEN astronauts in the whole country, but there were HUNDREDS of engineers (hey, I was only five. I didn't know there were orders of magnitude more engineers than that!) I decided that I could be one of those engineers and be able to do cool NASA stuff too.

Who knew that years later, I would



become one of those engineer-type people and spend a career doing cool "engineer-stuff". So, as a geeky teenager, I earned a ham radio license and started playing with radios and computers, before computers were cool (I had an RCA COSMAC microprocessor when I was 16 and my graduation present was a Heathkit transceiver.).

Part of that ham radio inspiration was due to my dad's connection to a TV repairman in the 1950s. Dad earned a ham license and was briefly active in the early 1960s when I was young. I didn't remember much, but I knew there was cool electronics in the attic that as a teen I dragged out and hooked up, learning much of my early knowledge from 1950s ham radio magazines.

It wasn't until I was a late teenager that I learned that regular people could fly airplanes. I took a ground school class at age 16 from the town baker, who flew and was an instructor. That sealed my future as a pilot.
