

<u>Previous Months Minutes:</u> Meeting opened by new club President, Austin Colby with previous meeting minutes presented and read.

Treasurers Report: Presented synopsis as follows:

Miscellaneous: Guest speaker FAA representative Jim Logie aircraft exhaust systems

Guest speaker for the evening was FAA representative Jim Logie regarding aircraft exhaust systems. He gave his FAA background and journey. His presentation highlights included:

- Carbon monoxide poisoning is a big issue for pilots. Detectors presented from simple to complex.

- Muffler damage and poor pilot preflights cause great issues in the air; better to find issues on ground than in the air

- Many accidents significantly related to poor pilot preflight management & carbon monoxide poisoning

- Heat exchanger leaks carbon monoxide directly into cockpit from muffler damage

- Mufflers can be repaired when damaged by using multiple concepts; i.e. defuser prickles (spikes on internal baffling) keeping muffler from collapsing. Repairs should be done using a certified FAA welder.

- Signs of a leak may show up as discoloration of exterior; i.e. turbocharged engines using V-band clamps that have failed (weld breaking)... use safety wire to keep clamp in place.

- Carbon monoxide detector types include passive / active / portable

Conclusion:

- Knowledge is key to maintenance of exhaust system
- Have appropriate service information
- Inspect Closely
- When in doubt, get a second opinion, the owner / pilot is relying on you
- Remember: Danger of fire and/or carbon monoxide if not maintained can kill

Engine Temps Gone Wild? | Qualifies for FAA WINGS and AMT credit

Last month's webinar by Mike Busch, A&P/IA, discussed the importance of using digital engine monitor data in troubleshooting powerplant issues. But there are times when engine monitors lie and provide bogus information, and it's very important to distinguish such anomalous readings from true engine problems. In this webinar, Mike describes an incident involving a Cessna 182 whose sophisticated engine monitor started reporting pretty scary CHTs and EGTs, and how this was identified as an indication error that was easily cured by the aircraft owner himself. 25 Years Ago Today – March 4, 2000 Thanks to Jay Kanagy

The annual Chapter 36 Awards Banquet was held on Saturday, March 4, 2000, in the Antrim House Restaurant, Greencastle, Pennsylvania. President Don Wilson welcomed the group. He then led the group in the Pledge of. Allegiance. Pastor Nancy Green gave the invocation. Everyone enjoyed the delicious food.

Present: Don Myers, Carolyn Motz, airport manager. Carolyn thanked everyone for the invitation. She always enjoys being with us. Her husband is a very patient man, especially in the winter months. USAir makes six round trips to Pittsburgh each week day. On May 7, they will go to an all Saab fleet and have a Saab maintenance base on the field in the old Landis Hangar. The new planes will hold from 19 to 31 passengers. They are working on getting a service to Baltimore – BWI. There are 4 national airports within a 100 mile radius of Hagerstown. They are renovating taxiway Alpha. A new rotary snowplow blower will be coming in September. By consensus of the members, The Awards Banquet will be held at the same place and the same time next year – the first Saturday in March.

The Hale Andrews Award is twenty years old and is the premium award. Hale is now spending most of his time in Florida. This year's winner is the voice of the Potomac Fly-Ins. He keeps things going, and spends two days in the sun – Danny Duckwall.

The Chapter 36 Award. This is also determined by a vote of the membership. This winner is also no stranger to us. Known as chef par excellence and today's Birthday Boy – Dick Carbaugh.

The 'Door Prize'. Chuck was last year's winner. This 'prize' was started 18 years ago by Ed Layton donating the door. In January, 1996, the area was hit by a big snow storm and the rising Potomac flooded the airport. The water rose to the top of the Hangars. It was too windy to fly out and many lost their airplanes. Some took the insurance money and bought other airplanes, but one decided to build himself a GlaStar. It is now in final assembly – the builder – Jack Sorenen.

Don Myers presented awards to Bethany Golden, Ruthann Golden, Michael Hohman, Bobbie McBee, Bob Scott, Joan Scott and Joanna Cornell for helping with the Young Eagles Program. The members flew 525 Young Eagles last year.

Wooden model helicopters to build were won by Jack Myers and Norma Jean Hollman; aviation post cards were won by Kayla Myers and Robert Green; The clock was won by Carl Llewellyn and the door prize – a gift certificate for the Antrim House Restaurant – was won David Dodd.

The President then introduced our speaker for the evening, Kurtis Meyers. Kurtis expressed his pleasure to be here. He covered the history of Fairchild from 1945 until Fairchild left Hagerstown. The chief engineer for Fairchild was Armand Thiebold. The C-82 had clam shell doors made for the dropping of cargo. It could pull 2 gliders; carry 42 paratroopers or 42 stretchers. Two hundred and twenty "Flying Boxcars" were built, with the last delivered in 1948. The C-123 was a major cargo supplier. By 1955, many were flying in many parts of the world. At peak production, over 10,000 employees were working at Fairchild. Fairchild also built F-27 turbo prop, the Goose missile, the Porter STOL, subcontracted for Boeing, and delivered 713 A-10's. These were just a few of the many airplanes designed built by Fairchild. In the late 1980's, the plant in Hagerstown was idle and then closed.

Earl Witt died February 14, 2000 at the Manor Care Home in Chambersburg. Our sincere sympathy to his widow, and his two daughters.
