

We have had 3 members involved in AEDC the most important Scientific Testing Center in the world, a top Astronaut, an Air Force General, and Three War Experienced Bomber and Fighter Pilots. Now add to our list one of the most experienced and productive FAA Administrators, Larry Williams. So, when I got out of the way for Larry to mount the Left Seat, it was NO, NO, you need training, get in the Left Seat! So, here I am sitting in an airplane I never had flown before, with an FAA Squadron Commander in the back seat watching every move. So we got to the end of the runway to warm up and Larry asked the most stupidest question I had ever heard, "Dave, I bet you have flown only old aircraft"? So, I started to tell Larry my history of old aircraft. Larry said "Ah they all did not have to have shoulder harnesses did they" and then pointed to the shoulder harness tucked away over the door. So I fumbled around and got the shoulder harness on before takeoff. The weather was low ceilings and marginal to fly and I was in and out of scud most of the mission without a clearance. But we're on a mission! So, I fumbled around with the ELT finder and doing all kinds of turns to locate the squawking ELT. It finally led me to a small airport I didn't know about and declared that the ELT was there. So there was a voice from the back seat "Ah I figured it was there all the time." At an other time, I and the other pilot being the PIC had another mission in down town Nashville and found the ELT in the back of a pickup truck. So with two kills and Larry leaving as Squadron Commander, I decided to leave CAP
