Potluck Theme: "Takeoff and Landings"



Oshkosh came and went in a blink of an eye. Before going east, I always do my instrument proficiency check knowing full well, somewhere there's IMC lurking. Polished up Lil top and bottom.

Oscar arrived from Northern Ireland a couple days before and we decided to venture in on Friday, spend the night at Adams County field with Jerry Reuterskiold, John's brother from Wisconsin. Oscar and I have stayed there before. Adams is just about 50 miles west of OSH, a great place for fuel at \$4.96 and the hospitality can't be beat. Good food and catching up. The next morning, we ventured over to OSH. On the first approach to Fisk, we missed Fisk Avenue, and had to go back to Green lake, but a pretty easy approach either way. Very nice ride in. Oscar basically hand flew the plane from departure right up until landing which I blew by with my eyes out the window and not on the airspeed indicator. We seem to land a bit slower down near sea level on a 3000 foot long field. You can always go around, which is what we did.

Oscar and I happened over to KidVenture on Sunday, and met with the old Head of KidVenture Dan Makala. We explained that we wanted to help build radios. The guy that set up building radios, Levi, just happened to be sitting with Dan looking for help. We turned around and were hired on the spot. Building radios with 6 year olds is a bit of a drag, but when the kids get a bit older, it's pretty fun. We did that for ½ days and toured the show for the rest.

For me anymore, I guess, it's just walking along and having someone holler out your name from nowhere. With all those people there, it happens more times than not that someone will recognize you or you'll see an old friend from the past. It used to surprise me but it seems to happen often.

The Innovation Center was not what Oscar and I had seen in the past. I don't know if that was just cycles or covid or what. We saw a lot of new things but not as much as in the past. There was the UL engine that could have been a drop in for the XP390 with turbo charger. The weight was just a little light but it's surprising what Rotax, UL and similar smaller engines are doing moving forward.

I met with my old friend Rhonda Brewly from Barrett. We got to talking about an engine in her shop where they were putting on an Electroair electronic ignition conversion. Scott and I had just finished an Electroair system install on Larry Earnshaw's Cardinal. As usual a good system with really poor instructions, and a lot of paperwork. I enjoy sharing those stories with friends. I think that's what OSH has turned into, a chance to visit with old friends from around the country. Like Gino Gharadia. Gino had purchased an RV14 that had an engine identical to mine, Superior XP400. That engine was recalled twice before Superior bought it back and the original owner and I converted both our engines through Barrett to the XP390. Gino was the third owner and had called many times with EFII questions, not to mention what it was like owning an experimental aircraft. It took Gino two years to learn how to start it, not having any understanding of the fuel system. We finally got to meet and as usual instantly became great friends. I'm sure I'll be seeing him soon.

The night airshow was "pretty typical" but... The fire works display integrated with a drone show and an airplane flying in the middle of all that was truly unbelievable, and the best I'd ever seen...Ever.

On a sad note, Oscar and I were taking a final walk on Friday night when we saw a Diamond twin DA-42 overshoot the runway and stall in a skidding turn just over the runway taking out the landing gear and one of the engines. The really stupid part, there's always a really stupid part, there was literally no one else landing, the field was wide open and he could have easily...gone around.

Oscar and I packed up Saturday morning and cruised on down to Dayton Ohio to take in the Air Force Museum. There's nothing like flying over the Midwest at 1000 feet and enjoying the green lush countryside at 130 knots. It's a part of flying we can't enjoy here in Colorado with airfields in huge abundance welcoming a quick stop and cup of coffee.

By and large, The Air Force Museum is a must see place to go. You'll see things there you won't find anywhere else on the planet. A fantastic museum. We spent 2 days there, enjoying clean sheets and soft beds to boot. Everything you could have heard about Dayton is true, it's spectacular. I think it was the human side that also struck me regarding the military's involvement. It was very well presented. Being in the aircraft where Johnson took the office after the Kennedy assignation, very moving. I realize I could write a couple of books about this place. 100's of aircraft from the beginning to the spectacular, right through space travel, and if you care to stop off and learn the detail that is where a life time could be spent. I found the Berlin airlift and the wall of the Holocaust to be especially moving. But writings about every aspect of what you were looking for were everywhere. There's no entrance fee and the dossiers were fantastic. You just gotta go.

We left Dayton with a 700 foot ceiling, climbed up into clear blue sky and turned SW to go around a mother of a THD Storm. The Wx from ADS-B may not be perfect but for my flying it will keep those storms at bay.

Beautiful stop in IOLA KS. With gas at \$4.96 and great service. Oh, the fuel at Adams County was \$4.96. Pretty crazy.

Oscar and Scott both got colds and no telling what else. I remember getting in the plane in Dayton and praying their illness wouldn't hit 'til I got home.

That's exactly what happened. I got home and I've been crashed ever since. Summer colds are the worst. And yes, later test proved the worst.

For those of you at the meeting last month, I took the advice of AOPA and removed my aircraft from the published list that goes out to vendors. So if you look me up Flight Aware or ADS-B watch, in about a month I should not show up. I'm tired of every person on the planet following me around. Not fellow pilots mind you, the guy in his back yard wanting to report me cause I'm flying "50 feet " above his house. I'll leave that to the FAA.

Just a quick note on soaring. Took a short 4 hour jaunt in the mountains last month. Like anything else, the more you practice, the better you get. Made a lousy approach, with an ok landing. That wasn't good enough so I went back a couple of days later and took 1EF up for a couple of pattern tows to sharpen those pattern skills. There's always something to learn. I'd hoped to take Oscar up soaring, but with all the meds I've taken for this cold, about the only seat I want to be in is on the couch!

Road Trips in the Works - Chuck Kubin

One of the coolest aspects of doing the coolest thing you can do, flying, is going to cool places and doing cool stuff.

Just call me Captain Roadtrip. If flying in is an option, I'll check into it and provide details. Here's some ideas I'm working on:

*Visit to Wings Over the Rockies — I have an "in" as a docent, so I'll try to get us a more detailed and longer tour than usual, plus a "behind the curtain" look at the restorations area. Hoping for some discussion about acquisitions and the actual work to meet museum vs. airworthy standards. Recent highlights: the second stage of a ULA rocket, the "Baby BOOM" 2/3 mockup of the next-generation supersonic transport, and a 1926 Eaglerock. A long shot, but since Harrison Ford is a huge backer, maybe we could do a Facebook interview with him from the museum theater. And Lowry Beer Garden and an ice cream stand in a rocket is right next door.

*Visit BOOM — One of about 158 aerospace companies associated with KAPA, this is the company developing aircraft capable of traveling over land without blowing out your picture windows as we will hear a thump instead of a sonic BOOM. Planes are built in Alabama, so we'll be talking to developers about concepts and production.

*Visit the towers at KAPA and/or KBJC — Over years I did both, and back then they toured small handfuls of visitors or a still relatively small group divided into shifts.

*Flight for Life — All the details are pending what we can get, but the concept is to see the birds up close and talk to the pilots, planners and responders.

*National Museum of WWII Aviation/Westpac Restoration — Smallish, intimate museum has 28 FLYING aircraft on display and 10 more in restoration, including B-25 "In the Mood," the only flying P-47, Dauntless dive bomber, one of six remaining F7-F Tigercats, P-38... Westpac, right next door, gets you right into the thick of the work. Located on the northern tip of KCOS.

*Pueblo Weisbrod Aircraft Museum — WOW! Where to start! Nationally famous, dedicated to the B-24, but it doesn't have a B-24 (12 B-17s and -24s are rumored to be buried near Pueblo). It does have a small museum, two huge hangars and a big outdoors display with the B-29 "Peaches," a B-47, B-17, A-26, C-45, MiG 15 and -17, F-80, T-33, F-80, F-104, F-86, and even the Sikorsky Seabat 'copter that fished Alan Shepherd and Friendship 7 out of the drink in 1961. Located on KPUB.

*Denver Air Route Traffic Control Center (ZDV), Longmont. See what it takes to coordinate a region's worth of air traffic.

*Oshkosh, Neb.— sweet roll/donut humanitarian rescue mission. Repeating a favorite.

*Space Command satellite operations — My aviation merit badge wingman was recently promoted from satellite driver to satellite driver supervisor at a Space Command detachment at Peterson AFB. He briefly mentioned a control room visit once, so I'll look into it. No, you don't get to see the classified stuff...even if you could tell what it is.

*USAF Academy — Visitor center is free and the famous chapel (NOT built from spare airplane parts, as rumored) is open daily. The trip can continue into CS to get either the best barbecue or German food in Colorado. Or maybe one of three distilleries or several breweries.

*Back to FlyteCo — In the wake of our 5-star rated 2023 banquet, several members are interested in going back as a group for some social time.





TONIGHT'S SPEAKERS – Brett Treadway and Jim Louis from Freedom Avionics

Jim asked trivia questions! Who was the first pilot to break the speed of sound? Chuck Yeager, in 1947, in the Bell X-1. In September 1908, the Wright Brothers demonstrated a new plane, flown by Orville. What famous future aircraft manufacturer witnessed the flight? A young Donald Douglas, who went on to create Douglas Aircraft Company, which later merged with McDonnell Aircraft to form McDonnell Douglas Corporation.

Brett got his PPL in 1987 and bought a C-172 immediately. He came to the Denver area to get his A&P at what is now Spartan. He also got a 182, and flew anything he could. He spent 3 years as a missionary in Brazil, and navigated IFR with a GPS295 handheld in 2001 on the way to Nicaragua. He started Legacy, then sold it and bought Freedom Avionics at the original owners' request so they could retire. It was a tough transition, but the company picked up after a couple years. He sold Freedom in 2021, but the new owners couldn't make a go of it so Brett and his wife bought it back. He partnered with Jim Louis in 2022. (Jim brought plates tonight, as well as his dad, really good with avionics and a mechanic.) Jim bought a PA28-180 which his dad fixed up. General aviation is a small community - there are about 150,000 GA planes in the US - compare that with city traffic!

Jim asked who's going to OSH this year, and who's been (almost everyone!) Jim is a member of Bonanzas2OSH (B2OSH). He first flew from California to OSH with his dad, as well as a friend in another plane. He was antsy about arrival due to his colorblindness and figured the easiest way to land was with a wingman. B2OSH lands 3 planes abreast (on both north/south runways and the parallel east taxiway) with 1/2 mile between the trios - up to 15 planes on the runways at a time! Jim's dad suggested a trailer to display avionics for Freedom; Jim obtained an Empennage (C35 Bonanza) fuselage, added rudimentary wings and a glass cockpit <u>for road use</u>!

Jim told us about Freedom Avionics' August 9th Open House - see the Calendar on page 3 for details. Jim came to Colorado in 2018. He and Brett are opening up a second shop at Front Range.

ADS-B Questions: Ken Scott asked if military aircraft show up in ADS-B. Only if flying cross country; otherwise they're silent. General aviation go on UAT (1090 frequency) if their avionics allow, but there's no anonymous mode. Law enforcement is another issue - they worked with the FAA to remain anonymous from the bad guys. Freedom took a call from a guy claiming to need

anonymous mode to avoid harassment from his ex-wife's brother. Beyonce had bad guys on Flight Aware tracking her departure so they could rob her house.

ADS-B was first tested in Alaska. The federal government went to Garmin to build, and plane owners were sold units at half price to install - this was successful, so the FAA mandated ADS-B use, and made use of the system free. There are no blank spots now in the US, but that took from 2010 to 2022! Jim asked if anyone had had a control tower claim they couldn't hear your ADS-B - you have to have a transponder with a Mode C pressure altitude encoder; need to be within 150 feet. If GPS isn't working (there are blind spots east of Front Range), it can take time to get it back. Your system must be set to 1echo7 - GPS location within 3 meters. Planes identified in hexadecimal and octal versions of your N-number. There are ground stations to cover blank spots and shadowing, which makes navigating traffic almost bulletproof.

Stan Specht asked about ADS-B in Canada - their ground station system is vestigial; planes have diversity with antennas top and bottom. Mexico is implementing ADS-B; don't know if they'll use diversity or not. Europe was first to implement ADS-B, but there's nothing in Africa.

Someone asked about "seeing himself" - what causes that? Jim said installation.

uAvionix has an LED beacon with a 1090 blade antenna for wing mounting - but you can't see the light to tell it's on! Then they made a tail install! They need an indicator on the panel. Need to update transponder to Aperio or Garmin. Freedom has taken out a lot of transponders.

Sarah Winkler asked if anonymous mode is allowed at OSH - per the NOTAM, transponders should be on, with the exception of mass arrivals - ADS-B should only be on for the lead and final planes. If you're flying to OSH, be prepared for anything to happen!

Herrill Davenport has a uAvionix unit - his info shows airplanes next to him as being 1000' lower than he is. It worked well for the first year, now it's off. Jim gave Herrill a business card and asked him to contact Freedom to take a look. The problem is in the ADS-B <u>IN</u> box.

If flying in formation, only 1 plane with their ADS-B system on; otherwise the tower hears a steady beep-beep of two planes too close.

Jim wished us safe journeys to OSH; he's going as far as LaCrosse. He asked if anyone had gone to Depot Avionics lately - its owner passed away recently in a 182 crash.

Lynn Briggs is getting a panel version uAvionix system - is it okay, is there an affordable alternative? The experimental G5 is cost-conscious, and works with a Garmin autopilot.

After the program, the meeting opened at 7:49 by Andre' Smith.

- Using 30R/12L for night pattern operations


