# Coming in April -

From past Chapter 43 VP Ayden Edgar:

The Aviation Club at Colorado State University in Fort Collins is hosting a Pancake Fly-in on the 26th of April at Christman Airfield, CO55, in Fort Collins.

CSU has ownership of this private airstrip to the north west of campus. Previously serving as the Larimer County airport in the WWI era, later relieved from service by the Fort Collins Regional Airport, and then by FNL, Christman Airfield sits at 5,160 feet with one paved runway, 16-34. This runway is surprisingly long at 4,000 feet, and 60 feet wide.

Christman has FAA Identifier CO55, but that is not listed on the sectional, so find it on the sectional at 40° 36'N 105° 9'W. For purposes of GPS or Google Maps, 40.591379, -105.143871

The fly-in will be April 26th from 7:00 am till 12:00 pm at Christman Airfield (CO55). We will have food available for purchase, is what I am told. We also are asking that any pilot planning to fly-in fill out an RSVP form at <a href="https://forms.office.com/r/vLw20CEWqS">https://forms.office.com/r/vLw20CEWqS</a>. This will help us gauge how much food to be prepared to serve, and make sure we won't overwhelm our small non-towered airport.

What a great way to get to land on a private airstrip!

### Cliff's Notes


Heading off to Hawaii in a couple of days. February was a lot of work on 23SG, the designation for the glider for which I'm ship manager. She got a gel coat sanding, gel coat holes filled, rubbed down with rubbing compound followed by a wax job. With a 49.5 ft wing span accounting for 42:1 glide ratio...that's a lot of wax and wear. Looking forward to my first ride. She's a good little ship. But, we're all about flying powered flight.

Many of my trips to Salida are about as easy as going down to pick a loaf of bread, but last week was a little different. Colorado was stuck in a low pressure due to a cold front sitting over Kansas. You remember those mornings when visibility was right there at 1/8 mile. Well, it looked like things were clearing out, so I tentatively scheduled a Friday morning, er late morning, er early well around 2:00 departure, as we'd had snow the night before.

Overcast was moving out of the mountains slooooowly. I normally don't use flight following for this particular trip, but after clearing BJC air space and climbing just under the overcast, I checked in hoping to climb up through a hole however there was that class B airspace. I was talking to approach and found the tops to be workable so I found a hole and jumped up on top.

That's always a great feeling, as long as you have a way out. Salida was clear when I started out. I decided the best course was down to the Springs and up the valley by Fremont Airport. It was wide open there. However, I was still under the class B. West looked great on top, while not my first choice, and the controller would not give me clearance until I told him I'd turn west, so I headed to the west side of Pikes Peak. My original plan was to simply drop in the hole over Salida but it had gone broken to 14K which is where I was sitting at the time. I turned South and finally SE to drop in the valley up from Fremont. I always had Fremont in sight, knowing I had a clear out. I dropped into the valley under the overcast, and by the time I reached Salida, it had gone clear... Figures. I enjoy thinking about the moves I'm going to take, in case of. And while I'm not of fan of VFR on top especially in the mountains, today there were enough breaks that if that spinny thing up front were to guit, I'd be able to clearly

see which rock I'd like to hit first, 'Nuff said, it was a fun ride down 'cause you didn't just point the nose, you had to think about the safest way down. For those thinking IFR. I for one didn't want to go to 16K with the temps. Those clouds did not look appealing to fly through. The trip home was a straight shot with the normal 70 degree 15G20 crosswind Erie affords us in the winter...Great fun flying and spending time with friends.



As most of you know, I prefer the direct route in flying and business. Our last Chapter 43 meeting showed me that everyone wants the organization to return to the status we had a short time ago. During the meeting, I went around the room and asked all our members what they wanted in the chapter, and what improvements we should make.

But before I started, I asked a member I'd never met before to come up and write your suggestions on a board, so that we could review those later. For those of you who have never met Josiah Harmon he WAS a CFI at Rocky Mountain Flight school, working his way up the ladder in an aviation career. I say WAS because, as of yesterday, Josiah is now a CFII passing the written, oral, and practical test standards.

Next time you see Josiah, please congratulate him on his aviation accomplishments.

Anyway, we went around the room collecting ideas and before we had our break, I asked a committee to be formed to decide a course of action to help bring Chapter 43 back to life. Josiah volunteered to head this committee, and we were off. We had about 44 members present at the meeting and I think most had something to add to the issues at hand.

Last Saturday, Josiah, Andy McRae, Scott Serani, a consultant whom I'd never met, and myself attended a meeting of the committee online or in person at BJC.

I will not speak for the entire committee and while there was general consensus, I believe the underlying problem that Chapter 43 has today is a lack of "strong" leadership and very poor internal communications. I can not fault the folks who have stepped up after John passed away, but as members of an organization, it is involvement that makes the chapter successful, and if we want this chapter to survive, we need someone who will bring fresh ideas and strong leadership qualities to lead our chapter, not next year, but today.

The other piece is communications. We should not have to rush things for a vacationing member to get to internet access to send out a chapter wide newsletter announcement. Nor should that person be saddled with sending out a chapter wide blast for anyone who wants to go for a ride or needs help with a tire change. In our quick moving society, that looks to me like the stone age. I know we can do much better than that. In our group we spoke about several "easy" solutions to immediately improve communications, chapter wide.

You can call this a "call to arms", but it's time as chapter members we step up to helping to improve this chapter. From the responses of our last meeting it was obvious that no one in the room really wanted the chapter to fail.



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

Myles and Liz Ogea with Silas (14) and Jim (8). They also have a daughter who's 12. Myles is a certified pilot with low hours - he heard about us at an event at Warren AFB and is friends with Rich Treat.

#### **CHAPTER 43 ISSUES - Cliff Goldstein**

Cliff noted that Chapter 43 has LOTS of active subgroups - Builders Club, IMC, VMC, and Young Eagles, but the chapter's core is aging (and shrinking). What are the activities the members present want to see?

Suggestions:

- Pete Watkins would like classes on flying and more project presentations.
- Jackie Kudron wants reinstatement of Adult Eagle Flights (suspended during the Superior kerfuffle Editor), more Young Eagle
   Ground School volunteers, and a Buddy Flight signup.
- John Evens asked for more project visits.
- Robert (visitor from above) would like general aircraft show & tells
- Tobin wants more flyouts.
- Bill Mitchell wanted more experimental project presentations and visits.
- Adam we need a group for kids like Young Aviators. Jeff Jones noted that after COVID, getting the group back together was hard.
- Jesse (visitor from above) noted that he came tonight because Pete Watkins saw him in the terminal and invited he to join us.
- Paul Gauthier seconded Jackie's call for Buddy Flights.
- Kirk Brennan wants to see more interaction with local flying organizations.
- Andy McRae we need more support for non-current pilots.
- Cliff Goldstein noted his experience with the Boulder chapter of the Soaring Society of America (see Cliff's Notes from February 2025 Editor). We need a way for ANY member to immediately contact the membership. (Boulder SSA has a Google channel to do this, as Cliff noted in the same Cliff's Notes.)
- Stan Specht more STEM class/function involvement and recruitment.
- Dan Hensley wants more field trips, and Cliff G. noted past trips to COS.
- Jen Hensley wants more interactive meetings.
- (Secretary didn't catch the name) and his wife Linda are here because his 14-year-old daughter is a 4-time Young Eagle, but the time she came to a Chapter meeting, the program was ADS-B, a little too technical.
- Roxie wants more project tours/presentations.
- Jackie sees a need for youth and family group events.
- John Juul wants more discussion between pilots (sounds like a VMC/IMC recruit? Editor) But not everyone at the meetings is a pilot or has an interest in stuff like, well, ADS-B.
- Robert found the EAA through a BSA Aviation Explorer Post sponsored by an EAA Chapter, and noted that his group's tent pole activity was Air Venture. Stan and Chuck talked about the BSA (now SA Editor) Aviation Merit Badge. Robert said he's been involved in aviation for 20 years, and loves being around folks who also look up when aircraft fly over.
- Paul Gauthier reminded us it's not a pilot's license, it's a certificate.
- Amber would like to see the chapter get involved with schools.
- Frank Jackson would like to see more members involved with building helping or asking for help Need better ways to communicate!
- Sarah we need better communication and active participation telling personal stories for youth.
- Ken Scott wants to hear the Safety talks that's Sarah. Cliff G. suggested a newsletter Safety Corner.
- Phyllis Scott enjoys our programs, not limited to experimental building, and would like more trip reports. Cliff suggested newsletter input for this as well.
- Robert loves the newsletter format but prefers to get the content from Instagram or other social media. Val Gregory asked if he'd volunteer to fill the vacant Social Media Coordinator role.

- Larry Earnshaw noted that when he first got his Pilot's certificate, his CFI said "Now you can learn to fly." And he has!
- Chuck Kubin noted that he'd provided 3 good speakers in 2024, but the flyout suggestions only got one response. PLEASE provide feedback!
- Cliff Goldstein said we need a way to get the word out.
- Michael Savino joined because he wanted to build and wanted help/advice, but he had to seek it out. Other chapters are more involved. He visited the Greeley chapter in his RV-14 last Saturday morning 1/2 the attendees were 30 or under, most in their 20s. Saturday morning is better for 15-25 year olds.
- Steve Beach would like more community events, like the airport FOD cleanup.
- Val Gregory would like better, more immediate communication.
- Lynn Briggs referenced Boulder's Saturday morning project building group (they have a heated hangar) we need a hangar home!
- Dave Shenk wants more flyouts!
- Josiah (who up until now had been listening and writing on a flipchart) noted stuff that sticks out the need for What's App or similar communication; STEM outreach and Young Aviators. We need to focus on one, implement a solution, then move on to the next.

During the break, Cliff Goldstein formed a committee with Josiah as Chairman, including Cliff Hasenbalg, Robert Beuligmann, and Andy McRae.

**PROGRAM** - After the break, Michael Savino gave a talk about the test program for his RV-14. Its first flight was in October, and testing is now complete. Please forgive the Secretary who had a hard time keeping up!

- Initial Flight Pretests FUEL.
  - Fuel Flow tests were required for the DAR buyoff. Michael's plane has EFT.
  - ADD first engine run
  - First taxi test
  - First flight preparation

Paul Gauthier asked about the DAR - designated aviation representative (representing the FAA).

Condition inspection - an inspection by folks with experience with the build process and with the plane model (see the Tech Counselors listed on page 13 - Editor). Michael had transition training for 6 hours, with 30 landings and emergency training. The additional pilot program was VERY IMPORTANT - Cliff Goldstein was Michael's. First Flight - EFIS provides data recorded by the ground crew including max MP (manifold pressure). Michael's test flights were from Erie which is under Class B air space so instead of 3-4K AGL, flights were limited to 1.5K. First flight had some temperature issues, once the engine was broken in those resolved. Michael used 19 of the EAA test cards (reference <a href="https://www.eaa.org/eaa/about-eaa/eaa-media-room/eaa-news-releases/flight-test-manual-v2">https://www.eaa.org/eaa/about-eaa/eaa-media-room/eaa-news-releases/flight-test-manual-v2</a>). Michael shared the video of his first flight.

Questions - Engine? IO390IXP with 209HP, averaging 7 1/2 gal/hr.

Josiah asked about Insurance - Michael had a builder's policy before he moved it to the airport, then upgraded to a flying policy with an extra rider for his additional pilot, Cliff.

Build time? 2019 to 2024, 3K - 3.5K hours. General work schedule was around 2 hours on weekdays and 6-8 hours on weekend days.

Kirk Brennan - any squawks? A fair number! A heavy wing, caught by the autopilot. Squawks with the Garmin, but no issues with instrumentation. The fuel pump bus manager required calibration to switch pumps. The plane's not "built" yet, Michael thinks it will take about a year to shake out and resolve issues. Probably needs a larger oil cooler - 15 fin vs. 14 fin.

Ben Wexler - favorite part of the build? All of it!

Brian Hartley - what's your experience? Michael is a computer guy, but in his 30's started doing auto maintenance. He learned aircraft building skills on the way and had Vans on speed dial! Would he build another? If he were younger...

Stan Specht noted that builders should fix everything they mess up during build - you don't need extra doubts in first flight. Lynn Briggs was surprised the heavy wing wasn't noticed except by the autopilot, and Cliff noted that the test program was done before wheel pants and other items were installed so the flaps were fixed after those were done.

Roxie invited the membership to the 120th and Lamar Applebees after the meeting, noting that we have to be out of the meeting room by 8:50, so feel free to stay and chat a bit!
