
Scholarship

OSH is around the corner. Feels like the summer is just flying by. Bobbi and I are down in Salida. Had a wonderful flight with Negative Tango. Wow, I didn't think that was possible.

Getting for an exciting 2 weeks of flying coming up soon. For those of you who remember Oscar Hill (remember Oscar with the flaming red hair?), he's about to enroll at Oxford in their Physics program.

I think this will be the last time for Oscar coming to the States for many years to come. Oscar and I have enjoyed OSH 4 or 5 times now. I've said this many times before, but to see OSH through the eyes of a 13, 14, 15, 17 year old changes your whole perspective on what you see and how you look at it. Oscar has enriched my life as well as many others in our chapter. We're planning on going to Wright Patt AF Museum and then to OSH. More on this next month.

Bill Kendall and Michael Savino are getting super close to having an RV-10 and RV-14 inspected. It's great to see some of these long term projects coming to fruition. Nothing like first flights. Chris, Bill Kendall's son, flew in Scott Serani's 10 to help familiarize himself in the 10. It's fun watching a good pilot transition, but most importantly to get some experience before his first flight. Michael is still several months away from getting his 14 up.

I took PROTE training at KAPA last month. If you've not done this, it teaches you how to recognize YOUR symptoms of hypoxia so when flying high you know well before you get into trouble. The training was put on by the local FSDO and was extremely professional and worthwhile. As we live next to some high altitude flying, I consider an excellent way of helping you with the confidence to fly with and without supplemental oxygen. We all have our own tolerance levels to a decrease in saturation, here's a safe way to learn yours.

Not to bore you all too much with the soaring, but I'm finally getting the confidence and improving my comfort zone. Took a short tow over the Flat Irons and released in lift but were unable to continue to climb. Spent some time over the Flat Irons learning the capabilities as we slowly sank closer to the Boulder airport, until we found what you'd call a parking lot thermal. Rode that from 7500 to 8700 feet, turned west to a favorite thermal spot, caught a boomer of a thermal/convergence and rode that to 17,800 feet. With a series of ups and downs flying a convergence line flew up to Carter Reservoir, down to Golden over to Gold Lake, north of Nederland, and finally back to Boulder, landing just before the WX overdeveloped...4 hours later. I'll just say...WOW. Not a lot for an experienced Soaring pilot, but for me, we just ran out of time with so much lift. WOW.

Took on a project to add Electronic Ignition to a Cessna Cardinal, under the direction of an A&P. I'm here to tell you, our modern experimentals are a piece of cake to work on. The project was to replace an obsolete dual Bendix mag that no one would service anymore, making the Cardinal unairworthy. ElectroAir makes an STC'd duel ignition which required adding two separate timing methods, two ignition coil modules, two ECUs, and a separate battery in lieu of only one alternator. I roped Scott Serani into this project. Thank you Scott. The airplane will be fantastic when this is done, but the process that was to take about 2 days to install will probably be more like 6 or 8 full time days. The good news is the performance will be incredible at this altitude by comparison.

Lots of great flying last month, lots of great flying with OSH. See you all there.

It Could If...

Ground reconnaissance (my grandson and I) spotted this gem outside a theater the week the new Mad Max movie debuted. It is PART (Plymouth Air Radial Truck), a '39 Plymouth single cab crossbred with a 757 cu. in. Jacobs radial. It is all aircraft and badass, from the airplane controls, harnesses and gauges, down to the shotgun shell switches and easy access weapons.

The owner at Colorado Auto and Parts in Englewood (makes sense) stripped the original engine off an old Cessna in the days when the air boneyard was still there, and after he blew it up Phillips 66 provided the new one.

It was not in the movie (way too nice for that) and it doesn't fly, but the owners say if it had wings, it would.

Road Trips in the Works - Chuck Kubin

One of the coolest aspects of doing the coolest thing you can do, flying, is going to cool places and doing cool stuff.

Just call me Captain Roadtrip. If flying in is an option, I'll check into it and provide details. Here's some ideas I'm working on:

*Visit to Wings Over the Rockies — I have an "in" as a docent, so I'll try to get us a more detailed and longer tour than usual, plus a "behind the curtain" look at the restorations area. Hoping for some discussion about acquisitions and the actual work to meet museum vs. airworthy standards. Recent highlights: the second stage of a ULA rocket, the "Baby BOOM" 2/3 mockup of the next-generation supersonic transport, and a 1926 Eaglerock. A long shot, but since Harrison Ford is a huge backer, maybe we could do a Facebook interview with him from the museum theater. And Lowry Beer Garden and an ice cream stand in a rocket is right next door.

*Visit BOOM — One of about 158 aerospace companies associated with KAPA, this is the company developing aircraft capable of traveling over land without blowing out your picture windows as we will hear a thump instead of a sonic BOOM. Planes are built in Alabama, so we'll be talking to developers about concepts and production.

*Visit the towers at KAPA and/or KBJC — Over years I did both, and back then they toured small handfuls of visitors or a still relatively small group divided into shifts.

*Flight for Life — All the details are pending what we can get, but the concept is to see the birds up close and talk to the pilots, planners and responders.

*National Museum of WWII Aviation/Westpac Restoration — Smallish, intimate museum has 28 FLYING aircraft on display and 10 more in restoration, including B-25 "In the Mood," the only flying P-47, Dauntless dive bomber, one of six remaining F7-F Tigercats, P-38... Westpac, right next door, gets you right into the thick of the work. Located on the northern tip of KCOS.

*Pueblo Weisbrod Aircraft Museum — WOW! Where to start! Nationally famous, dedicated to the B-24, but it doesn't have a B-24 (12 B-17s and -24s are rumored to be buried near Pueblo). It does have a small museum, two huge hangars and a big outdoors display with the B-29 "Peaches," a B-47, B-17, A-26, C-45, MiG 15 and -17, F-80, T-33, F-80, F-104, F-86, and even the Sikorsky Seabat 'copter that fished Alan Shepherd and Friendship 7 out of the drink in 1961. Located on KPUB.

*Denver Air Route Traffic Control Center (ZDV), Longmont. See what it takes to coordinate a region's worth of air traffic.

*Oshkosh, Neb.— sweet roll/donut humanitarian rescue mission. Repeating a favorite.

*Space Command satellite operations — My aviation merit badge wingman was recently promoted from satellite driver to satellite driver supervisor at a Space Command detachment at Peterson AFB. He briefly mentioned a control room visit once, so I'll look into it. No, you don't get to see the classified stuff...even if you could tell what it is.

*USAF Academy — Visitor center is free and the famous chapel (NOT built from spare airplane parts, as rumored) is open daily. The trip can continue into CS to get either the best barbecue or German food in Colorado. Or maybe one of three distilleries or several breweries.

*Back to FlyteCo — In the wake of our 5-star rated 2023 banquet, several members are interested in going back as a group for some social time.

So that should keep us busy for awhile. Hit me at dreamwoodck@yahoo.com with your ideas, and if you want to register high interest in any of what's here. I'll turn up the heat on what seems the most popular and from here I'll get with Jim and the VPs to target some dates.





Zakai flew with Young Eagles and started his training about a year ago. He has 53 hours logged and is also working on his A&P. Abby has logged 100 hours and is trying to schedule her check ride. She is flying with the Aspen Flying Club at Centennial. Jim Wood noted the recent donation to Chapter 43's scholarships by the Young Aviators of \$45K. Money is great, but what else can the chapter do? He introduced Captain Michael Charles, author of "Artful Flying", which he ranked up with "Stick and Rudder". Michael donated signed copies of his book to the scholarship awardees. Jim Wood is considering an Artful Flying-themed fly-out. Michael said he's been flying for a long time and has been a CFI for 50 years. He thinks human factors need more consideration in flying; it's a big contributor to incidents, according to the NTSB. This applies to all aircraft regardless of size and type.

Host John Stewart gave us bathroom locations, and suggested we tour his bar at the back of the hangar. It includes a lending library - only signed books need to be returned, others should be passed on.
