



#### MEETING DEDICATION – Isaac Babbitt

Isaac Babbit made the first brass cannon in the United States. In 1839 he produced the first babbit metal for bearings which was hard particles of copper and antimony in a soft matrix of tin. The tin wore down and left channels for the lubricant. (Today we use copper and aluminum.)

#### **OSHKOSH MEMORIAL WALL - MAS YOSHIDA**

Efforts are underway to memorialize Mas on the EAA Memorial Wall at Oshkosh. If you're at AirVenture 2019 on the last Sunday of the event, try to attend the memorial service that morning at the Wall.

#### TRIP REPORTS

No trip reports this month. John Redding reported that Stephanie Wells should have a report in March from her travels in Central America (John is flying down to join her next week).

#### **SCHOLARSHIP** – Eric Serani

Interviews were completed in January for the EAA Air Academy camp at Oshkosh and flying lesson scholarships. It was a great class of applicants. Aniya Perkins is the leading candidate for the camp scholarship, which is funded with Young Eagle credits. For flying lessons, there were four candidates in the final round, with 2 standouts. For the \$3K scholarship, Lindsey Beauregard, 22, a new college grad, grew up flying with her mom. Lindsey works at Specialty Flight Training. For the \$5K scholarship, Jay Davis (the young man who was partially paralyzed in a T-18 landing accident with Bill Mitchell) blew the committee away with his drive to get back into the cockpit and to inspire others. The scholarship will be used to get him through medical and equip his plane. Glenn Hetchler noted that there's a Truckee glider pilot with paralyzed legs. Scott Serani pointed out that the \$5K scholarship is named for Cleon Biter, and Jay was one of Cleon's students.

Eric asked for volunteers for the Scholarship Committee. Eric's business is demanding more of his attention, and a new chair is needed. He said that these scholarships change lives, and that he will coach the new chair.

#### PROJECT REPORTS

Wayne Gibson and his son Edward are working on a Zenith, specifically on the wing kit (received in December) in their COLD garage. Flaps and ailerons are done and the spars are started. Wayne thanks Scott Serani for assisting with the delivery of the 525 lb, 14' long wing kit, getting it into place with no lift.

Steve Paschke and his Venture 333 – custom radiator and relocated stroke (?). He also made a list of the remaining items – it's very long!

Cliff Goldstein – Erin Miller finished the build of his 200hp RV-8 and got through Phase 1 testing before moving to Oregon. Cliff is dealing with an engine recall on his RV-14 and asked for advice on P-mags.

Gary Gregory's Kitfox has been ready for first engine start since December, delayed by a tendon injury to his left hand. In the meantime, he showed off the seat cushions with tail art embroidered by Valerie Wait (see the ad section) and upholstered by an automotive upholsterer in Denver (ask Gary for a business card). He called several area upholstery shops - some had closed, and the rest were not willing to tackle an aircraft project.

Jeff Jones' fuselage is done, with help from Dale Serani on the cowling. Further work is delayed due to parts shortages at Lycoming for the engine ordered in August, so working on the wings.

#### **SAFETY REPORT** –Bill Mitchell

Bill reminded us that it's slush season, which can cause more issues than you can believe – one of which is freezing in wheel pants following takeoff. Glenn Hetchler noted that even without wheel pants, he had issues in Minnesota when the brake pucks froze to the rotor and sheared the brake pad rivets on one side.

#### YOUNG EAGLES - Cliff Hasenbalg

Young Eagles will be starting again in March! It's been 3 years since EAA started requiring Youth Protection Training, so adults involved with Young Eagles may need to renew their training. Cliff also had certificates for those volunteers who could not attend last month's banquet. There are 15 kids signed up so far for March and April. Go to the EAA Young Eagles Volunteer Resources webpage (https://www.eaa.org/eaa/youth/free-ye-flights/ye-volunteers) to take Youth Protection Training. (If you're not sure when your renewal is due, there's also a Training Lookup link, just make sure you're logged in to the website – Publisher.) Young Eagles volunteer emails will be coming soon, see Cliff to add or remove your name from the volunteer lists. Phil Brown hinted that a future Chapter outing (flying for lunch or pie?) after a Young Eagle event is a strong possibility.

#### YOUNG AVIATORS - Scott Serani

Young Aviators is getting exciting! B-25 is going to a full simulator configuration – the missions will be real for the pilot, co-pilot, nose and tail gunners, and the turret position. Fredy Tello (design and network) and his friend Kirk (equipment sourcing, and there's cookies for the first email to <a href="mailto:newsletter@eaa43.org">newsletter@eaa43.org</a> with Kirk's correct last name) are leading the charge; Jeff Jones is heading up the nose gunner/ bombardier team and Cliff Goldstein leads the turret team. Ground Control will handle takeoff and landings (so missions don't "crash" before they get started or completed!) Wayne Gibson heads the control station team. There will also be 2 video screens for spectators, to include Young Aviator and sponsor marketing. Scott Serani is looking for a marketing/fundraising volunteer to attract corporate sponsorship to help pay for the upgrade. At the last Young Aviator meeting, there were ~50 people working and bench

testing. Event invitations are coming in for the B-25, including Utah State University at the end of June (shakedown for AirVenture).

Scott also asked the membership to help find the Young Aviators a new home. Meetings have been held at Scott and Patrice McEwen's home at Erie, but they will be moving soon. An Erie location is preferred, and a high door hangar is needed for the B-25. Young Aviators currently numbers 35 kids with lots of chapter and parent involvement. #### CROSS-POLLINATING – VAL GREGORY – MOTORCYCLES AND THE INTERNET

Val made a short presentation of her life on two wheels, and how the birth of the Internet benefitted that activity.

#### TONIGHT'S PROGRAM - Brent Olsen

Bill Mitchell introduced Brent and talked about the 1995 NSI electric plane – Brent helped set it up so the plane didn't turn into a glider with engine failure.

Bio – Brent flies a RANS S-6ES. He has served in the USAF, is a radio operator, professional engineer and served in the Naval Air Reserve.

Brent has reviewed batteries – traditional Lithium Ion are the most dangerous, with the highest energy densities and the smallest size. LiFePO<sub>4</sub> (lithium iron phosphate) batteries are safer. Encapsulated and vented batteries are best for aircraft cabin installation. The EarthX ETX 900-UNT is an example. Brent is currently working on a two-battery system (2<sup>nd</sup> is for backup) with a weight less than that of an AGM (Absorbed glass mat) battery. The system needs a proper charger and regulator (rated for 13.2V vs. 12V). Issues with counterfeit batteries from China. The batteries need to be monitored for under/overcharge. These batteries are more expensive but have a longer shelf life and are much lighter. EarthX is the leading player in experimental aircraft batteries. The Battery Management System (BMS) also needs an over voltage protection device (OVPD). Brent is currently designing this for EarthX. Call Brent if you have questions!

LiFePO<sub>4</sub> batteries are better than traditional Lithium Ion batteries that contain cobalt (and "greener" too). Discussion of the Over Voltage Problem – anything over 16V for a sustained time can "smoke" the aircraft avionics. Discussion of Power Protection Systems. The B&C regulator is a crowbar device.

Bob Wilson asked about the 787 battery failure and fire – the source of the FAA specs now in force. John Evens has a B&C regulator and didn't notice any lag during bench testing.

EarthX is in Windsor, CO and its products are assembled and tested in the US.

Question on extreme cold – Lithium batteries don't perform as well as lead acid batteries – EarthX batteries are limited to -20F. There have been several instances of folks leaving the power on or forgetting to charge in the backcountry, need sensors to indicate what's happening and an automatic switch to the backup battery. Brent's system also has an audio alert. The unit is about the size of a deck of cards, plus connectors (panel mounting is 1" x 3"). Brent has the schematic for the dual system – solid state, lightweight. Power up to 8A available and is customizable. Contact www.Olsenteckllc.com or <a href="mailto:BrentO@olsentechllc.com">Brent is a dealer for Garmin, MGL, uAvionics and EarthX.</a>

Question about how to travel on commercial air with lithium tool batteries (don't!) But most tools have a UL rating, they're safe.

Cliff Goldstein said that Brent helped him with his RV systems and even wiring.
