New Business: The issue of the Safety Officer was discussed. Concerns about safe aircraft construction, maintenance, and piloting skills were relayed, and it was suggested that the job might be larger than initially thought. A motion was made to have a three person safety committee appointed by the Board of Directors for an initial trial period of one year. A motion was voted on and approved unanimously. EAA designee Brad Davenport was appointed as a focus for the committee.

Ken Lysek showed a thank you card addressed to the membership of Chapter 43 from Sherril Thompson. Sherril survives long time member of Chapter 43 Jim Thompson.

Gene's Corner: Gene was back with us this month. He reported that the Meyers 200D special is back in production. Also returning to production is the Aero Commander 114B. John Long has surpassed the 52,930 recorded flight hours record previously held by Max Conrad. Mr. Long has amassed a great percentage of these hours flying pipeline patrol. Steven Counts has a new non-fiction book out about his experiences barnstorming America in his open cockpit Stearman biplane. Expect the tax bill from the state shortly thereafter. Also have ready your N number registration, 3 view drawings, photos, etc of your aircraft, weight and balance, an authorized equipment list and systems checklist. Mr. Edwards stated that he generally types the eligibility statement and because he is also a notary, stamps it. Terry also types the application for air worthiness. The price for his services is approximately \$250 plus travel.

Presidents Corner: I was out of town last month and it sounds like I missed a great program. That should be my last business conflict for the year. This month's sheet metal techniques should be a very informative. I hope you will be able to attend.
