The missed opportunities always haunt later in life.

Everything from flying Young Eagles (the good) to having an engine quit on the way home from AirVenture (almost the ugly). My flying time has been split fairly evenly between Cherokees, a J-3 Cub and the Mooney that I am currently flying. REMEMBER WHEN

Ruston Field / Federal Heights Airport, Federal Heights, CO


The Ruston Airport was formed in 1944 by Harry Ruston. His idea for the airport was that some of the WW11 pilots would like to keep flying. It was one of the first private airports in Colorado. It was located SW of 100th. & Federal Blvd. (39.88N / 105.02W) It had one hanger for repairs and a second building for classrooms. (second building now gone / "Flight Deck Bar").

The airfield had 4 unpaved runways. The airport served as a training center for Regis College and Denver University. The airport closed in 1961 and it took Mr. Ruston three years to get out of debt. No trace remains of the runways, as the surrounding area has been heavily developed. The former hanger is still in use today as a Napa auto parts store. The Flight Deck bar was torn down in 2005.
