Kitchen Sink Sprayers, College Dorms, and Motorized Sofas - AirVenture Lodging Options

If you're heading to AirVenture this month, you probably already know where you'll be sleeping, but you may not have had the opportunity to explore all the options on offer. Camping on the AirVenture grounds, whether you're flying in or driving, is easy to arrange and pretty darned inexpensive.

The first question to ask is, are you driving or flying?

Driving - stay at Camp Scholler. You can make reservations online at the same time you purchase event tickets, noting that at least one person in your group MUST have an EAA membership. Reservations can only be made for the full week (from desired check-in through the last day of AirVenture) but you can get a refund for days not used when you check out, beyond a 3-day minimum. Cost is \$27 per day for basic camping or \$65 per day for sites with electricity and water. There is a special area set aside for folks who need 24 hour generator use; tent camping is not allowed there. Electricity/water and 24 hour generator sites are available on a first-come, first served basis, and must be reserved online prior to arrival. Basic camping sites can accommodate both tent and RV camping, and there's an RV dump station (with available water) near the campground South Gate. Generator use is allowed in the basic use areas (except as noted below) between 6:30 a.m. and 10:30 p.m. From 10:30 p.m. to 6:30 a.m. is quiet time in general, so if you're coming back late from the Fly-In Theater or other evening activities, be respectful to your neighbors and keep the volume low.

Camp Scholler is located south and west of the AirVenture grounds and east of I41. If you're coming from the south on I41, take exit 113, turn right on Highway N and then make an immediate left onto Poberezny Drive. Similarly, if you're coming from the west on Highway N, turn left on Poberezny after crossing I41. Drive north on Poberezny Drive and follow the signs to Camper Registration on Schuhart Lane, just north of the campground West Gate. Coming from the north on I41, take exit 116 and turn left on WI44, cross over I41 and turn right on Knapp Street, then right again on Poberezny heading south to Schuhart Lane. Follow the volunteer directions to check in at Camper Registration, then head into the camp to find a spot.



When you register, you'll receive a goody bag full of fun stuff including an Official Visitor and Camper's Guide that has guidelines for establishing a campsite. A campsite is defined as a 20' x 30' space adjacent to one of the camp roads and behind the fire lane (a line burned into the grass along both sides of the roads or indicated by signage). Bring at least 100' of twine or plastic tape along to stake out boundary lines for your site, contiguous with any adjacent sites that have already been staked out. Camping units (tents and RVs) in adjacent campsites need to be a minimum of 10' apart. Your camping unit and vehicle need to fit in that 20' x 30' space, along with any other equipment (bikes, motorcycles, pop-ups for shade, etc.) If your party has more than one vehicle, that second vehicle needs to be parked in the S-lot just inside and south of the West Gate, for \$10 a day or \$60 for the week (no refunds). It's a GOOD IDEA to peruse the guide before leaving home, online at http://eaavisitorcamp2017.epubxp.com/i/843360-2017.

Where to camp at Scholler - While bathhouses and shuttle bus stops are within easy walking distance from just about anywhere in Scholler and there are even more port-o-potties (which are maintained daily), take a look at the Camp Scholler map (https://www.eaa.org/~/media/images/airventure/maps/av17 campschollermap.pdf) and pick the area that suits. Note that areas on the map in yellow do not allow general camping, blue areas have water/electricity for RVs, the green area is for 24 hour generator use, and there's a tiny brown area where generator use is not allowed at all. A lot of trees have been planted in the general use areas for shade, and some are starting to get big enough to really do some good. Those shuttle buses run continuously to ferry you from your nearest stop to the south and west gates of the AirVenture grounds. There's also shuttles from the West Camp Store (between the West Gate and Camper Registration) to shopping at the outlet mall on the west side of I41 and the Target & Pick n' Save north of the AirVenture campus. Free Wi-Fi is available and the bathhouses have lots of exterior outlets to charge your technology (cell phone, tablets, etc.) and plug in your shaver or hair dryer.

The yellow security area on the map also houses a first aid station. If you have medication that requires cooler temperatures than the mid-90s that are possible during AirVenture, you can check them in with the staff there, as well as getting treatment for any minor injuries you might sustain during the week.

Fun facts about Camp Scholler - it's just amazing what folks bring in to get around AirVenture - vintage motorcycles, homemade contraptions, amazing paintjobs, you name it. If you're REALLY lucky, you may even see a semi-mythical motorized sofa rolling through camp! And the kitchen sink sprayers? Shower heads for the bathhouses - it's genius! Get wet, soap up, rinse off with minimal water waste and pinpoint accuracy. The bathhouse hot water is heated by the sun, with powered backups. The first year the bathhouses went full solar, it was cool and rainy the entire week. There was MUCH grumbling from the ladies' facilities, and as we all know, if Mama ain't happy, ain't NOBODY happy. Next year backup water heaters were in place. I mentioned the Fly-In Theater; aviation-themed movies and documentaries every night of AirVenture on an inflatable screen reminiscent of "Frank's 2000 Inch TV" (for fellow Weird Al fans). There's even free popcorn. The theater is adjacent to Camp Scholler just north of the Camp Store, bring your camp chairs or a blanket to sit on!

Flying - there are three popular options, two on-site, and one off-site. If your aircraft falls into a showplane category, you can camp with your plane in the Seaplane, Ultralight, Rotorcraft, Vintage, or Homebuilt areas. If not, general aircraft camping is available in the North 40 area around Runway 9. Make a cardboard sign with your desired camping area to show ground crew after landing and you'll be routed to a spot in that area on a first come, first served basis. All have access to bathhouses, free Wi-Fi, on-site transportation, food, and supplies. Flying in but not a camper? Lodging is available at the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh a few miles north of AirVenture, see



https://www.eaa.org/en/airventure/plan-your-eaa-airventure-trip/eaa-lodging for contact information. The dorms include laundry facilities, and shuttles to and from the dorms are available at the AirVenture Bus Park north of the main entrance to the grounds.
