• Additional info on sterile cockpit practices from Mike Gugeler:

"The Sterile Cockpit Rule (14CFR 121.542/135.100, "Flight Crewmember Duties") discussed last month doesn't apply to us Part 91 pilots (although it's a good practice) but it did bring up a trivia question. As far as I know, this is the only FAA regulation that gives an altitude without specifying MSL or AGL.

If it were MSL you have to climb a mile and a half above Miami before cracking a joke, but a thousand feet after a Telluride takeoff, "So, two dogs walk into a bar...".

If it were AGL you could start chatting at 16,000 out of Denver but based on your climb rate Westbound, you might have to stop, then start the gossip session over peaks and valleys.

Yeah, we all know the intent; get far away from the dirt before allowing distractions, but it is kinda loosey-goosey. Don't mention this to the FAA guys or they'll have a meltdown. Anybody else know of another MSL/AGL omission?"

Stan Specht dedicated the meeting to Don Smith, who passed away last month. Don worked for Fairchild Aircraft, was a big Fairchild fan who knew all the models, owned a hobby shop in Aurora, and was building an S-19 until health issues arose. He was active in the Young Eagles programs at Chapters 43 and 301. He was the long-time Chapter 43 Newsletter Calendar compiler. He suffered from a lung disease named after the Latin phrase for "we don't know what it is". Don passed away suddenly. Stan attended the family's open house and passed their thanks to the chapter.

APPROVAL OF MAY MINUTES (and cookie awards) – Val Gregory

Phil Brown earned cookies for finding Val's typos in the transcribed article from Bob Wilson as well as being the first to answer the quiz on sterile cockpit practices. Mike Gugeler told us that Sterile Cockpit is the only FAA rule that cites altitude without mention of AGL or MSL.

TRIP REPORTS

Shortly after takeoff, Paul Hahn had a coolant temperature alarm, smoke in the cabin, and a partial engine loss in his RV-10's Subaru engine. After identifying his situation and tail number to the BJC tower, they queried the number of souls aboard ③. He made a low speed emergency landing and taxied to the fire truck. The engine failure blew the rings off one cylinder. Paul praised the tower, first responders, and the Mile High Wing of the Commemorative Air Force, who offered hangar space at RMMA until repairs are made. Too low octane, too high pressure, too much spark advance, too lean a mixture. Mike Gugeler asked for a longer flight next time; Bill Mitchell quipped that it was plenty long enough for Paul! High ambient temperature and a heat-soaked engine were also contributors.

Stephanie Wells is back from a 5-month trip to Chile, Bolivia, Costa Rica, and El Salvador. She got back Friday, June 1 and flew her RV-6 down to Lake Meredith for a sea plane event. She flew to Spanish Forks on Sunday June 3 in a 182 – nice airport! Alamosa was fogged in but Kent Rominger field in Del Norte was clear, 10 miles north of Monte Vista. This trip was a LightHawk mission – conservation environmental flights for scientists, media, politicians. Phil Brown has also flown LightHawk missions.

Bill and Mary Mitchell got to hear a speech by retired commercial pilot Captain "Sully" Sullenberger at the Marriott.

PROJECT REPORTS

Cliff Goldstein reports that his RV-14 painting is complete! He recently flew it to Salida, and had it at BJC for the JAA Fly-In. Steve Paschke has cut out the windows on his Adventure 333 and hopes it will be flying this year. Phil Brown is sourcing seals from Aircraft Spruce to remedy oil leaking from his Pober Pixie. Jeff Jones is starting build on an RV-14A and promises to take less than 6 months to get it painted.

SAFETY REPORT – Stephanie Wells

Stephanie asked if we'd been discussing frayed rudder cables. She described a Citabria that ground looped at Longmont due to a rudder cable fraying inside its housing against a stanchion. Bill Mitchell has seen several frayed cables, usually in hard-to-see areas. He recently was tasked with moving a Glassair from Longmont to RMMA – a brake cable failure put him in the taxiway centerline, resulting in lots of paperwork for the FAA and NTSB. He said he wasn't knocking inspections – but things can still be missed.

Glenn Hetchler discussed damage from wind at Parkland Airpark in Erie – one neighbor lost his hangar door, another his garage door. The Erie METAR at 14:18 on June 8th forecast was "fair and breezy", but there was a 26 mph gust at 14:26 and at 14:38 the windspeed was 25 mph gusting to 63 mph. Glenn had taken a friend flying that day, but asked them to spend the night before so the flight could be in the morning.

Next event is Saturday June 16. There are new volunteers for the ground crew, and the event is short only one pilot (due to the Boulder 1940 Gala).

MILE HIGH EAA Chapter 43 June 9, 2018 (minutes continued)

Cross-Pollinating – Scott McEwen

Middle and high school BEST (Boosting engineering, science, technology) Robotics Overview. BEST was started by 2 Texas Instruments engineers in Texas and has proliferated nationwide since. Hubs host a 6-week program in the fall semester. At kickoff the game rules, playing field schematics, and kits are distributed to the teams. Practice Day is one week before Game Day. The hubs fundraise to pay for kit consumables – servos, electronics, etc. are returnable to the hub. The Game is based on a real-world theme – the theme for 2017 was Crossfire: Search and Rescue. The robots had to knock over Solo cup "fires" and rescue small manikins. Four teams compete in a series of 3-minute round robin matches. Three finalists go on to regional competitions. There are two competitions – the Game is required; the BEST award is optional and much more rigorous, including marketing and exhibition. The kits are identical; the robots are unique. Students are the sole participants and decision makers. Adults are advisors and coaches only.

TONIGHT'S PROGRAM

Phil and Bill fly to Bishop CA (Part One)

Phil Brown and Bill Mitchell are both CFIs. There's a common belief that CFIs know everything about flying; they don't. Bill loves flying in the mountains but isn't comfortable flying out in the flatlands. Phil is still wary of flying in the mountains. Why Bishop? Phil's dad used to travel there for work in the summer and took the family along. Phil and Bill will be flying a 1960 Piper PA-2 Comanche. Following are some of the tips from both pilots.

- Keep an eye on your variometer and rate of climb stay out of sinks and milk the lift areas.
- Check fingernail color for oxygen level or consider a pulse oximeter.
- Engine out try landing up slope, essentially stalling close to the surface.
- Never get to where you have nowhere to go, always have a way out.
- Read "Joy of Soaring" work lift and stay out of sinks.
- Your flight won't go as planned, that's okay.
- Fly the upwind side of sloped, where the wind is going up the hill.
- Fly close to terrain.
- Fly so a 45° turn will diverge a 180° turn takes too long.
- Lift on the hot (sunny) side of a ridge, especially if it's not overgrown.
- Fly airport to airport, overflying unless you need to land. Safer in case of issues.
- Look out the window.
- Military MOAs GPS dropouts should be NOTAM'd but might not be obvious.
- Bishop has gliders hard to see! Gliders may not have radios.
