NORM & DAVE'S EXCELLENT ADVENTURE - FLYING THE HUDSON RIVER CORRIDOR

Sooner or later, we all seem to develop a "Bucket List," a collection of things we want to do, "someday." Not to worry, I won't bore you with the full content of that list. But I will share with you one item on the list that just got checked off- flying the Hudson River Exclusion, the VFR corridor down the Hudson from mid-Westchester County, over the George Washington Bridge, along the Manhattan skyline and out over the Verrazano Narrows Bridge.

"major" sporting event is held, a five mile TFR (temporary flight restriction) is in effect from one hour before until two hours after the event, usually for an area five miles in radius from the event. Yankee Stadium is well within that range of the Hudson, so when the Yanks play a home game, no scenic flights are allowed transitioning the VFR corridor. Fortunately, the game on this date started at 7:05, and our plans were to be well clear long before 6:00.

My start of the day was a bad omen. I tripped over the cat, and spilled coffee. After letting her out, the cat refused to come back in before I left for the airport. Well, if I am out enjoying the spring weather, I suppose she can too! As a result of the above and a few other complicating factors, I arrived at Leroy Airport a bit later than planned. Dave was patiently waiting, with the bird pulled halfway out of the nest, doors open to allow cool fresh air in.

Preflight and prep for take-off. I think we had seven cameras to load aboard, although we "only" used three or four of them. Original discussions included an early take off, but thanks to a well done presentation by Jim Cavanaugh at EAA 46, we revised out planned take off to a bit later. Why? If we departed Leroy early, we would have been over the Hudson about 10 or 11 am. The sun would still be east of us, and the entire Manhattan skyline would be in shadow. Leaving just a bit later put the sun west of the buildings, and gave us great views, and great photo ops. Thanks Jim for some simple and VERY practical advice!

Wheels up about 10:15.

Leaving Leroy, we turned south east and headed for Sullivan County Airport for lunch and a few gallons of food for the airplane. (gasoline.) Leaving Sullivan County we again turned south and found our way to the Hudson a few miles north of the Tappan Zee Bridge. Although I lived less than 3 miles from the TZ Bridge for many years, this is the first time I saw it from ABOVE!

Our flight south past the George Washington Bridge, the Manhattan skyline, the Statue of Liberty, and finally the Verrazano Narrows Bridge (next page) was fascinating. I know Dave enjoyed it, but for me there was an additional thrill. NYC is where I was born and raised, and most of the areas I frequented as a kid are along the Hudson. In fact, on our return trip north through the corridor, we wrapped up the circuit by wagging our wings to two observers in the Irvington Town Park by the river, my mom and brother!

- 2. Build an aircraft from scratch, using plans.
- 3. Purchase or receive the donation of a kit aircraft.

Each of these presents different challenges, and need to be carefully evaluated. Each also will need commitment from the members. Commitment to help out will be the main concern, as it is only going to work as a team effort.

Once the aircraft is done, then what? Well, we could form a non-profit flying club. Those who want to join would likely have to be Chapter members. The aircraft would be sold, or donated to the club. It would be a way for Chapter 44 members to fly inexpensively, and we might be able to offer flying lessons to members.

These are some of the ideas we are exploring. We need your thoughts and opinions! Please share them with any board member or officer of the chapter.

We are also looking at our hangar project. We have begun planning work, and are getting ready to start a Capital Campaign, once the final decision to proceed is made. Our goal is to work within the aviation community, local business, and individuals to raise the funds necessary to build the hangar. The hangar would be the place we can use to further our mission and vision for the future: providing educational activities for youth and adults, and a place for members to do final assembly of homebuilt aircraft, and perhaps a place for an associated flying club to have its aircraft. Again all this is in the planning stages, consistent with the Mission and Vision that we put together over a year ago, and will allow us all to have fun, land be involved in aviation.

On a different note, I have been reflecting on different techniques for aircraft construction (I know, that's weird!). The one I am most familiar with is rag and tube. I have also done a lot of woodworking over the years, and so know something about wood construction. Metal aircraft are different vet, but I have done a little of that type of thing over the years, being involved with building satellites. I have fooled around a bit with composites as well. For me, the most satisfying thing is either rag and tube, or wood and fabric construction. There is something about cutting and welding tubing together to make an incredibly strong lightweight structure that is very satisfying. The same can be said for wood structures. Of course, being an engineer I have strange interests like this, but I suspect almost anyone would get a tremendous feeling of satisfaction from building something like an aircraft with these techniques.

The skills learned and the accomplishment give a great sense of doing something unique and special. Also, in a practical sense, building an aircraft is the least expensive way to get into the air. Today's technology provides ways to build a real aircraft for very little money - less than the price of a used car! Our chapter has a long history of doing this type of thing, and some of our early members did some pretty amazing things. Today we have members that have built sophisticated aircraft such as RV-7's or RV-8's, or most recently Dave Hurd's Glassair. These are machines that fly at very high speeds, and will get you from place to place rapidly. We also have members working on aircraft such as the Ultra Cub and the Kitfox, which fly low and slow.

I did have my son-in-law push me around in a wheel chair. I had my WWII hat on and many people thanked me for my service. I appreciated that.




