

I never met Larry but I feel like I know him because of all the truly wonderful things our members are saying about him. A member since 1984, Larry was a pillar of the chapter. He was a prior officer, and had a strong hand in <u>many</u> of the things which define our chapter today. It is with deep love and a respect for a life well lived that we share of the passing of Lawrence John Greeno, a cherished husband, father, grandfather, brother, family member, and friend, who entered eternal life on Wednesday, February 26th, 2025. Born in 1942 in Hamburg, New York, Larry and his twin brother, Gary, were the last of five children born to British immigrants Leonard and Lilian Greeno. As a teen, Larry earned his private pilot's license, launching a lifelong passion for flying. He served in the Air Force, during which time he met his beloved wife, Joan Ball. They married and moved to the Rochester area, where he graduated from Roberts Wesleyan University and then attended seminary shortly after in Oklahoma at Southern Nazarene.

Larry's legacy is one of faith, family, service, and passion. His journey was guided by his personal relationship with Jesus Christ, which was the foundation of all that he did. Larry's life was a reflection of his commitment to living out the teachings of Christ, and he inspired those around him with his unwavering faith and humility. He was known for his thoughtful counsel, compassionate spirit, and the gentle way in which he lived out his beliefs.

Professionally, Larry made a lasting impact on the lives of many. His work in ministry was a true calling, where he dedicated himself to serving others. After serving for a time at Heritage Village in Gerry, NY, he spent many years in pastoral roles in both Ann Arbor, MI and Williamsport, PA where he offered guidance, comfort, and leadership to those in his care. Later, Larry's talents and heart for service led him to work for the Free Methodist Foundation and then Roberts Wesleyan University, where he served as Vice President for Planned Giving. His professional accomplishments were not simply marked by titles, but by the genuine care he showed for others, making a difference that has continued to endure in the lives of students, faculty, and colleagues.

Beyond his work, Larry found great joy in his family. He was a devoted husband to his beautiful wife, Joan, with whom he shared over sixty years of love, marriage, and companionship. Their four children, Nathan, Julia, Peter, and Kristin, and their spouses and families, including thirteen grandchildren and ten great grandchildren, are a window into his world and brought him so much life. Family time looked different over the years but included special times like camping, bicycle rides, visiting airports, walks and games on the beach, handyman projects and tinkering at his work bench, Monopoly and card games, listening to Larry play the piano, and so much more. His legacy of love, wisdom, and devotion will live on in his family.

A passionate member of the Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA), Larry spent countless hours immersed in the world of aviation. Whether building model airplanes, attending airshows, building his RV-6A aircraft, or simply enjoying the freedom of the skies, Larry found a deep sense of peace and fulfillment in flight. His enthusiasm for aviation was contagious, and he was always eager to share his knowledge and excitement with others. Larry's love for flying was not just a hobby, but a lifelong passion that brought him joy and purpose.

Larry's family, friends, and all who knew him will forever remember his unwavering faith, his commitment to service, his love for his family, and his passion for aviation. He leaves a legacy of kindness and integrity, and his memory will continue to inspire all who were fortunate enough to know him.

Rest in peace, Pops. You are now flying in the arms of the One you love. Your legacy will live on forever in our hearts.

He built an RV-6A and kept it at LeRoy where I had the chance to go for a ride during the time I was still building the Glasair. I was impressed with the airplane and the quality of the workmanship he had put into it. It had a pretty neat paint job as well. I remember something about a checkered paint job on the rudder, and he had his name under the pilot's side window, and his lovely wife's name, Joan, on the starboard side. Larry had hosted a meeting at his home during the build process where we got to see the aspects of doing aluminum riveting. Larry had splurged for a pneumatic rivet squeezer, and after squeezing a number of rivets on the Glasair by hand, I realized the profound wisdom of his investment.


Larry served on the Board for several years, and selflessly stepped in as interim Treasurer following the tragic death of a beloved member, Mark Donovan, who we lost to a heart attack. At the time, we had just become a 501 (C)(3), and the CPA, who was donating his time and skill to help us take care of the annual IRS forms, wanted us to switch from Quicken, which is a pretty simple checkbook organizer, over to Quickbooks, which is a sophisticated business accounting system. I had agreed to serve as regular Treasure for the ensuing term, but Larry wanted no part in dealing with the learning curve necessary to become familiar with the new system for the few months until the new term started. Can't say that I blame him. I was familiar with the accounting principles involved and so ramped up really quickly and became "Old Money Bags" for the next 7-plus years. Every once in a while, I'd gently bust Larry's chops about "sticking me" with the job.

Larry was a real gentleman.

Sorry to hear about Larry. I came to the chapter a number of years before Larry did. I enjoyed his company over the years and we had a fun bond over Piper Colts. Larry had one for many years and really loved it. Of course I still had mine and we enjoyed our Colt stories together. We kind of had our own little private Colt Club. He was a great guy and an asset to the chapter. I have not spoken to him in several years and sorry I missed any chances to see him again. I wish his family well. My best to all the chapter members as well.

From member Elise Isler: I was looking for a picture of me in Larry's airplane. He took me for a ride after a Young Eagle Rally. Larry flew 30 Young Eagles before his health prevented him from flying. After that he became a ground crew volunteer for many years. He was a strong supporter of the program and promoting GA. (Editor's note: Larry took my wife, Ginny, for a ride in his airplane at a members summer gathering a few years ago. I believe it was her first time in a small GA airplane, and enjoyed it. I would have, too!)

Those who braved the weather this past Tuesday were treated to a (perhaps) once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to meet and be uplifted by TSgt Casey Bukowski, a WWII veteran and B-17 waist gunner who told the stories of the missions he flew in Europe, and ultimately his downing, capture, interrogation, imprisonment, liberation and repatriation to the U.S.. At over 100 years of age, Casey stood proudly for more than an hour and gave a remarkably human and humorous account of his experiences. He spoke repeatedly of his gratitude for the opportunity to be with us. One couldn't help but come away feeling grateful for the beauty and blessings of our own lives, thanks in large part to the service granted us by Casey and so many others. The Air Race Classic. Not quite the Bendix Air Races or in the Red Bull League, the Air Race Classic is the epicenter of women's air racing. Pilots range in age from 17 to 90+ years old. The Air Race Classic, Inc. is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization dedicated to: Encouraging and Educating current and future women pilots, increasing public awareness of general aviation, demonstrating women's roles in aviation and preserving and promoting the tradition of pioneering women in aviation. The women come from a wide variety of backgrounds including teachers, doctors, nurses, airline pilots, business owners, air traffic controllers and professional pilots. Race Teams, consisting of at least two women pilots, must fly under Visual Flight Rules during daylight hours only and are given four days to make flybys at each en-route timing point and then land at the terminus. The race route changes each year, approximately 2,400 statute miles in length with 8 or 9 timing points. Mary Mattocks (Willy) our illustrious President will regale us with her experiences and adventures having flown 4 air races in her beloved Piper Cherokee and now contemplating her 5th. (Upon reading this her husband has turned quite pale and taken to his bed as this is quite an expensive endeavor!)

2025 SCHOLARSHIP OFFERING Finger Lakes Chapter of the Ninety-Nines, Inc. International Organization of Women Pilots

Scholarship Application Deadline is March 21, 2025

Purpose

The 2025 Finger Lakes Chapter Scholarship will be awarded to an active female pilot or female student pilot residing in the Finger Lakes Region or Western New York consisting of Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauqua, Chemung, Erie, Genesee, Livingston, Monroe, Ontario, Orleans, Niagara, Schuyler, Seneca, Stuben, Wayne, Wyoming, and Yates Counties. The Scholarship can be used for primary or advanced training to advance her flight ambitions. Membership in the Ninety-Nines is not required at the time of application. However, membership in either the Finger Lakes or Western New York Chapter of the Ninety-Nines is required when the scholarship is awarded. Membership must be maintained at a minimum through May 2026.

Selection Process

Any female pilot or female student pilot living in the New York counties listed above is eligible to apply for the 2025 Scholarship. To apply, submit the completed scholarship application form, including all required documentation, a personal essay and two recommendation letters to the Scholarship Chair of the Finger Lakes Chapter no later than March 31, 2025.

The Scholarship committee, comprised of both Ninety-Nines and active members of the aviation community with no connection to the Ninety-Nines, will review the applications and determine the recipient. Applicant goals, expectations, and anticipated future impact on the aviation community will be the criteria used to determine the recipient. The Scholarship recipient will be notified by April 30, 2025.

Application Content

Applicant must make a statement of financial need for completion of her goal and demonstrate that she is committed to achieving it by having a plan in place to reach her goal. Applicant must discuss her goal, the steps left to achieve it (take the written, x hours solo, x hours cross-country etc.), the cost of training per hour where she flies, hours remaining to meet the goal, her current limiting financial obligations, her funding options, and her timeline to achieve it without a scholarship. This should be an essential part of the essay. Be clear and concise, especially about funding and budget plans.

Award

The 2025 Finger Lakes Chapter Scholarship is \$2,000 to be awarded to one applicant. Receipts for covered flight expenses must be dated between May 1, 2025, and April 30, 2026. Receipts of flight expenses paid or incurred must be submitted to the Finger Lakes Chapter Scholarship Chair, Wendy Zimmerman at wostrow@hotmail.com for payment approval. Allowed expenses include aircraft rental, flight instruction, flight instruction fuel expense, check ride expense for the DPE, and fee for a written exam. Submitted receipts must be accompanied by a copy of the logbook showing instruction given and signed off by the instructor, if applicable. Receipts must be signed by the student.

Personal Essay Requirements

Please attach an essay (not exceeding one page, one side only) and include the following elements:

- Tell us about yourself, your activities in aviation and participation, if any, in The Ninety-Nines.
- Tell us how you have financed your training and education so far. Make a statement of financial need for completion of this training. This should make up the bulk of your essay.
- Opportunities desired with rating sought and your future goals.
- Any other information that would be helpful to the Scholarship committee in making their decision.

Application Requirements

Please submit application packet as one file. Include:

- The signed and dated application form.
- Your personal essay signed and dated.
- Pilot Certificate and Medical Certificate if required for rating sought. Copy of the front and back of the certificates on one (1) page. (You must have at least a Student Pilot Certificate to apply.)
- Two signed and dated Letters of Recommendation: one from someone familiar with your flying experience, and the other a character reference (non-aviation). These letters may not be written by a family member and may not exceed one page, one side only.
- A copy of the results of your FAA Written Exam, if applicable.
- A copy of your last logbook page. Please note, one logbook page is both left and right pages (all columns) in the logbook.
