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EAA Announces Inaugural Learn to Fly Week – May 15 to 20

Aspiring aviators will have the opportunity to discover multiple pathways to becoming a pilot as EAA presents its inaugural Learn to Fly Week on May 15-20.

Beginning May 15th, expert flight instructors and representatives from various aviation organizations will present free, interactive webinars. These webinars will cover topics from starting flight training, saving time and money in flight training, preparing for the FAA written exam, to passing the checkride, and so much more. While the live showing of these presentations will be open to the public, the recordings will be archived for EAA members to view at their convenience.

Learn to Fly Week will conclude on Saturday, May 20, with Flying Start events hosted at chapters across the country. EAA's Flying Start program allows EAA chapters to welcome, encourage, and educate new aviation enthusiasts about the fun, freedom, and accessibility of personal aviation in their local area. Following a short presentation about learning to fly, attendees will be offered a free introductory Eagle Flight to experience the spirit of aviation firsthand.

"Becoming a pilot is a dream for many, but few know where to start their journey. Learn to Fly Week was created to help encourage aspiring pilots to take action and begin the pilot training process," said David Leiting, EAA Eagles Program Manager. "Our goal is to show attendees how accessible achieving their dream actually is." Leiting also added that inspiration from this event stemmed from packed forums at the Learn to Fly Center at EAA AirVenture Oshkosh

2022, as well as the success of other EAA virtual events like Homebuilders Week and Virtual Ultralight Days.

Combining the educational forums from the Learn to Fly Center and the connections and inspiration found at Flying Start events, EAA Learn to Fly Week is the latest effort in the ongoing effort to help aspiring pilots achieve their dream of flight.

OPEN HOUSE FLY-IN UPDATE by Bob Nelligan-Barrett

Thank you to all who signed up to volunteer for some activity at the Open House. There will be two more opportunities for the rest of you to sign up at the April and May Monthly Gatherings. **The theme for the Fly-In will be "Pathways Into Aviation"** where we showcase the programs and events we offer to help people get into aviation for the recreational and educational value it brings us.

As I announced at the last Chapter meeting, we will be trying some new things this year. One is to have our PA system in the Great Room moved outside to use it to listen to radio traffic on a scanner and a Top 100 List of Aviation Songs. If you have a personal Top 10 favorite songs about flying, send me the titles and performer. Let's see if we can develop our EAA 44 Top 100 List. Any genre is welcome, but the song must be about flying.

I would like to take some of the mystery out of flying for our visitors by having five Homebuilts and five Production planes on static display and to do a two-lap fly-by demonstrating a proper traffic pattern with appropriate radio calls. Myself or other volunteers will be acting as an Announcer with our PA explaining the activity. Throughout the day from 10 AM to 3 PM, one Homebuilt and one Production plane will be on static display in front of the SAC, with the owner/pilot to talk about his or her pride and joy. Then on the hour, they will demonstrate a pre-flight inspection, and one will take off demonstrating a proper lap of the traffic pattern with radio calls, into a fly-by of the crowd, into the second lap and a landing. During this second lap, the second airplane will take off and do the same thing. When they are done and parked back in their space, our visitors can ask questions. Then the next two planes on deck will move up to the SAC ramp and repeat the process. So I'm looking for 5 Homebuilts and 5 Production planes and their Pilots, for a two-hour time block, for this activity. Let me know if you'd be available. I know, its all weather dependent. Let's show the variety of GA planes we fly.

Someone asked at the last meeting if we will be offering rides. No, we won't. EAA policy prohibits the co-mingling of Young Eagle Flights, Eagle Flights for adults (even if we offered them), and any other OFFICIAL activity at an event. Now, if an individual pilot wants to take someone for a ride to show them the joy of flying, that is up to them.

BART UPDATE by Bob Nelligan-Barrett

Since your last update in January, much progress has been made, though you may not see it. The tail feathers and ailerons have been primed with a UV protective silver layer, and wet-sanded baby-butt smooth in preparation for painting. The instrument panel has been finessed for mounting in the cockpit, the turtledeck has been varnished, as have been the three pieces of the cockpit floor.

The fuel tank below has been expanded with a three-inch addition welded to the front of it. Baffle holes were drilled into the previous front of the tank. Inlets and outlets have been welded in place, and the tank was pressure tested with a rubber glove and a hose to find any leaks. We found three, so we'll send it back to

Earl for a touch up.



Tyler Mullen visited us during his Spring Break from Purdue. He dove right in and tied down the aluminum base on the turtledeck for the headrest fairing. We started a several week process of hand-priming the rear fuselage to prevent any more surface rusting. Longerons for the sides of the fuselage are being measured for new aluminum ones to replace the original wooden ones.

My goal is to have 75H Fury looking like a real airplane by the June 10 Open House Fly-in. Wings on in primer, tail feathers white, engine and prop mounted for display, instruments in the panel. We'll see.

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
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
