### My First Glider Ride

Alana Craig, one of the BART team members who went to the International Vintage Sailplane Meet, had her first ride in a sailplane (an ASK-21) while she was there. Her previous aviation experience has been a ride in Vet Thomas's CUBy.

In her own words:

Joined by the Bart group from Chapter 44, I ventured to the Vintage Glider Show in Elmira, New York, eagerly anticipating my first glider flight. Excitement surged as I prepared for the unique experience ahead. Before boarding, I delved into understanding these engineless marvels—how they harness air currents and rely on skilled piloting for flight. Strapped in, my heart raced with a mix of nerves and exhilaration as we ascended into the sky. The takeoff, particularly the breathtaking drop off the cliff edge, offered a stunning view of the landscape below—a mosaic of rolling hills and shimmering lakes.

As we soared, the beauty of the scenery unfolded in all its glory. The peaceful silence of the glider allowed me to appreciate the natural splendor surrounding us, enhancing the serenity of the flight. Moments later, the pilot initiated exhilarating spins that left me momentarily dizzy yet thoroughly exhilarated. The unexpected thrill added a delightful twist to the experience, each spin becoming more enjoyable than the last.

Taking control of the glider under the pilot's guidance was a highlight I'll cherish forever. Feeling the subtle responses of the aircraft to my commands was empowering and exhilarating. Time seemed to stretch as I savored every moment of flight, though the landing brought a mix of relief and the desire for more.

Reflecting on the experience, it was more than a checkmark on my bucket list—it was transformative. The serene yet exhilarating journey highlighted the beauty of silent flight and the boundless possibilities of aviation. Hours after landing, the grin on my face persisted, a testament to the realness and joy of this unforgettable glider adventure amidst the stunning landscapes of Elmira.


