

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## President's Column

Today was a sad day. I participated in a Young Eagles event, and one of the pilots suffered a rare and tragic outcome. We lost a Young Eagles pilot and his passengers. It is difficult to deal with this and I ask God's mercy and understanding for all those involved. At the time of this writing, there is very little concrete information as to sequence and even less about probable causes.

It is paramount that speculation remain at a minimum, yet I feel moved to offer my personal observations concerning accidents in general and our sport.

#### Accidents vs. the promotion of the sport

It seems that our sport is inordinately consumed with accident self-examinations.

Does it build up our own sense of superior skill and capabilities? Or do we recognize that a sense of safety is the only way to promote the sport. It sometimes seems that we are continually trying to talk ourselves out of flying!

If we were to organize a soccer team or a football team and one of the players died on the field we would certainly feel grief and remorse, but immediately recognize it as a freak and rare event and would not even consider scrapping the whole program. This is due to the benefits vastly outweighing the risks. The benefits are many. The nurturing of a spark of passion in a young person is indeed a rare and spectacular event in its own right. Whether that passion is sports and the discipline that it creates or the field of aerospace with the dreams and intellect that grows from the study, the creation of a dream and the passion to attain that dream is priceless. We continue to live in a very technological society and the attainment of a technical education is paramount if we are to have control of our destinies.

#### Accidents and the media

Channel 13 lead off with a fatal car accident and then a fatal airplane accident. They only showcased the aviation victims' identities, crying friends and "eyewitnesses" with film of the burned out airplane. Nothing that gave the public information that they could use to make decisions with any context. Channel 4 gave an overview of the Young Eagles and seemed balanced.

#### **Expectations of the public.**

This member of the public does not depend on the media for any meaningful, accurate or agenda-free reporting of ANY event. This EAA representative refuses to talk with any media representative as past history has destroyed my trust.

#### **Assumptions of the public**

I believe that the public is stuck in the 1930's - small airplanes are dangerous, expensive and useless devices that are completely out of their reach. As such they are fascinating but wouldn't want one to live next door. Small airplanes are somewhere between the large carnivorous animal at the zoo and your local serial murderer. They do not believe that small airplanes are viable transportation devices that can actually be used to anyone's advantage. They are barely able to tolerate an airliner (and a small one is still a 20 seater). Their only contact is at air shows (again dangerous, death-defying stunts). # The Program


