

**Open Hangar Ramp Access:** There are two ways to get to Sid's hangar.

- 1. If you can get through the main gate that leads to the hangars, go through the gate, turn left and the M4 hangar will be on your left, should be second row. Parking will be in front of hangars M5 and M6.
- 2. Walk through the personnel gate next to the Blue Atec Hangar, this provides ramp access. The gate access code is the CTAF frequency which is 1230#. Walk across in front of the Blue Hangar, turn left up the taxiway to hangar M4 on the left.

Dear Chapter President,

Congratulations to your chapter in successfully reaching the BRONZE level status recognition level for the combined 2020 and 2021 years. EAA is happy to present you with a chapter recognition banner to proudly display where your chapter meets. Your level also will be displayed online at EAA.org/FindAChapter with a specially designed emblem. You are encouraged to use your emblem on your website, newsletter, and other promotional materials; your chapter emblem is attached in this email.

To review your chapters overall scoring, please see the attached spreadsheet document, and simply find your chapter.

This program was developed and measured in partnership with EAA's Chapter Advisory Council, and is based on 10 criteria that are consistently found in active and highly engaged chapters. Due to 2020 and 2021 being, challenging years for chapters to maintain a high level of engagement, these years have been combined into a single recognition period. This was done to help chapters have a longer period of time to engage in the 10 criteria. An additional 11<sup>th</sup> criteria point was included this year to help offset the unique challenges associated with limited social engagement, and to observe unique chapter approved activities. Each is worth a point, and there are three levels of recognition: bronze (7 out of 11), silver (8 out of 11), and gold (at least 9 out of 11).

- 1. Attends a chapter leadership training session
- 2. Growing or steady membership
- 3. Offers IMC or VMC Club programs
- 4. Participates in Young Eagle or Flying Start programs
- 5. Has EAA-approved Flight Advisor or Technical Counselor
- 6. Participates in EAA's Annual Chapter Member survey
- Participates in Young Eagles Build and Fly, Young Eagles Workshops, Ray Aviation Scholarship program, or sends a youth to EAA's Air Academy
- 8. Requests an EAA ChapterBlast email
- 9. Hosts at least two public events each year
- 10. Owns/leases a facility
- Extra credit activity, such as a chapter build project, youth build project, chapter scholarship, a chapter tool crib, IAC competition, etc.

He said "NO, I am playing in the band!" He hesitated to take control and fly, and as we were going around the circuit, he told me he was afraid of heights. from ear to ear. His grandmother told me that he was homeschooled because kids at school bullied him. What was funny was when they left and got into the car, his mother all of sudden came back in and said her son had sent her back in to get the pictures we taken in the air! The second memorable YE flight was at our YE rally at 2W6. It was my last of 5 kids flown. The father was only going to let his son fly if he could go along, because he was fearful of how the kid might react in the sky. So we got the father buckled into the back seat and off we went. We headed toward Broomes Island and I asked him what river was in front of us....he said Patuxent. Then beyond was the Chesapeake Bay. He was the smartest kid I had flown that day. Then I asked where he lived and found out it was two streets down from where I live in the Chesapeake Ranch Estates. So I called the Pax Tower and asked if we could take a sightseeing trip around Solomons Island. They approved and so over Lake Lariat, down

Driftwood & Seahorse Beach, and then across Solomons Island and the Thomas Johnson bridge back to 2W6. Both the kid and the father were ecstatic seeing where they lived. And I will never forget another memorable YE flight!

## **THE HOMEBUILDER'S CORNER**

## **RV7 Spinner Bulkhead Cutting**

The Spinner Bulkhead is at the base of the Spinner. The part that comes from Vans is a universal part in that it will work with fixed pitch and constant speed propeller installations. I am installing a constant speed propeller and with this installation the bulkhead needs to be modified by the building. The center must be removed for the propeller hub clearance.

I talked to Chris at Pax Aero Solutions at the Airport to see if they could cut out the center of the bulkhead per the RV7 plans. He did the cutting using the CNC Router, and now that he has the drawing CAD file for this mod he can do it for anyone quickly. The little piece in the



picture is what was cut out. It would have been mostly sawdust on my basement floor if I did it myself. I wasn't expecting that he would add the rivet holes too. It all seems to line up.

Chris told me he wants to get into assisting home builders where ever they can. He is doing some panel work now for Charlie Fox also. He charged me \$80 but I probably paid for some of the one time setup cost. This one is in their files now.

#### **RV6A Flap Motor Replacement**

I needed to replace the Flap Motor in my RV6. Once the motor is removed, the flaps would want to deploy to a position beyond full down, this movement could cause contact between the flap and the wing skin and could damage something. The challenge was to hold the flaps in the retracted position without damaging the paint and to also allow room to work in the area of the motor for replacement. The attached photo is of a hangar strap I used to pin the flaps in the retracted position so I could perform this preventative maintenance. The strap successful held the flaps in a fully retracted position allowing the removal of the flap motor without the need for an external brace.



#### **RV6A Cowl Paint Protector Bib**

Removing the cowling on the "A" model RVs is a tight squeeze between the spinner and the nose gear leg. I have fabricated a "bib" shown in the photo out of a "shower pan liner". I found this material at a home center box store. The material is 40mil PVC Liner, manufacturer is OATEY, and comes as a 5ft x 6ft sheet.

For my bib, I cut a piece that was 20inches x 20inches. In the center, I cut out a 6 inch circular area so that it would fit around the propeller prop shaft extension on my Van's Aircraft RV-6A. Then I cut a slot between the circular opening and the edge of the bib (liner).



To use, I place the bib in the space between the front of the cowling and the back of the spinner. This allows me to remove and install the lower cowling without scratching the paint on either the front of the cowling or the back of the spinner. Photo 2 shows the bib in place prior to removing the cowling.
