Flap handle and right cabin air vent


quarantine for the rest of the month.

metal brackets and parts, masked and spray painted the interior fiberglass cabin area, installed pilot and co-pilot rudder and brake pedals, and the aileron/elevator control arm and the flap handle. Half of my time was spent finding all the parts (most of them are actually in the building someplace) and ordering parts for optional systems (co-pilot rudder/brakes, vents). The other half was spent putting everything in twice to get it right once. Oh, and missing the October meeting and my buffalo hunt (another story). Enjoy the pictures. Next month's work involves dozens of cable pulleys and maybe landing gear. Looking forward to getting out more in November. Dennis Rose
