
## Nifty Fifty's March 2020 News Letter

#### F-86 Sabre Best aircraft of the Korean War!



This aircraft was sometimes called "Sabrejet". This aircraft replaced the P-80 "Shooting Star" and in combat she had a 10 to 1 kill ratio being flown by very experienced United States WW-2 pilots! This model was the fastest with speeds over 685 miles per hour. This aircraft was designed and built in the late 1940's and became outdated in the 1950's. Wing Span 37 Ft. 1 inches, length 37 Ft. 6 inches, weight 37,791 pounds loaded, six 50 caliber machine guns and eight 5 inch rockets or 2000 pounds of bombs made her very deadly.

What's interesting is, if the pilot had to eject in enemy territory his usual defense was only brains and a 45 caliber side arm. Recently the military just released 2700 new "Air Crew Defense Weapons" special design for pilots and crew members. The weapon is a 7 pound 5.6 mm rifle located in the injection seat in two pieces and can be put together in 30 seconds with deadly accuracy of 200 meters. If our pilots had those instead of only a side arm I'm sure it would have cut down on the number of our people captured in previous conflicts! We simply have to be very proud of all our military people! God Bless Them!

AIRMAIL 100

29 February 2020

Dear EAA Chapter President,

Early in the morning of September 8, 1920, a U.S. Post Office Air Mail DH-4 biplane left Long Island, New York with several hundred pounds of first class mail, some of it destined for California. On the 11th, another DH-4, No. 151, set down with that mail at Marina field on the shore of San Francisco Bay, completing the first transcontinental air mail flight, setting the stage for the eventual creation within the decade of America's commercial airlines and our global aviation leadership.

In a recent telephone conference call with Jim Busha and Hal Bryan, the EAA officially lent the organization's support to my proposal to commemorate that flight 100 years ago this coming September with the help of volunteer planes and pilots.

We are hoping that your Chapter will be willing to help us recruit a few volunteer pilots to fly one or more of the original segments of the 1920 route. At the suggestion of DH-4 pilot Dorian Walker, we plan to transfer one or more "ceremonial" sacks of commemorative letters and postcards between planes as they did in 1920. I

In addition to the support of the EAA, I am pleased to also note that Air Mail 100 also has attracted the interest of the Smithsonian's Air & Space Museum and National Postal Museums, as well as the AOPA. Chambers of Commerce at four of the original 16 air field locations (Bellefonte, Iowa City, North Platte, Reno) have also lent their endorsement of the project.
