BREAKING NEWS: August 16, Airport shut down as Caldor fire rages out of control

Since the August Strobe, forest fires continue to rage on the west coast. The difference is the fires are now local. We are not even half-way through the fire season and statewide, the total acreage burned is greater than 2020, the prior record.

Our chapter gathering on August 18 was cancelled due to the fire and thick smoke at the airport. The fire that started four days earlier on August 14 about 13 miles to the southeast of the airport was clearly visible from the airport. The next day, helicopters started to arrive and establish a base of operations for their arial assault in the canyon near Omo Ranch Road. The fire quickly spread up the dry canyon, pushed by the southwesterly winds and extreme dry humidity. Residence of Grizzly Flat and Somerset were given orders to evacuate immediately in the early morning hours.

For the next thirty days, if you turned on the radio or local TV, you would hear a constant



barrage of warnings, road closures, air quality reports, structures destroyed, percent containment and acres burned. The CalFire website displays a map showing the extent of the fire and the battle lines as the fire advances

to the northeast along Hwy 50 and the American River canyon.



- August 14-24: The Caldor fire threatens and has displaced more than 25,000 people in El Dorado County with 126,000 acres burned and 450 structures destroyed since the fire started on August 14. Now ten days in and no estimate of containment. Highway 50 deserted and closed at Sly Park to Meyers.
- August 25-31: A big concern grows to keep the fire out of the Tahoe Basin. With only 11% containment on August 25, the distance travelled from the origin to the current fire line near Kyburz is greater than the distance remaining, 20 miles to the rim of the Tahoe Basin. It would be a national tragedy if that boundary is breached. There is a vigorous debate if the agencies prosecuting the fire could have done more to extinguish the fire in the beginning.

- Sept 1, South Lake Tahoe is evacuated as the fire moves briskly to Echo Summit on Hwy 50 and crests the summit and threatens the homes in Christmas Velley on Hwy 89. This is only the second fire in California history to cross over the Pacific Crest Trail.
- Sept 6, Caldor fire has displaced more than 50,000 people in El Dorado County with 216,400 acres burned and over 600 structures destroyed. Containment is 44%. Highway 50 is still closed from Sly Park to Meyers.
- Sept 8, Containment is 50% with 217,569 acres burned. Residences return to South Lake Tahoe as the containment lines hold.

The number of people at the airport impacted by the fire is unknown at this time, both those forced to evacuate their residence and aircraft owners grounded by the Notam. The airport is closed by 30 helicopters operating from the field, landing on taxiways and runways, rotter blades churning dust and weeds like a giant weed whacker. Morning visibility as low as ½ mile improves to 6 plus depending on the time of day or direction of wind.

A TFR is in place 3 miles to the east of the airport. This brings back memories of the King Fire in 2010. The airport was under siege by the same agencies but local flight operations were not severely impacted. The airport then remained open with an FAA mobile control tower.

As one of the evacuee's forced to leave my home in Pollock Pines, the nearest the fire approached was 5 miles. My home was in the

mandatory evacuation zone but not immediately threatened. I am worried about the next fire as two fires came within striking distance in the last 10 years. The police will not allow residence to re-enter their homes if the fire threatens the Hwy 50 corridor. I can understand the concern for looting, but how long before we can return? (I was able to go home on Sept. 31.)

I got to experience what is means to be homeless as did other airport tenants who had to evacuate. Thanks to my friends and family who offered a room, a shower and a meal, the disruption was minimal. If there is a long-term displacement, more than a month or two, where would we all go? There is virtually no affordable housing in the Placerville area before the fire. I guess I can try the Walmart parking lot or look for an empty lot only to be evicted by the police. Forget about camping in the national forest, as all national forests in California are closed to the public.

I guess I will watch the evening news to take my mind off the near crisis, the state of the wildfire. What happened to the crisis on the U.S. border? Or the state of the homeless in California being debated by gubernatorial candidates as a recall election nears. Will I be counted as homeless now? Maybe I will contemplate moving out of state, but I can't sell my house, nor could new owners afford fire insurance. I tell myself, relax, take a deep breath, wait for the next crisis coming tomorrow that will make all my troubles go away. Wait, those are lyrics to a Beatles song, "Yesterday, all my troubles seemed so far away, now it looks as though they're here to stay, Oh, I believe in yesterday".

Yesterday, Aug 25, As I watch the national cable news in astonishment, the current administration said we would evacuate Kabul by Aug 31 and pull all troops out of Afghanistan. But wait, what about the thousands of Americans left behind after closing two air bases, including Bagram AB. Our European allies expressed outrage over the lack of a coherent plan. British parament rebuked a US president for the first time in history. We surrendered 70 billion dollars in equipment, including 20,000 Humvees and 20 helicopters and high-tech drones for the AFGHAN army who dropped their weapons and ran. Now the Taliban controls the country and those weapons. Things are spiraling out of control and the president turns his back and exits a press conference without answering a single question. Disgusting.

NEWSFLASH: KABUL Yesterday, Aug 26, explosives go off killing two hundred people at two gates at the Kabul airport halting Americans and fugitives from boarding C-17 aircraft. Sadly, thirteen brave American soldiers lost their lives in this, what many leaders and historians call the worst foreign policy blunder in American history. Elections do have consequences.

NEWSFLASH: FIRE marches east to within 10 miles of the Tahoe Basin. Air support intensifies with DC-10, C-130 and other large bombers as they attempt to slow the advance of the fire.

NEWSFLASH: WASHINGTON HEADLINES-Congress voted along party lines to pass a 3.5 trillion-dollar infrastructure bill to add to the national debt. This will drive inflation is up. Another crisis hits the gulf with Hurricane Ida and cripples US oil production. Rebuilding after Ida will be costly. Experts blame the

pandemic and climate change. Supply chain disruptions have made the cost of building materials about 30% higher than they were before the pandemic.

A political operative for a past president once said, "Never let a good crisis go to waste". Switch channels for news flash: FLOOD, FIRE, INFLATION, ILLEGALS, HOMELESS, AFGANASTAN, CRIME, PANDEMIC, LEADERSHIP....

I feel our nation is deeply divided and is vulnerable to another attack with weak leadership. Yesterday's crisis is supplanted by another crisis du jour. We have no shortage of crisis, just change the channel, and hear a different and conflicting opinion.

Today is Labor Day, Sept 6, I have been home 6 days. The fire has reached the Tahoe basin, 216,500 acres have burned with 43% containment. Residence of the City of South Lake Tahoe are returning home and the fire is held at bay a short distance to the south on the flanks of the Heavenly Valley Ski area. Our pancake breakfast on Saturday was cancelled due to the fire and airport security not allowing public access to the airport. The tempo of operations has slowed slightly but still over 25 helicopters operate from the field.



NOTAM closed Placerville until September 9.
AIRPORT OPENS SEPT 9 AT 8 PM!

This is the 20-year anniversary of 9-11. I served in the US Navy during the end of the Vietnam War and remember the cold war of nuclear deterrence and the policy of assured nuclear destruction between the US and USSR. I feel the tempo of events, local and global, has never been greater than now. What lies around the corner? What crisis looms or will explode in the days, weeks, or year ahead?


RV-7A Panel Upgrade – Part 7

One, Two, Tray

Well, I'm finally starting to get back on track with my panel upgrade after yet another delay for medical reasons. Hopefully the last for a while.

In my last installment, way back in the May issue ①, I had finally "finished" the main wiring loom on the benchtop and was starting to do the detail work for transferring everything to the airframe. On my old panel, wiring was attached to primary and sub-structure more-or-less randomly wherever there was a convenient spot. Over time, this grew into a rat's nest of overlapping and intertwined wires. This time around I'm making use of a cable tray to provide a dedicated location for the wire runs as well as mounting points for various electronic modules.

The cable tray will be a flat horizontal fiberglass panel that will fit behind and level with the bottom edge to the instrument panel. Using some medium density fiberboard (MDF) scrap I had laying around, I made temporary mold in which to lay up the fiberglass for the cable tray. A piece of half-inch Styrofoam was trimmed to the mold (the angle ends will fit against the cockpit top side rails). Three layers of fiberglass were laid up on the top and bottom surfaces of the foam panel and the edges trimmed to match. Several rectangular slots were cut in the bottom of the panel, and the Styrofoam cut away to the bottom side of the top layer. The slots were glassed in in to create recessed pockets and hard mounting surfaces for nutplates.







Holes were drilled through for the nutplate locations. These will be used later to attach cable clamps to secure the wire runs. Nutplates are mounted in the recesses on the underside of the cable tray. Rivets were not squeezed; instead, they were dipped in resin and set in







place to guarantee nutplates can't rotate under torque. Dry flox was used to encapsulate each nutplate, providing additional security.


Two layers of fiberglass were laid into the bottom of the mold, and with the resin still wet

the foam panel was reinserted into the mold. Several more layers of glass were laid on top of the mold, and the mounting "ears", and the lower glass layers wrapped around the sides to form the complete cable tray.

The cable tray was loosely placed in final position. Further modifications will be needed to clear the backside of the breaker panels, add a base for mounting relays, a home for my ADS-B Out transmitter, then final trim before permanent installation.

Next up: fitting the instrument panel segments.








- Due to firefighting activity and closure of the airport, we were forced to cancel the September pancake breakfast, by order of the CalFire boss. Thirty helicopters are operating from the airport, including multiple support vehicles, fuel trucks, water trucks and maintenance crews. A TFR 1/1906 effective to 9/30 from SFC to 13500. extends from 3 miles east of the airport south and east beyond the NEVADA border.

- The trucks bringing fuel and water to the firefighting helicopters used both the east and west gates to the airport. These heavy trucks have damaged the roadway and taxiway. Be careful when using these areas.
