ORGANIZATIONS DIE, OSHKOSH REBOUNDS AND SCHOLARSHIPS FLOURISH!

Last month I received a message from Dick Wampach that the SVPA (Sacramento Valley Pilots Association) was being disbanded after 73 years. The board of directors voted to dissolve the club due to insufficient membership to sustain the organization. Their last order of business was to determine what to do with the remaining funds. The board generously voted to divide the funds, \$2306, equally between three EAA chapters, Chapter 52, Chapter 512 and Vintage Chapter 25.

As I was preparing to write on a subject for this month's newsletter, EAA headquarters helped with this article indented below.

July 2021 - Your overall paid membership number is the No. 1 indicator of your chapter's health. You'll frequently hear us say "If you're not growing, you're dying." It is important to always be focused on membership retention and growth. If you do nothing, the chapter will inevitably dwindle away.

GENERAL MEETING

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It may surprise you just how quickly a chapter can go from strong and vibrant to struggling to survive. An 80%-member retention rate is the industry average for a typical non-profit. With that in mind, look at the following diagram

which shows membership loss over a five-year period:

Year	Start of Year Members	Retention Rate	End of Year Members
2017	100	80%	80
2018	80	80%	64
2019	64	80%	51
2020	51	80%	41
2021	41	80%	33

Sobering, isn't it? What can we, chapter 512, do to avoid getting to this point? How can we maintain and grow your membership? EAA headquarters says "It's not as difficult as you might think."

Start by creating a specific goal. Whether it's simply to maintain your current membership number, gain five new members, or 25, having a reasonable, measurable goal can make all the difference. It's a lot easier to get somewhere when you know where you're going!

A look at the number of EAA members and the number of chapter members shows that there is tremendous potential for growth in chapters. EAA currently has around 232,000 members. Out of this number, only about 15% are chapter members. The remaining 85% are the low-hanging fruit when it comes to recruiting new members to your chapter. Besides already meeting the requirement that chapter members be members of EAA, you know they already have some interest in aviation. All they need to do is pay your chapter dues and they are all set! It's up to you to draw them in.

Based off of a survey of EAA members, there are two main reasons folks do not join chapters. First, they were either not aware there was a chapter nearby or they were never invited to join. Hopefully this is not the case with our chapter, but it is worth consideration. How visible is our chapter? Do people around the airport and in the community know we exist? What actions have you taken to spread the

word about your chapter? Have you taken steps to actively prospect for new members and add them to your mailing list? Do you take opportunities to regularly invite folks to your chapter?

One Answer: Our pancake breakfast has been an enormous success this year. Three Saturdays down, three to go. Each one building on the next. Even the weekend of the Fourth of July did not deter people from coming out.

EAA further states... The second reason people do not join chapters is due to a lack of activity. Put another way, the chapter simply does not provide enough value to the prospective member to make it worth the time and effort for them to be a part. What is our chapter doing to provide value to our current members? Remember that membership retention is every bit as important as recruiting new members. However, providing value to our current members is often part of drawing new members. Satisfied members are more likely to help promote our chapter to their friends and acquaintances. Do you know what your members are interested in? Are you engaging in a variety of activities that cover a range of interests? It's OK to find a niche that is your chapter's "specialty" but be open to change and new ideas as your membership changes over time.

When it comes to chapters, remember that activity equals success. Don't forget that EAA has many turn-key programs available to your chapter that reach different age groups and interests. You can check these out here. While these give you a solid starting point, you are encouraged to be creative and come up with your own events and programs that are unique to your chapter.

Perhaps you are part of a large chapter and feel that the threat of dwindling membership is not too much of a concern for you. Don't be so comfortable that you are willing to rest on the laurels of those who went before you and put in the work to get the chapter to where it is today. Don't squander the investment they put in. Be proactive and keep those membership numbers up! Maybe you're part of a struggling chapter. You can begin taking the steps to turn the chapter around today! It will take hard work and dedication but success is possible and EAA stands ready to help!

Organizations like SVPA have life cycles, but their exist is fragile and finite. No organization is exempt from this inevitable cycle of life, unless it actively takes steps to counter the process. A typical EAA chapter is no different. With a strong national organization, EAA has 245,000 members, 900+ chapters world-wide. But every year, chapters are disbanded and new ones are formed.

Question: What does it take for a chapter to survive and thrive?

Answer: New membership! Members who are engaged, participate in activities, show interest in chapter events. Each member brings strength to the organization.

Chapter 512 has grown an astonishing 30% since the first of the year from 80 to 105 members. But more importantly, our

membership includes young people, new pilots seeking flight training, or furthering their pilot skills and advanced training.

OSHKOSH 2021

The chapter will have a strong presence at Oshkosh this year. With over a dozen chapter members planning to attend the show, and friends of chapter members all converging on Oshkosh to share the experience. For over half of the people, it will be their first trip to Oshkosh. For me, this is my 4th trip and I am just a rookie. Bob O'Hara, our beloved founder of Chapter 512, made 27 pilgrimages to Oshkosh. I was privileged to share one of those trips with Bob in 2017. His advice for arrival: "You need to arrive the day before the day before" the show opens to see all the aircraft as they arrive... land on the blue dot, the green dot, the black dot.

July "Changing of the Scholar Guard"

This fourth of July weekend, I attended a celebration and farewell to Andrew Gordon, who reported to U.S. Air Force "Boot Camp" this week to fulfill his four-year enlistment to become an air traffic controller. Andrew was chapter 512's Ray Aviation Scholar recipient in 2020. It was about one year ago when we selected Andrew, and I was at his house with his parents, Judi and Glenn. I came to announce to Andrew that we selected him for a \$7,500 Ray Aviation Scholarship. And before I could complete the sentence, Andrew said he enlisted in the U.S. Air Force and was due to ship out in early 2021. My jaw dropped, and I said to Andrew, "I don't think you can do both. You got to choose one or the other".

Well, Andrew accepted the scholarship and began his flight training, then took a short vacation to Illinois and returned to Cameron Park to resume training. And then came COVID during the summer of 2020, the schedule was

interrupted with numerous days of poor visibility due to severe forest fires. Flight delays meant lost time, retraining and more dollars to achieve the desired result, a sport pilot certificate.

But as I write this article, Andrew proved me wrong! He completed his flight training and reported to active duty as a U.S. Air Force enlistee just days later. A BIG CONGRATULATIONS to Andrew Gordon for achieving his goal of Sport Pilot Certificate and joining the Air Force. I said he could not do both, and I was wrong. He did both!

NEW SCHOLAR FOR 2021

Not every chapter gets a back-to-back scholar, but chapter 512 did. Our new scholar, Jaeger Ruckman, was "approved" by the EAA National scholarship committee. The EAA 512 Scholarship Committee found it to be a challenge to select a scholar and choose a flight school. Our experience has been that the cost of local flight schools is exceptionally high or the distance to the nearest alternative is too great. I have been an advocate for the formation of a local Placerville based flying club and have talked about this for several years especially since Placerville Aviation, the local


FBO/flight school, closed shop over 2 years ago.

The need for a flying club at our airport is certain and would serve the local community with affordable flight training. Both EAA and AOPA promote flying clubs with their own initiatives. While chapters may not form or be associated with a flying club, members of a chapter may form a flying club. That is my desire as a chapter leader, to start a flying club to lower the cost of flight instruction. With the help of one of our members, I hope to start a club in the next three to six months, a nonequity club will be formed as a 501(c)(7) with rules, articles of incorporation, officers and all the requisite elements.

The plan is to return from Oshkosh and for Will Mathews, CFI, to pick up a Cessna 150 in eastern Washington. If all goes well, Jaeger and others will have a trainer to start instruction on the ramp at the Placerville airport by early August.

"I use it on navigators that get us lost," explains the captain, winking at his first officer.


The navigator then opens his briefcase, pulls out a .45 and sets it on his chart table.

Business from the Floor, Changes to Agenda

O Jim Wilson is buying a 1972 Cessna 150 and is forming a flying club with it. The club will be limited to 5 members, one or two of which can be student pilots. The Board had a lengthy discussion on how the club can encourage and support the recruitment of new members to our Chapter.

Approval of Minutes - approved

Board Member Reports

- O Jim Wilson President
 - Another successful pancake breakfast July 3
 - Serving over 125 people, 18 airplanes flew in. Gross revenues \$1033. \$834 breakfast, \$15 gear, donations \$185. Our next pancake breakfast will be on August 7th.
 - Ray Aviation Scholarship update
 - ANDREW GORDON 2020 RAY SCHOLAR SUCCESSFUL COMPLETION
 - O Check ride was flown on June 23. Local DPE not available. Don Bradley contacted DPE in southern Oregon. Dustin Jones and Andrew flew the 3 hour flight for the oral exam and check-ride the next morning and returned to PVF for the picnic and general meeting.
 - O Andrew completed his Recreational Pilot license in 11½ months. The length of time was exacerbated by COVID-19 and epic forest fires with poor visibility in all of California.
 - o The final report to National was completed with a total cost of \$19,200 reported.

• JAEGER RUCKMAN - 2021 RAY SCHOLAR

O Jaeger was officially awarded a \$10,000 scholarship on July 8. EAA will transfer the first installment of \$4,000 to the Chapter's account.

■ Sonny Atkins Scholarship awards

- Nathan West passed the FAA written exam with a score of 88%. A \$1500 check for flight training was delivered to Foothills Flight Center in late May. Since FCC has shut down operations, they returned the money to the Chapter.
- Jim Wilson made a motion to award **Andrew Gordon** \$2500 from the Sonny Atkins Scholarship for his successful completion of this license. John Crocker seconded the motion, which passed the Board unanimously.
- The **Chapter flight simulator** operating system was upgraded to Windows 10. Additionally, a new, 32", curved monitor replaced the three, 27" monitors we were using. The center monitor of those three had broken. Total cost for the upgrades was \$794.64.

- Young Eagles We had a good debrief from the YE event. There is a short list of action items that can be implemented to improve our next event. Dave Lugert has provided inputs and insights into what Chapter 292 does for their YE events. The Board approved reimbursement of \$35 for printing expenses that Jim incurred supporting this last YE event.
- WYFY Jim is trying to set up an extender so that we can hold Zoom conferences in our hangar. This will allow us to access presentation speakers from around the country.

- Banking account balances as of 06/30/2021:

• Fundraising – Judi Gordon


