







The <u>California Capital Airshow</u> will take to the sky over Mather Field this year on **July 13-14** during the traditional summer vacation period well before the school year begins for aspiring future aviators and their families! In addition to the **USAF Thunderbirds**, the CCA is pleased to host the only west coast appearance of the aerobatic team many consider to be the best in the world.

The **Frecce Tricolori**, also known as the "Tricolor Arrows" in English, are officially designated as the 313° Gruppo Addestramento Acrobatico, Pattuglia Acrobatica Nazionale (English translation: 313th Acrobatic Training Group, National Aerobatic Team). It has been 30 years or more since the last time this unit extensively traveled abroad and this is a rare opportunity to enjoy something truly different. They are a 10 jet team trailing red white and green smoke trails in the national colors of Italy.

Please note that admission gates will open each day at 3 PM and the show will extend through the twilight hours and well into darkness with spectacular nighttime pyrotechnics! Accordingly, airshow Fly-In accommodations will not be provided this year as festivities may end as late as 10 PM during non-towered field operations. September 5, 1930 - January 15, 2024

John Anderson was a chapter member, friend, and veteran with 26 years of distinguished service in the United States Air Force. His service contributions in communications, electronics, and computer systems took him to remote corners of the USA, Canada, and Europe, where he played a pivotal role in shaping the military operations and future of communication. His involvement in installing a cuttingedge computer and communications system for the Joint Chiefs of Staff at the Pentagon stands as a testament to his ingenuity and foresight. Following his he his military career. pursued passion for communications and computer science, obtaining a degree that propelled him into a successful career at IBM. It was there that he played a pivotal role in the development of the first production gigabyte, a groundbreaking achievement that revolutionized the landscape of data storage and computing.

John's pursuits extended far beyond the confines of the corporate world. A fervent aviator, he obtained his pilot's license and took to the skies with an adventurous spirit that inspired all who knew him. A longtime member of EAA 512, his love for aviation culminated in building a single-engine sport aircraft for his beloved wife, Ingrid.

On June 15, Ingrid will take John back home to Minnesota for his final flight with his Air Force brethren, who will pay homage to a life well-lived. In honor of his memory, let us heed John's lasting wish: to perform one kind act for someone every single day.





Speed King

Major Doolittle, famous American airplane racer, who today broke the world record for land planes held by France, when he clipped 18 miles from the previous mark.



"The Gee Bee"

Developed in the early 1930s, the Gee Bee R-l was specifically engineered for air racing, which was immensely popular at the time. Its distinctive design, featuring a relatively short fuselage and a powerful radial engine, allowed it to achieve remarkable speeds, making it a strong competitor in the air racing circuit.

The Gee Bee R-1's combination of a large Pratt & Whitney R-1340 engine and a compact, streamlined airframe set new standards for speed and performance, although its handling characteristics demanded exceptional skill from its pilots. Enter adventurer and aviator Jimmy Doolittle, who piloted that "fat red headed bug" to a record-breaking win in the Cleveland National Air Races. His victory both cemented the Gee Bee's legendary status and showcased Doolittle's extraordinary piloting skills.

WORLD RECORD IN SPEED SET BY DOOLITTLE IN CLEVELAND

Major Flies Land Plane At 292 Mile Per Hour Over Course

WEATHER IS BUMPY

Craft Looks Like Red Headed Bug, Breaking French Mark

CLEVELAND AIRPORT, Sept. 3.

—(AP)—Major James H. Doolittle set a new world speed mark of 292.801 miles an hour over the three kilometer course here today at the national air races.

Doolittle's speed was more than 14 miles an hour faster than the previous world mark of 278.48 set in 1924 by Warrant Officer Bonnet in France.

The former army flier carried a barograph to make his record official.

After breaking a record, he continued flying the course and flashed the pylons, his plane a blur in the blue haze, on the fifth lap at 306 miles an hour.

LOOKS LIKE BUG

His plane looked like a fat red
headed bug as it flattened into the

distance.

A strong wind was blowing

A strong wind was blowing and the air was bumpy, but the major held his plane close to the ground.

The timers averaged his second, third, fourth and fifth laps at 296.287 miles an hour. The rules provide that any four consecutive laps may be used to determine the record.

OLD RECORD BROKEN

This average is almost 18 miles an hour faster than the old record.

The barograph and timers' official records must be calibrated by the government bureau of standards at Washington, D. C., and then approved by the Federation Aernautique Internationale, world governing body of competitive aviation events, before the record is made official.
