

# **STEM for ALL ages**

#### Five aviation questions:

- 1. What were the first names of the brothers who invented the first successful manned aircraft?
- 2. What field of science provided the breakthrough for the first successful manned aircraft?
- 3. Which country was the first to use an Airforce in war?
- 4. Which American President was the first to send a letter by air?
- 5. In which war was the first floating aircraft carrier used?

#### The answers are:

- (1) Joseph and Etienne, not Orville & Wilbur
- (2) Chemistry, not Physics
- (3) France
- (4) George Washington
- (5) The American Civil War

Any surprises? If 'yes', then you will learn something from this!

Although Turks and Arabs have rival claimants for the 'first to fly' claim, in 1783 Joseph and Etienne Montgolfier invented the first successful manned aircraft, a hot air balloon. The Montgolfier hot air balloon flew in November 1783, and was followed two weeks later by Jacques Charles' Hydrogen balloon. Both types of aircraft still fly to this day.

Times were good in France in the late 1700's, if you were rich. That never changes. In 1783 there was a race between teams of wealthy men to be the first to fly, just like Jeff Bezos Vs. Elon Musk Vs. Richard

Branson to be the first with Space tourism today. The Montgolfier brothers were paper makers who observed that papers bags held over a smoky fire would float up in the air. They postulated that very large bags could be filled with smoke, thereby allowing soldiers to be transported over British defenses at the Rock of Gibraltar.

The first ascent of their balloon, which was called the Montgolfiere, occurred in September 1783. A science teacher named Pilatre de Roziere was on board, and the balloon was tethered to the ground, so it was not 'free flight'.

Their next attempt in October 1783 was a free flight, and had three test pilots onboard. They were a duck, which could fly, so flight should not harm it, and a cock which could almost fly, so his chances were good. The third test pilot was a sheep, which clearly could not fly. If the sheep survived, man would survive.

Put that into the perspective of our UFO hysteria. People in 1783 were probably not thinking about Klingons or Vulcans when a sheep flew overhead. Witchcraft or demons, maybe? About that same time, Oct/Nov 1783, a rival of the Montgolfiers, Prof. Jacques Charles, was experimenting with a Hydrogen balloon. He produced H2 by stirring ground up iron in oil of vitriol (Sulphuric acid). He did not know have a name for the gas, and just called it 'inflammable air'. When he filled a big bag with inflammable air, it got away from him and flew out over the countryside, eventually landing in the village of Gonesse. It terrified the villagers. They immediately attacked it with shovels, axes, and whatever was handy. The demon from the sky further confused them when they found it was nothing but skin!

Needless to say, loss of his balloon set Charles back in the race, but repercussions of that day in Gonesse, and a similar event a year or so later, are still with us today. That event in question was a balloon landing among peasants working in a field. They hacked not only the balloon to pieces, but also the balloonist. Word went out among the flying clubs to look out for peasants who would think they were witches.

One smart aeronaut defused the situation by offering everybody a glass of champagne when they landed. Ever since, balloon rides always end with everybody present being served champagne. That is the backstory. But, let's get back to the first manned flights. I could find no record that either of the Montgolfier brothers ever flew, and they were certainly chicken for the first manned flight. In fact, they petitioned King Louis XVI for the loan of two condemned criminals for use as test pilots. That freaked out Pilatre de Roziere, who had gone up in the tethered balloon back in September. "You can't give the honor of being the first aeronauts to condemned criminals!" he shrieked. "I'll do it."

De Roziere prevailed, and the king was told the executions need not be delayed. Louis XV1 always had a price, and he insisted that his cousin, Marquiz d'Arlandes, accompany de Roziere. Whether it was because he didn't like his cousin, or wanted to reward him for something, I don't know. The first manned flight took place in front of a huge crowd, which included Ben Franklin. He was in Paris negotiating the end of our War of Independence from the British. In a letter from Ben to a scientist in England, Ben speculated that manned flight would make war obsolete. He figured that 5,000 balloons would cost less than 5 ships of the line. If each carried 2 soldiers, no sovereign could afford to defend against such an army suddenly arriving in his country. I included that letter in my book. The fact that Ben Franklin was writing about such matters to an English scientist – while we were still at war with England – is a measure of how scientists had special status back then.

## IN MEMORY OF BOB O'HARA

Bob passed away Friday, February 14<sup>th</sup> 2020 after a short battle with cancer; he was 89 years old. Bob Joined the Army Air Corps at the age of 16 at the tail end of WWII and he served as a gunner on an A26 in the Korean War. After the war he was instrumental in building one of the largest Civil Air Patrol squadrons in the state, where he flew over 4,500 hours in an AT-6 on search and rescue missions. A lifelong pilot, people often saw Bob flying over Georgetown and Placerville in his little yellow Taylorcraft or driving his VW Beetle.

Bob was one of the principal founders of Chapter 512 in 1974 and lead a team of chapter members who poured the concrete slab and erected the hangar in 1978. Bob loved to fly his yellow Taylorcraft almost every Saturday morning on "Dawn Patrol". He was recognized by EAA as one of only 14 Young Eagle pilots who flew each year for 25 years. He flew over 2,000 Young Eagles.




#### **RETURN FROM OSHKOSH VIA WALLA WALLA WA**



It has been a bountiful year for matching scholarships and young eager student pilots seeking to fulfill their aviation dreams.

#### **RAY AVIATION SCHOLARSHIP UPDATE**

- The first chapter Ray scholar was Andrew Gordon who earned his Sport Pilot certificate in June of 2021 before he reported to duty in the U.S. Air Force for training as an air traffic controller.
- Our second Ray scholar is Jaeger Ruckman who received a \$10,000 scholarship to for the purpose to attain a Private Pilot certificate. His first milestone was to solo within 90 days. He accomplished that on November 19.
- In November, the chapter was offered a second scholarship for the year and the scholarship committee selected Aidan Andrews for the \$10,000 scholarship. Aidan began flight training at Placerville with 11 hours in the C-150, then moved the venue to Cameron Park to continue training with Sierra Nevada Flight Instruction. He is anticipated to solo by the end of February.

- The chapter opted in for the 50/50 matching funds Ray Scholarship for 2022, where the chapter puts in \$5,000 with EAA matching funds. The chapter is accepting applications from El Dorado County residents and will announce the recipient in early March.
- The chapter also applied for a second full scholarship for 2022. EAA will announce the winning chapters the end of this month.

- Jim Wilson President
  - Ray Aviation Scholarship 50/50 Matching Funds. Received letter from Chris Gauger authorizing two matching fund scholarships. Jim advised that we will pledge one \$5000 scholarship.
    - Jim and Dave interviewed two candidates on Saturday, Feb 5, 2022

- Ben Varozza, 17 yr will graduate at the end of May from Union Mine High School. He has been accepted to Embry Riddle in Florida and Florida Tech in Melbourne. His long term goal is to be a NASA astronaut. He is president of the local FFA. He lives near the Placerville airport. He flew a YE flight, joined EAA and the chapter, has attended multiple events and has been studying Sporty's Learn to Fly on-line course and can start flight training upon selection by the committee. Jim sent Ben the FAA website with information to obtain a private pilot certificate, IACRA student pilot application and medical AME.
- Judah Winger, turns 16 yr in April. He is homeschooled and lives with family in Somerset. PVF pilot Don Bishop has flown Judah on several flights which motivated him to become a pilot. Could be considered for Sonny Atkins next year. Parents signed a YE form to schedule a YE flight.

#### Committee Reports

#### • Fundraising – Tracey Fremd

- New Member Recruitment Initiative
- One way to promote fundraising is through growing our membership. Tracey and Jim Pinkowski would like to pursue a 3-pronged approach to recruiting new members.
  - Canvas our current Chapter members with a Questionnaire to better understand our Chapter's inherent strengths and weaknesses. The Questionnaire would be either via email or as a Strobe enclosure. Questions would include:
    - "Why did you join EAA Chapter 512?"
    - "What do you consider to be the principal benefits of your Chapter 512 membership?"
  - Have a community outreach to national EAA members in the area that are not currently local chapter members. Currently there are nearly 700 EAA members within a 25 miles radius of Chapter 512 that are affiliated with a chapter. Outreach would be via mailers.
  - Actively recruit guests attending our general meetings. Offer guests a 6-mos free
    EAA membership at the local and National Level. (This is something we already do.)
- Other methods of fundraising that Tracey would like to pursue include:
  - Cold call aviation businesses within our zone or area for fundraising donations to our Youth and Scholarship programs
  - Public and private grants
  - o Endowments & Wills
  - Contributions
- To support these efforts the Board resolved: "To allow distribution of a Questionnaire to our current members, to allow cold call soliciting of aviation businesses in our area, and to research the costs of mailers to approach non-chapter, EAA members within a 25 mile radius of Chapter 512."
  - $_{\odot}$   $\,$  The Board will approve funds for the mailer pending final cost estimates.
- Scholarship Dave Lugert and John Crocker recently left the Scholarship Committee. Currently the committee includes Jim Wilson, Judi Gordon, and Andrew Gordon. We will ask our general membership for another volunteer to work on this committee.

- Strobe Helen Brand, Editor
  - Publishing the Strobe is dependent upon the Editor to layout the content and Secretary to post the BOD & General Meeting minutes. Last month it was delayed and was not published until the day of the general meeting. As a result, we had low attendance at the meeting, less than 20. Publishing the Strobe is a multi-step process converting between Word, PDF, email, and web page formats. This month, we will publish with a one step process, directly through MailChimp. We will evaluate the success of this process and see how well the Strobe can be archived with this method.
  - A survey will be taken at the next General Meeting to see how many members read the minutes in the Strobe. We will consider whether or not we should continue printing the minutes in the Strobe vs just having them available online.

#### **New Business**

• **Dick Wampach:** Requests improvements to the grill. This is our money maker. With the current burners it is hard to control the temperature. We have served a lot of dark, too dark, pancakes at our last few gatherings. We have a reputation to maintain "The best pancakes east of Cedar Ravine".
