Jim W. Shannon 1929-2019

Born in Van Nuys, Jim grew up in Truckee, Dunsmuir and other small towns of northern California where his father worked as an agent for the Southern Pacific railroad. After Jim's graduation from Redding High School, the family moved once again. This time to Placerville.

Jim was already on his way to perfecting his mechanical skills, owning and riding a British motorcycle, one of something like 20 or so "bikes" he owned through out his long life.

Jim worked at an auto dealership in Placerville until Uncle Sam requested his service in the army's first helicopter unit where his education continued at the Sikorsky factory.

As he returned to civilian life, the space race had begun. For the next decade, first as a rocket test technician, then as a test engineer, Jim worked on the Gemini engines that powered manned NASA space missions. In the meantime, while working nights at Aerojet, he spent daylight hours finishing his family's new home in a wooded setting just outside of Placerville.

Using metal, the material with which he was most familiar, Jim's talents took a new turn, creating original sculpture which was recognized in reviews of the Sacramento area art world. Many of the pieces featured

frogs whose whimsical activity brought a chuckle to the viewer. Jim's ability to repair that which was worn or broken and replicate that which was missing served him well in his next endeavor — the

which among its many awards, was chosen Best of Show on a Packard tour to Victoria, B.C. Another Best of Show winner was his 1932 Packard club sedan at the Sacramento Concours. The car had already taken home a 1st place ribbon from the prestigious Pebble Beach Concours.


At mid-life, Jim fulfilled a long time desire. He took flying lessons and obtained his private pilot's license. Flights, in his Cessna 152 and the 2 sport aircraft he built, fill the pages of two

log books for a total of nearly 2500 hours. The books also tell the story of adventures and destinations throughout the western US.

In his 80s, Jim optimistically began work on yet another project, the rebuilding of a Smith minibiplane. But time ran out on October 23. He is survived by Betty, his wife of 63 years, and a daughter, Holly Foster.













Board Member Reports

➤ Al Herron – President

Al presented a spreadsheet of multi-year Chapter goals including: Hangar Repairs, Hangar Upgrades, Ground School, Young Eagles, Pancake Breakfasts, Fundraising, Scholarship Programs, and STEM/Maker Center. These items will be discussed in more detail during future meetings. The goal is to create one-, three-, and five-year plans to address these topics.

Jim Wilson – Vice President

- Ground School Due to a lack of an instructor, we will not be offering a Ground School this year. We will look into the possibility of setting up a ground school in coordination with Folsom Lake College's local campus. We will also look into setting up a workshop assist with the online, Sporty's Young Eagle's classes.
- Ray Foundation Scholarship We do not qualify for this scholarship program this year. We will
 position ourselves to participate next year.

- Chapter Leader Boot Camp This year's annual EAA Boot Camp will be held on Feb 22nd at the Sacramento Executive Airport. This free, all-day event is open to anyone wishing to attend.
- Young Eagle / Eagle Flights This year, we are going to try to offer introductory flights during our Pancake Breakfasts.

Judi Gordon – Treasurer, Membership

- Quarterly Treasurer's report Judi presented a Chapter Balance Sheet, a Quarterly Profit and Loss Sheet, and an Annual Profit and Loss Comparison for 2018/2019.
- Membership update A new year is upon us. Dues are due. Annual dues are only \$20.
- Raffle filing We have been approved by the State Attorney General to hold raffles during 2020.
- Annual Bookkeeping Review Russ Sardini, as an independent consultant, will meet with Judi on Jan 9th to review our accounting books.
- Banking account balances:
 - Cash and checks on hand: \$1,104.22
 - Chase Checking 6001: \$15,103.12 (of which \$5,705.70 is earmarked for scholarship funds)
 - Chase Savings 8668: \$2,921.92 (Airport security account held in Trust. Not property of EAA 512)
 - Total as of 12/31/19: \$16,207.34 plus \$2,921.92 in Airport Security Account.

Dick Wampach – General Director

- IMC/VMC Club The budget for refreshments at the IMC/VMC meetings is \$10/month. So far we have been spending less than this.
- Paul Koscheka, the FAA Safety Representative from the Sacramento FSDO, will be our speaker at our January meeting next week.
- Pancake Breakfasts start again in April. Volunteers are welcom

As a service project, we are looking into creating two "Doggy Bag" dispensaries for the airport. Jeremy, the assistant airport manager, has volunteered to build the dispensaries. He has experience doing this. The cost will be less than \$50. Chapter members are encouraged to donate plastic bags to the cause.

> Tim Sullivan - Past President

- We have a \$12K quote to leak-proof the Hangar roof and replace the windows. We will be getting additional quotes.
- The shed on the side of the Hangar is falling apart. Tim recommends tearing it down and building a box around the air compressor.
- The cabinets above the kitchen area (labeled "A" through "G") need to be mouse-proofed prior to our Pancake Breakfast season.
