Attention CFIs and Experimental airplane builders

The FAA snuck a new law in that affects us all. I hadn't heard about it and I talked to many of the other CFIs around who also didn't know about it. The FAA has done some really questionable things in my mind lately which makes aviation less safe, but their goal, they say, is added safety. I don't see it, nor did the people that wrote many of the articles I found on it.

You can no longer charge for training in an experimental aircraft. What does that mean? No you can't do familiarization training. No you can't do BFRs. No, you can't do recurrent training. I figured that if I did a BFR for someone and didn't charge them, I was OK. NOPE! There is an exclusion that says even BFRs that you don't charge for are not legal because you can log the time and therefor it is still

compensation. Dumb huh?

OK, there was substantial kickback so here is how you get around it so you can get a BFR in your experimental and you can get recurrent or familiarization in it.

Go to the EAA.com website and in the search box, type "LODA." It brings up a page with a bunch of blue lettering titles of pages to go to. Scroll down and click on the one that says Experimental, Limited and Primary Category Aircraft Flight Training FAQs.

There you can watch the video or look at the tags of the different topics. You can go to the one that says, "HOW DO I GET A LODA?" Click on the blue email address and give the information it asks for. I wrote it as a letter and asked for authorization for all canard aircraft and all of the RV series of aircraft to cover the ones I would be involved with potentially. As an owner you

ask for your specific aircraft.

I got the LODA back the next morning. As an instructor, I am authorized to do instruction in any experimental. As an owner, you will only have authorization to have instruction in that particular aircraft. Only one LODA is required, so either the instructor or the owner must have it and it has to be on you just like a license is required to be on your person when you fly. My suggestion is if you own the plane, get one, then there is never a question about having instruction in it, and if you are an instructor, get it, because then you are always covered and you can teach or do a BFR in experimental aircraft. I don't know why the FAA has taken these steps, even the article I read said it was an unsafe move. That's why they made the LODA.

An update on a chapter member's Rans S-12 build project

EAA 517 member Erick Roblessy has been working diligently on completing his Rans S-12, and he is ready to put the wings on as soon as he can find a space large enough to do that. The wings consist of metal tubing covered with canvas, so it is not a difficult project.

The Rans S-12 is a kit-built, single-engine, pusher configuration, high wing monoplane designed by Randy Schlitter and manufactured in America by Rans, Inc. The first Rans-12 was introduced in March 1990, and approximately 1,200 have been built to date. The power plant is a Rotax, two-cylinder, 65 hp engine.

The Rans S-12 cruises at 75 mph, stalls at 32 mph with flaps down, and has a range of approximately



333 miles. Aircraft empty weight is 475 pounds, and aircraft gross weight is 975 pounds. Fuel capacity is 18 U.S. gallons. The propeller is a two-bladed wooden prop. With a



service ceiling of 14,000 feet and a climb rate of 900 feet per minute, the Rans S-12 is a fun and economical airplane to fly and own.
