AOPA tackles U.S. Attorney's mistaken views on GA security in Minnesota.

AOPA is taking on the top federal prosecutor in Minnesota over airport security. U.S. Attorney Thomas B. Heffelfinger says security must be tightened at the Twin Cities' general aviation reliever airports to counter terrorists. The local press quoted him saying that someone could "kill 3,000 people" by flying a single-engine airplane into the roof of the Metrodome stadium during a Sunday afternoon football game.

"We respectfully believe that your quotes, if reported accurately, reflect significant misunderstanding about aviation security, and, in fact, are not consistent with the views and policies of the U.S. agencies responsible for ensuring the safety and security of the nation's general aviation airports," said AOPA President Phil Boyer in a letter to Heffelfinger.

The U.S. Attorney for Minnesota said it was his "job to

TREASURER'S REPORT BY PAUL LINNEROOTH

August's Financial Summary

Cash on hand \$ 40.00 Checking Acct. \$ 5,033.06 Investments \$ 6,364.86 Total \$11,437.92

Income in August consisted of \$400.00 in membership dues, \$119.00 in gifts received, \$413.30 in chapter hats and shirts, and \$3,385.50 from the pancake breakfast for a total of \$4,318.00.

Expenses for the same period were \$1,768.78 and included \$1,632.20 for the pancake breakfast, \$61.15 for newsletter publication, \$38.43 for utilities, and \$37.00 for stamps.

Through August, we are \$375.00 behind in the expected payment of dues. We have received \$1,550.00 in dues from members who have paid dues for at least two consecutive years. Last year the similar number was \$1,975.00.

On the other hand, we are \$304.00 ahead of last year in gifting to the Education Fund. There is a definite increase in the number of members who are including a gift to the Education Fund with their dues payment, but that does not account for all of it.

The pancake breakfast to date has receipts of \$3,385.50 and expenses of \$2,045.34, a net of \$1,340.46. We still expect additional income, maybe \$125.00 to \$150.00, from food resale and a food rebate. The manual tally on meals served did not correlate well with the breakfast receipts this year. The tally indicated we served 751 meals. From the breakfast receipts, I estimate the number could have been 810 or more.


St. Marten Airport (dang, that's close!)
