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FROM THE FLIGHT DECK (PRESIDENTS REPORT)

Aviation Day 2010 is now history. The dust hasn't fully settled yet but the preliminary numbers sound good. We served over 604 breakfasts and had gross income of over \$3, 660. That is good news. Preliminary expenses are about \$1, 230 so that gives us a net income of over \$2, 400. Our Treasurer will have a complete accounting of income and expenses at the September meeting. I would like to extend a big thank you to everyone that helped out.

An Aviation Day follow up meeting was held on Monday, Aug 23. Many excellent suggestions for improving Aviation Day 2011 were introduced and discussed. The highlight of Aviation Day 2010 was the appearance on the three WW I Fokker aircraft from the Vintage Aero Flying Museum in Ft. Lupton, Colorado. The presence of these unique replica airplanes was made possible by Chapter 54 member Mark Holliday. A suggestion was made to give Mark a special acknowledgment for making possible the appearance of these three airplanes.

Art Edlund and Dave Becker will be representing Chapter 54 at the Farnsworth Magic Lunch and Program at the Minnesota Science Museum on August 30. Farnsworth will be celebrating the second consecutive year they are the only junior/middle St. Paul school that made annual yearly progress (AYP) in math and reading. Junior High math proficiency scores at Farnsworth increased by 14% and reading proficiency scores increased by 15% from the previous year. They also achieved an 11% gain in science scores. I'm honored they included us in the celebration.

Tom Gibbons, our newsletter editor, wrote a very complimentary editorial letter to EAA titled "AirVenture to Remember". Tom Poberezny sent a very nice response back to Tom G. thanking him for his comments and insight into the challenges and accomplishments members exhibited by the EAA staff and volunteers at AirVenture 2010. Perhaps we should watch for the article in the next edition of Sport Aviation.

As many of you heard, via the Google group e-mail system, our Chapter laptop computer was reported missing following Aviation Day. After a frantic two-day search it was found, in the chapter house, in a place where it is not normally stored. When it was reported missing, my first thought was that someone had stolen it from Valters hangar as Aviation Day was winding down. That led me to think about club house security and where we keep the computer, on a desk next to the big window. It is easily visible through the window. Bettie Seitzer suggested covering the window with mini blinds to discourage "prying eyes". I think window blinds are a great idea, not only from the security issue but also at certain times of the year sunlight comes through that big window and illuminates our screen making images projected on the screen impossible to see.

Has anyone paid recent attention to the condition of the landscaping around clubhouse? Obviously the shrubbery and grounds need some care. The shrubs are overgrown and the weeds are popping up through the ground cover. At the September meeting I will set a fall clean-up day to get the grounds ready for winter and next summer. I think this should be a "work party" event and not left to Dave Fiebiger and Al Kupferschmidt to take care of.

The pedal plane has arrived from Chapter 486 in Fulton, NY. Chuck Burtch delivered it to Bill Schanks during AirVenture and Bill brought it to St. Paul. It is being transferred to Ed Pfeiffer to complete for Aviation Day 2011.

I've contacted Dale Rupp's family regarding his memorial. Last month Chapter 54 supported purchasing a bronze plaque for Dale on EAA's Memorial Wall. I informed the Rupp family of our actions and asked their input for information on the plaque inscription and a one-page biography of Dale's life and flying career for their Memorial Wall Album. His family will plan to attend the unveiling ceremony at 2011 AirVenture.

Finally, our September 13 meeting will be a Volunteer Recognition event. Bettie is preparing a special program that will include pie and perhaps ice cream. Please invite everyone you know that is not a Chapter 54 member but yet volunteered their services to help make Chapter 54 events successful. This will be our opportunity and duty to say thank you.

Our next Chapter meeting is Monday, September 13. Hope to see everyone there.

• This was probably the tenth Chapter 54 Pancake Breakfast I've worked (have been away for a few). My daughter joined me as in most past years. We have always taken food-related jobs. We enjoyed it and at least I will continue volunteering in future years.

My comments and suggestions below apply only to the feeding part of the event. This part is less "sexy" than the aviation part but it is the "expensive part" and is the taste of the event, literally and figuratively, for most who come. There are clearly ways to improve this part of the event, I'll list:

• have a clear "volunteer central" -- we said we'd help with the 2nd shift weeks ago but then as it event neared, I couldn't find out when said 2nd shift started.

• assure adequate food is available -- eggs, sausage,

even butter ran short. Predicting how much to have is impossible but it should be possible to have an arrangement with the supplier to take back unused, unopened, properly chilled product or fined a restaurant that will take excess; Chapter 54 members are major customers of the Lake Elmo restaurant.

- full-price for less-than-full breakfast -- there should be a plan and someone responsible to reduce the price as soon as items become unavailable. I can't help but believe repeat business is lost because of a perception of "poor value" by those denied the full array on offer.
- most important -- have an overall "breakfast manager", clearly identified, who has a list of all jobs and can assign people (we had to search for something to do and stood around idle for too long) and make decisions on the fly, e.g., price reduction, when to start closing table, etc.
- perhaps they already exist, but a "checklist" for each function of what needs to be done, in approximate order, for

each element of the whole breakfast would be helpful. This would make it much easier for new people to step in and learn the ropes quickly.

I offer these comments in the spirit of helpfulness. I hope they are taken as such. Unfortunately, I'm not able to get involved in the management of the event.

It was great to see so many families in attendance at this year's Aviation Day! My "Kidventure" table was visited by youngsters ranging in age from 2 to 16; all of them eager to try their hand at making the best ever paper airplane.



This year we had two new books of designs that include some amazing planes – some of them are incredibly difficult but really intriguing. The older kids enjoyed looking through the books and selecting something that they had not tried before. The younger ones were happy making a basic plane, decorating it and test flying it.

I added some great sparkly stickers to my supply; we used them both for decoration and to achieve good weight and balance. Many of the kids got a chance to test fly their planes and then adjust the elevators or nose weight to achieve longer flight, higher flight or aerobatic maneuvers!

We were inside the hangar this year due to the wet ground conditions and the wind on the field. This gave us a great test flight area behind the vendor tables. Next year I would like to be in the same position, and would also like to mark a "test flight" area on the floor. The kids could compete for longest flight, aerobatic flight, and maybe best "paint job". I would need a volunteer (or two) to supervise the test flying and to keep track of results. For prizes I think I could get a bookstore to donate paper airplane books. It would also be great to have an extra helper at the table who could help the younger kids make their planes and to help keep the activity moving.

Most of the student volunteers from Farnsworth got a chance to stop by, I really enjoyed talking with them – bright young children who know a lot about aviation and really love their school. Several of them told me about their trip to Oshkosh (the field trip that we help to fund); without exception they said it was the best thing they had ever done! How gratifying to know that we have been able to help this happen for these kids. The pancake breakfast is a lot of work for everyone, but knowing that the money we earn makes such an impact on a child makes it all worth while!

EAA Chapter 54 Minutes August, 2010

Leif Erickson, President called the meeting to order. Twenty three people including officers attended the meeting. There was one guest who joined at the meeting, Dennis Wegner is building a RANS and keeps his plane on the Lake Elmo airport. Another guest John Corrigan from Hudson WI, is a student pilot with 16 hours so far. He is looking for networking opportunities.

Chair Reports:

Art Edlund – Farnsworth school is starting again in September—there will be opportunities to help them out. Farnsworth students helped out at the Aviation Day – very helpful. Ground school is scheduled to begin in February 2011.

Dave Becker – There are several small Young Eagle events scheduled in addition to the large monthly events. There may be more that pop up – stay tuned to the Google Groups Email list for additional opportunities to volunteer as a pilot or ground crew.

Tom Gibbons – Always looking for news and articles about accomplishments or events with member's aviation activities. Thanks to the recent contributors.

John Renwick – Four new members in July, total 141 paid in full members. All are getting email notifications. John re-affirmed that members must join the Google Groups to get all the club information quickly and efficiently. He always sends an invitation when members join or re-new their memberships.

The program for the evening was a review of Oshkosh AirVenture from the member's point of view. Paul Rankin presented a detailed slide show of his experience with the Bamboo Bomber getting in and out of Oshkosh. Tom Gibbons reported from his point of view, ground operations in the Warbirds area. Jeff Hove also had a slide show of new and interesting aviation products he saw during the show.

Much fewer planes flew in because the grounds were so wet there was no place to park the planes. The camp grounds were also too wet for motor homes and campers - they stayed in large store parking lots around the city.

Something new included a night time air show. In spite of the weather the attendance overall was just slightly lower than last year.

Business meeting:

Treasurers Report was approved unanimously.

Secretaries Report / Minutes were also approved unanimously.

A new Secretary is needed for the remainder of the term (September – December) because Dale Seitzer has accepted a job which will prevent him from performing the duties. Someone may volunteer, several may agree to help or the President can assign someone to fill the role until elections.

Dale Rupp Memorial Discussion:

The EAA Memorial Wall will include the name and date for \$350, A quarter brick at the Brown Arch is also \$350. We also discussed some other options, questions were answered and the issue was put for a vote – the vote was unanimous for the EAA Memorial Wall – Leif indicated it would be done before AirVenture next year.

We must consider alternatives to the banquet – new ideas are welcomed. We need to form a committee to consider the choices for an annual social activity for members.

The first day at Oshkosh, I shadowed him as he visited as many manufacturers of the equipment in his two airplanes as he could. My feet hurt from standing on concrete all day long.

The second day, I told him I'd meet him late afternoon. I went walking the flight line and found myself touring the ultralight area, daydreaming about what kind of airplane I'd have if I got one. I'd always threatened to build an airplane again when I retired.

That was August. By September I took 6 hours of instruction to get current and passed my flight review. Then I started shopping for an airplane, and settled on my Tornado II.

It took me two weeks to fly it home from Nevada, due to weather.

I've really enjoyed the Tornado. I think it's the most bang for the buck for an airplane that can go cross-country, and yet is good on grass fields.

What is your favorite airplane to fly? **My Tornado. I've been to Sun & Fun in Florida, to Colorado, Ohio, along with Oshkosh since I got the airplane. I like to go cross-country to places I've never been, with camping gear in the back of the airplane.**
