These two books are being donated to the EAA Chapter 54 Library. Reading a fun aviation related book is a great thing to do on a cold nasty winter night. There are plenty of interesting books and many magazines you can check out for fun and education. Here are two local aviation books for you to consider.

Bush Pilots, Legends of the Old and Bold by Bob Cary and Jack Hautala.

The book is a collection of stories from Bush pilots right here is our own back yard. Most of the stories are from pilots in Northern Minnesota. The stories are real, factual stories of pilots who are real people with fascinating settings and action.

They describe the events and situations in a light easy to read manner with enough detail to make it interesting but not too much that makes it seem like it takes all day to get to the point. You won't learn how to do short field landings on a float plane but you can almost see the action on lakes and rivers and small turf runways and field roads.

There are fun stories, dangerous stories and even stories of pilots who were too bold to be old.

Winging it—at a Country Crossroads, The ups and downs of Minnesota's first real

airport by Roger Bergerson is another local author with an even more local story. There are tons of historic photos of Minnesota aviation pilots and planes. The central theme is the activities, pilots and planes at an old airport that is now a bunch of houses in Falcon Heights, the Curtiss Northwest Airport.

This is another quick read with references to real locations and actual Minnesotans. We've come a long way as pilots and we are, at the same time, not that different from early aviation pioneers.


That next Saturday, Jim and Rhonda were hosting what he


