Next time you visit the clubhouse, notice the ceiling-mounted data projector. Rob Barros, our new Education Director, provided the technical advice on where to mount it and the cable requirements. Dave Fiebiger built the actual mount and installed the cables. I think the new location will be a huge asset for anyone using the projector.



It eliminates the hassle of moving the AV Cart, locating and setting up the projector, and connecting the cables. The cables dangled between the AV cart and computer where they were easily bumped and the connections pulled loose. Also, simplified is the shutdown and storage routine.

The computer has been relocated to the front table. To use the projector one simply starts up the computer and presses the projector's remote control power button. Shut down of the projector is accomplished with two button pushes on the remote. One is to shut off the lamp and the other to confirm that action. The projector will shut off automatically when it has sufficiently cooled. There are a few minor tweaks yet to fix, but the computer and projector are fully functional in their current state.

The next improvement, to accommodate our upcoming ground school courses, is to reconfigure the clubhouse as a classroom. That will require purchasing several new student tables and temporarily relocating the existing round tables to our storage area. For seating, we should use the chairs that Jeff Hove donated to the chapter last spring. The suggested classroom configuration was displayed in a recent newsletter. I think the new layout will provide a much improved classroom environment for our future pilots.

Congratulations to the new officers and directors that were elected at the November meeting. They are capable leaders and will be provide responsible, forward-looking leadership for the next two years. Please give them your full support as they go forward in the new roles.

For myself, I am very proud to have served as the Chapter president for the past two years. I thank everyone for their support and dedication to the Chapter's programs and mission. We boarded the Cirrus and fired up the engine, at that point Dave began to push buttons. Programming the flight systems, I believe they call it. I followed along as best I could, but I have to admit that I am still most comfortable back in the steam gage age. Bye and bye, all the buttons were pushed, knobs tuned and screens saved and it was time to fly.

That Cirrus is one nice airplane. After takeoff, Dave engaged the automatic pilot and it flew us over to Eau Claire and then it few a perfect instrument approach onto Rwy 22. We just sat there and the airplane did all the work. Dave did take over at 200 ft and made the landing but I think the Cirrus might have done that too if he had let it!

We had a nice breakfast at EAU and talked about airplanes, hearing aids and other important



stuff like that. After breakfast it was time to head back to Lake Elmo. By the time we got to 21D, I had figured out how to read some of the glass panels.... well sort of. I think that the only piece of on board electrical equipment that I could operate without help was the 2 cell flash light in the seat back pocket.

Take a close look at the photo of the instrument panel....it is showing a 153 Knot ground speed. We did have a little tailwind, but still that's moving pretty good for a plastic airplane!

Thanks Dave for a mighty good ride.

The meeting started earlier than normal because the Chapter hosted a WINGS one-credit Basic Knowledge seminar presented by Airworthiness FAA Safety Team Manager Jim Niehoff. Approximately 20 WINGS program participants attended that were not members of EAA or Chapter 54. The seminar/program was titled "Owner/Operator Responsibilities in Aircraft Maintenance". It described the FAA's definition of airworthiness and the owner/pilot's responsibility to ensure that their aircraft meets that definition. Jim also described the applicable FAR's that must be complied with to ensure that all required paperwork for inspections and maintenance is properly completed and documented. Jim also described the FAA's commitment to general aviation safety and the benefits of WINGS program participation.

The meeting was called to order at 8:45 by Leif Erickson

We have completed our regularly scheduled 2011 year of flying Young Eagles. Our unofficial year's total, including Young Eagles flown by members flying kids outside of our scheduled events, is about 170. I want to thank all the pilots and ground support people who made this year another safe and successful one.



Please welcome **Linda Amble** as Chapter 54's new **Young Eagle Coordinator**. I wish Linda well in her new position and hope all members and volunteers give her the same support you gave me. I know Linda will do a great job as Young Eagle Coordinator.

It is now time again to submit names of prospective candidates to attend any one of the three categories of EAA Air Academy camps listed below for the 2012 sessions. If you know of a young person who you feel is a good candidate for our Chapter 54 to sponsor, send the candidate's name and contact information to Linda Amble at youngeagles@eaa54.org by January 1, 2012. Chapter 54 sponsorship means that our Chapter 54 will pay for the remainder of the tuition after the parents pay for the deposit. Deposit amounts are \$100 for Young Eagles camp ages 12-13, \$150 for Basic camp ages 14-15, and \$200 for the Advanced camp ages 16-17. If we get more candidates than we can comfortably sponsor, we will have a selection process to select the number we can sponsor. We pay for this sponsorship by using Young Eagle credits issued by EAA for each child flown by pilots who have flown 10 or more kids during the previous year and the remainder money comes from our bank account.
