Who is Civil Air Patrol

Flight numbers include the number for the state, Minnesota is 21, the planes in a squadron are number sequentially.

The Civil Air Patrol was formed in 1941, there were several transitions, but by 1948 they settled as an auxiliary of the Air Force. Their mission is homeland security, rescue and youth development.

Their first function is emergency services: search and rescue, homeland security, counter-drug, humanitarian services, and AFROTC flights.

Cadet programs are designed to teach leadership and physical fitness through activities and school programs.

Aerospace education is done by the CAP members within the squadron, and by members going out to schools, events and programs to speak and deliver programs. They also recruit teachers to teach aerospace

EAA Chapter 54

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The Civil Air Patrol has 4 groups in Minnesota, there is a strong organization headed up by a board of governors. There are 8 regions in the country, we are in the North Central Region. There are squadrons in every state, including Alaska and Hawaii! A squadron must have a minimum of 8 members to charter and then it is expected that the squadron will grow and recruit new senior members.

The national budget is \$31,109,000. There are 530 aircraft, 990 vehicles, 4,500 radios, 8,100 mobile radios in the national fleet. All planes have the same color scheme, making them identifiable. The planes are purchased by the national headquarters.

CAP is acquiring Cessna 182s with the glass cockpit, they have 50 factory trained CAP instructor pilots for that technology. They have one of these planes at Fleming field. They have a "Spectral Imaging" system in a Gippsland GA-8; it is on an Archer platform and helps with search and rescue.

The National Operations Center serves as a centralized coordinating facility, but does not do centralized tasking. When necessary they will get the USAF approval, coordinate pilots, flights, and activities. They coordinate the rescue activities and disaster relief and can coordinate assistance from other wings. They channel and consolidate mission reports.

They can fly over an area and take photos with digital imaging so that the photos can be used to assess the extent of the damage. The Archer uses Airborne Real-time cueing hyperspectral enhanced recon. The software has built in recognition for certain characteristics of airplanes (such as the shape of a wing) that make it more efficient at identifying lost planes.

After 911 the CAP was the first nonmilitary flights allowed over the attack area; they also flew carrying supplies and conducting observation. They conduct exercise with FEMA to practice for disasters and test disaster management plans.

After the four hurricanes of 2005 they conducted over 1048 air sorties, gathering photos to evaluate the extent of the damage. Katrina was far and away the most devastating. These sorties can be for observation of the damage as well as looking for people who might need rescue.

Aerospace education involves 1,623 Aerospace Education Members and reaches nearly 50,000 youth. Educational materials, thematic units for use in schools and a textbook have been developed and are used for programs with children of all ages. There are 7 National Flight Academies among a wide range of cadet activities that also include 15 aerospace career courses, 16 leadership activities, a national cadet competition, cadet orientation flights and region/wing summer encampments. The Minnesota wing has a glider and is one of the leaders in the nation for gliding. The St. Croix wing sponsors a week long camp for gliding and the cadets can get almost complete their license during the week. Glider flying is an extremely useful training, pilots who have glider training tend to be calmer in emergencies.

Cadets have a broad range of career choices available to them all across the country, careers include aviation careers and leadership careers. An International Air Cadet Exchange is available, including a trip to Europe! The cadets wear uniforms provided by the Air Force.

Captain Nicole Malachowski, the first female pilot in the US Air Force Thunderbirds started as a CAP cadet. While some cadets may go on to military careers, others will choose careers in private sector aviation. Cadets can become Cadet Officers, if they choose to join the military, they will go in at a slightly higher level, they may also be considered for the officer prep schools by achieving the Spots award.

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Cadets may also consider a career as chaplains and have opportunities to learn through their experience in CAP by assisting the Air Force Chaplain Service. The requirements are the same as for the Air Force Chaplains.

Missing person searches often utilize CAP cadets and officers, participation is voluntary but must be approved by parents; parents may place restrictions on their child's participation.

Public Outreach is an important part of building awareness of the Civil Air Patrol and its programs dedicated to service. A great deal of media attention has focused on the contributions of CAP. There is a website providing additional information along with a regularly published magazine. Website is www.cap.gov/join.

Our local chapter meets Thursday nights; interested persons are invited to visit a couple of meetings. There is a membership fee and a

background check including fingerprinted will be completed before an applicant is allowed to join. Since members will be working with youth, the background check is always conducted. A good driving record is also required so that the member can acquire a CAP driver's license which allows them to drive the CAP vehicles.

Many activities and opportunities for participation and contribution exist within the organization. Participants in searches might fly a plane, act as observer in a plane, participate in a ground search or the communications among all search team members. May opportunities exist for persons who would like to lead education programs, to manage public affairs or recruit new members.
