Marlon Gunderson: Cozy Building and Flight Report



Marlon did a great job at laying out the what and why for his decision process that lead to selecting the Cozy as his project.

He explained how Burt Rutan's Long Eze was redesigned as the Cozy. Like most amateur built experimental airplanes, Marlon described the resources, problems and solutions to problems with the airplane.

He described the capacities, performance and flying characteristic of the fiberglass, canard pusher aircraft.

He also talked about having two airplanes—one slow and one fast, as the perfect combination for him. To me, having two planes is twice the maintenance and costs for the same amount of flying time.

Marlon continues to fly off the 40 hours and fixing little squawks as he notices them.

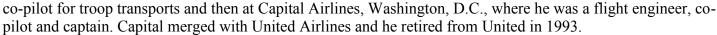

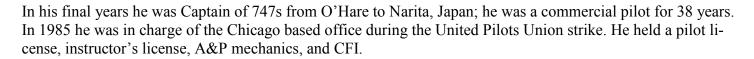

Robert Hagan Pike age 84 of Lake Elmo, MN passed away suddenly on Wednesday, April 4, 2018 due to a heart problem. Bob was born in Jersey City, NJ Sept. 12, 1933. He grew up in Teaneck, NJ and graduated from the Englewood School for Boys in Bergen, NJ. He said he remembers hanging off the airport fence when he was four years old and he learned to fly at Little Ferry Seaplane Base in New Jersey on the Hackensack River at age 16 in 1949.

Bob graduated from Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University in Florida in aviation maintenance, and he bought and sold about 14 or 15 small airplanes in his lifetime. He started his airline career as

Lake Elmo Airport News

Hello 21D pilots,

The MAC noise office received some feedback from the Afton area that we should all be aware of. Please regard Afton as a noise-sensitive area. We should fly no lower than 1000 feet AGL in the area shown in yellow on the MSP Terminal Area Chart south of I-94 and west of the St. Croix river. If you can be higher than 1000', please do so.

For that matter, it might be a good idea to consider any yellow "populated place" on the chart as "congested," per FAR 91.119, and maintain at least 1000' separation when flying over them, -- or, if possible, avoid overflying them as much as you can.

This was the complaint, this time, dated April 2nd:

"I very much oppose expanding the Lake Elmo airport. Besides the points made in today's Pioneer Press article, I am sick and tired of airplane noise! We live in Afton in the flight path from that airport and never thought we would have so much noise! These relatively small planes fly quite low and ruin our peaceful tranquil setting. So much of this traffic appears to be recreational flying- on nice summer days when you're outdoors trying to enjoy nature. The main reason we live in Afton was to escape airplane noise from the Twin Cities 20 years ago!!!

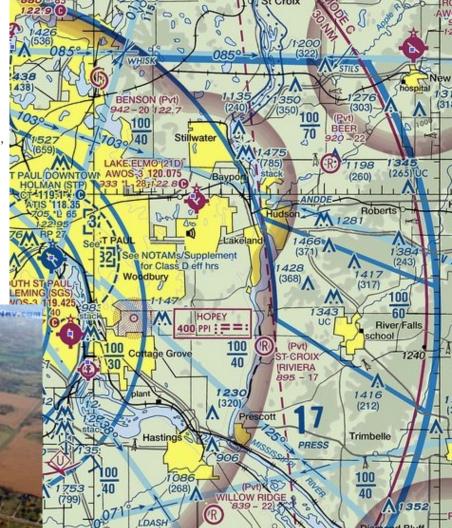
I was surprised that noise was not included in that article as a consideration. How fair is it that all the people who have to tolerate that noise do not benefit a whit from the airport!?!?!?!?! All of the Washington County surveys asking people why they live here is for an appreciation of nature and a peaceful lifestyle. I

honestly do not understand why a commercial venture such as an airport should have such a BROAD impact that extends miles beyond what most people think of— the immediate Lake Elmo airport neighborhood.

Please do not expand this airport, it's not needed given that Holman field is under used (recent Pioneer Press article said this), so we do not need any more metro area "relief."
