EAA Chapter 55 – Board of Directors Meeting - January 10, 2024

→ The meeting was called to order by President Rick Laub at 7:02pm. In attendance were Rick Laub, Gilda Tucker, Drew Seguin, John Kuchar, Gabe

Blosser, Ken Drewyor, Bob Clark, Jeff Shaud, Gary Nicola, with guests Doug Koons and Michael Weck. Absent were Greg Hover, Dave James, Warren Miller, and Michael Rosencrans. \rightarrow There was no secretary's report for December. Due to lack of a quorum, there was no meeting. \rightarrow The Treasurer's Report was explained in detail by President Rick Laub, bringing everyone present a greater understanding of the forms and their meaning. + Treasurer Drew Seguin was called upon a few times to explain some more in depth aspects of the report. We came out of the 2023 in the black. A motion was made by Gilda Tucker; seconded by Gabe Blosser to accept; motion was approved. \rightarrow Doug Koons reported that the Cal Hayslette, our Ray Scholarship recipient has yet to complete his final flight review, due to unfavorable weather. \rightarrow There was a brief discussion about the code box at the entrance gate. Rick contacted Capital Region Airport Authority to see if something could be done to make entrance easier for guests during meetings and open hanger parties. All agreed that it is a hindrance but no permanent solution was forthcoming. \rightarrow Rick mentioned that there is a new Google phone number that allows direct access at the gate to Rick's phone. The number is 616-755-6255. → Jeff Shaud mentioned that there was no Youth Group activity in December due to unfavorable weather and the holidays. \rightarrow The Close Out Sign-Up for this year is as follows: February – Gilda Tucker, March - Gabe Blosser, April - Drew Seguin, May -

Jeff Shaud, June – Gary Nicola. July through December sign -ups will be delayed until the snow birds return. \rightarrow Don Burt is re-covering his Maule M4 with Oratex Fabric. An Oratex specialist will be on hand after the Saturday member meeting to demonstrate how the fabric is applied. Meet after the program Saturday in Don's hanger. It's the large brown hanger near the entrance. \rightarrow Doug Koons announced that EAA National is offering \$1 million annually in new scholarships to Young Eagles aged 16 to 19. (Scholarships are for those in the continental US only) The funds are for those obtaining a flying license and/or planning a career in aviation. Applicants apply directly to EAA national headquarters on line. Doug will be sending out an email to all members regarding this. The deadline for applicants applying for 2024 is March 1st. \rightarrow Drew noted that in 2023 there were 103 chapter members (including life members). As of this meeting there were 56 renewals for 2024. The renewal deadline is February 15th. Gilda and Drew worked together (prior to this meeting) to come up with ideas and suggestions of how to facilitate greater participation of members throughout each month. Gilda also discussed the issue with Vickie Vandenbelt, our Membership Coordinator. Drew suggested a brainstorming session where members could come up with ideas for events and trips. Several ideas were written on the white board from board members. The list will be added to at the member's meeting Saturday. Drew suggested that attending outside events as a group with someone other than one of us driving would be more enjoyable and relaxing. To this end Gilda came up with some quotes from Dean Transportation. A 50 passenger bus can be chartered for a flat rate of \$85, with a four hour minimum through the week and a six hour minimum on Friday and Saturday. A charter tour luxury coach from Dean is also available at a greater cost for destinations further away and for overnight trips. \rightarrow Following up on a suggestion by a chapter member at the December meeting, Gilda created a Member Profile form. Compiling ideas from several members, it gives a brief synopsis of the member's aviation experience, area of expertise, outside interests and a "dream question". (Dream question to be explained at the member's meeting). The form would include a picture (mug shot) of the member. The purpose of the profile is to allow members to become better acquainted with one another and to facilitate knowledge of each other's area of expertise, as a way to help each other with

build projects, etc. The form will hitherto be known as "Member Spotlight". Each month in the Wingtips Newsletter two to three members will be featured. → "Ladies Coffee Break" is an idea Vickie came up with to describe a "ladies only" gathering for the female members of the chapter. {I (Gilda) think it would also be ok to include the wives of male members of our chapter.} No plans have been formulated as of this writing. → Comic Relief. Gilda brought up the idea of including an aviation themed joke or comic in the newsletter. It is noted that two jokes were included in the recent newsletter. → The meeting was adjourned at 8:13pm.  \rightarrow The meeting was called to order at 9:32am by President Rick Laub. There were sixteen people present including three guests. \rightarrow The National Anthem was sung after which Rick thanked Doug Koons, the lone member who prepared breakfast. The February breakfast team includes: Gregg Harris, Dave Groh, Tom Schroeder, and Scott Basil. \rightarrow The three guests were: Guy Juntunen, a pilot from Webberville; John Iversen, a former Olds Forge flyer and current mission coordinator of the Mercy Flyers East; and Leightin Weck, son of member Michael Weck. \rightarrow The Secretary's Report for December is in the January 2024 Wingtips Newsletter. A motion was made by Dave Trojan to accept the minutes; seconded by Doug Koons; motion carried. \rightarrow The Treasurer's Report for December was read by Drew Seguin, along with a reminder that chapter dues are to be paid before February 15th. A motion was made by Margie Clark to accept the report; was seconded by Jeff Shaud; motion carried. \rightarrow The Youth Group

update by Jeff Shaud was that there were no meetings in December. The meeting scheduled for tomorrow is cancelled due to the blizzard. When the meetings resume, work will continue on current projects. Also in the planning is a possible tour of the Waco Aircraft facility in Battle Creek. \rightarrow Doug Koons stated that Ray Scholarship recipient Cal Hayslette has yet to complete his final flight review due to unfavorable weather. In the mean time he is keeping up his skills on a simulator. The Ray Scholarship for 2024 is still indefinite. The final word will come in March. \rightarrow Doug mentioned that Cal is part of the success story of our Young Eagles program, as is Chloe Miner. Both Cal and Chloe were initiated into aviation by a Young Eagle flight. Cal is planning on obtaining a commercial pilots license and flying large passenger jets. Chloe has just completed her instrument rating and obtained a commercial pilot license all within the last three months! \rightarrow Doug got word this week from EAA National that they are awarding \$1million annually in new scholarships to Young Eagles ages 16 to 19. Monies are for obtaining pilots license and/or pursuing training for a career in aviation. Applicants apply on line directly to EAA headquarters. The deadline for applying for 2024 is March 1st. \rightarrow Jeff Shaud was awarded Member of the Year by Deanna McAlister, last year's Member of the Year. Other awards were given to the officers and volunteers of the chapter last year: Margie Clark - President, Doug Koons - Vice President, Drew Seguin – Treasurer, Terry Lutz – Young Eagles Flight Leader, John Bobcik – Webmaster, Margie Clark - Young Eagles Chairman, Connie Bobcik -Young Eagles Co-Chairman, and Deanna McAlister – Newsletter Editor. Mike Rosencrans was awarded for his contribution to the Young Eagles events as ground crew on the runway. \rightarrow Doug Koons mentioned that we are in need of replacing the roof on the hanger where we have our meetings. The current roof is eighteen years old, and is starting to show signs of minor leaks. Commercial companies charge \$22 - \$28,000. We can do the work ourselves for \$4 - 5,000. \rightarrow Margie Clark reminded members of the May 18th Young Eagles Event at the Owosso Airport, which our Chapter will conduct. Set-up is at 8:30am. Flight registration begins at 9am and goes until noon. Pilots and ground crew are needed, especially ground crew. \rightarrow There is still no word from Capitol Region Airport Authority in Lansing regarding a date for a Young Eagles event at their location. \rightarrow Our Young Eagles events are the second

Saturday of June, July, and August, immediately following our Member Meeting. → Margie mentioned that funds from EAA National are given to our Chapter (and all Chapters) based upon the number of Young Eagle flights. Funds are for the sole use of promotion of the Young Eagles events. Pilots donate their time and all associated with the flights. \rightarrow Gilda Tucker presented a Member Profile Form designed to help members become better acquainted with one another and to highlight areas of expertise, interests, and goals. The form is fairly short and will include a picture of the member. Known as "Member Spotlight" the goal is to have two or three members featured each month in the newsletter. Gilda will contact members to fill out the forms. \rightarrow A brainstorm session was initiated by Rick where members were asked to mention any event, program, tour, or trip that they would like to see take place in our chapter. All ideas were written down and will be sent out in questionnaire form to determine member interest. The goal is to come together as a chapter at times other than monthly meetings and Young Eagle events. \rightarrow Terry Lutz mentioned the Open Hangar Party in his hangar on Saturday, February 3rd. Musical entertainment will be provided by Gilda Tucker. An antique aircraft recognition contest will be part of the festivities. Light refreshments will be served. The event is from 11am-1pm. All are invited. \rightarrow A question was raised by Michael Weck regarding use of the simulator sitting in the corner of the member hanger. The simulator is available for use. Jeff Shaud is the most knowledgeable at to its operation. \rightarrow A reminder was given that immediately after Dave Trojan's presentation today, there will be a demonstration of Oratex fabric in Don Burt's hanger. Oratex Fabric Installation Demonstration – January 13, 2024

After the January member's meeting and presentation, several of us made our way to the large hanger where Don Burt's Maule M4 is housed. Tom had flown in the night before from Walsilla Alaska, about 400 miles northwest of Anchorage. Tom is an independent installer of Oratex, a polyester fabric developed about fifteen years ago. Don hired him to install Oratex fabric on his plane this week. The company Tom works for is a German company called Better Aircraft Fabric. The company has been in business about twelve years. The fabric is paper thin, yet very durable. It is glued unto the fuselage with a heat gun. The fabric conforms to whatever it is attached to. It both expands and stretches to meet the demands placed upon it. The fabric costs \$150 per linear meter. The cost to cover a plane the size of Don's runs about \$10,000. I (Gilda) have a small sample of the fabric I will bring to the next member meeting. Don's project will be complete within a week. Photos follow, PAGE 9 and 10.

So, please take a minute to record your flight activity wherever you go flying – even if it's just to poke a couple of holes in the sky !!

EXPENSIVE HAMBURGERS By Bill Purosky/Doug Koons

Not much flying this month due to lots of fog, rain and low ceilings. This is also the month that Doug and I do our annual condition inspection. We tear the plane apart down to the bones, inspect all of it in detail and then put it all back together. He has returned the plane to flying service since he holds the repair certificate, and we are back to flying again for another year.

On 4 January, 2024, Doug and I decided to fly to Harrison, Clare County (80D). We had never flown into this airport and were looking forward to visiting it. Reportedly, there is a restaurant on the field. It was about an hour flight at our indicated 120 knots with a light head wind. The cloud deck was solid at about 3500 agl so no sun in our eyes on the way or back. The overall runway length of 18/36 paved

runway is 2978 feet. Both ends of the runway have displaced thresholds. The length beyond the displaced thresholds for 18 is 2505 feet and for 36 is 1826. Plenty of room for our Glastar. The winds were about 5 knots from the north so I landed on 36. My first approach was too high so we did a missed and went around the pattern. Nailed it on the second try. Now the fun begins. The restaurant is located on the north east side of the airport with no paved taxiways. We had to taxi over grass to get there about a quarter mile from the closest point on the paved runway. This was like taxiing on a washboard. Holding full back pressure on the stick to lighten the nose as much as I could, it was still bone shaking. Tried the grass runway, a blue marked taxiway and everything in between but all had us bumping and banging. I would hate to do this in an all metal tail wheel plane. The restaurant is Jackies Airport Restaurant. It is also where they keep the airport records for you to sign in to let folks know that you were there. I signed in and we took a seat. There was a very complete list of food for either breakfast or lunch. Since it was past 11 am, we ordered lunch. There were 8 different soups to choose from and I can attest the beef barley was very good. In addition, Doug and I both ordered sandwiches which were good as well. In addition, there were 8 home made pies to choose from but since this was close to the holidays where both Doug and I admittedly ate too much, we both passed. Back at the airplane, Doug checked the oil and he fired it up for a return bumpy taxi to 36 for takeoff. It was great to get back on pavement! Doug had a very light tail wind for the trip back to TEW. Clouds were a little higher at their bases on the way home. Ran through a little light snow but nothing to worry about and nothing to limit the visibility. The trip home was 6 minutes shorter in time due to the slight tail wind. During the refueling at TEW, we couldn't get the ground wire to release from the reel so fueled the plane without grounding. I called CRAA and reported the problem.










Photos from Oratex fabric demo
