

Notes from Cape JubyBy Terry L. Lutz, Chapter 55 Flight Advisor

The Global Positioning System (GPS) has made a huge impact on aviation, with a similar effect on the marine and automotive worlds. The products of one manufacturer in particular are produced in Taiwan, the Republic of China, which is an island off the coast of mainland China. Following WWII, Chiang Kai-shek fled the mainland to avoid communist rule, and settled with his followers on Taiwan. While the majority of major business agreements today are made on the mainland, the division between communist China and the Republic of China remains.

In 1983, an avionics engineer working for Bendix-King Avionics in Olathe, Kansas named Gary Burrell hired a Taiwanese engineer who had experience working for NASA and the US Army on the Global Positioning System. His name was Min Kao, and while at Bendix-King he led the team that developed the first GPS navigation system to be certified for navigation by the FAA.

Kao was visiting friends on Taiwan and presented his idea for starting a company to a Taiwanese investment banker. He was assured that launch funds would be available. Burrell and Kao invested their own savings and secured additional capital in Taiwan, and after raising \$4 million, they launched the business in Lenexa, Kansas. In 1995, sales reached \$105 million and by 1999 the company had captured nearly 50% of the US market for GPS systems. In 2006, the company reported *revenue* of \$1.03 billion.

The company was originally named ProNav, but after a lawsuit by a company with a similar name, GARy Burrell and MIN Kao changed the name to GARMIN. Had you purchased stock in Garmin when the company went public in 2000, you would have paid \$10/share. After peaking at \$120/share in 2004, it is worth about \$32/share today, with products made in Taiwan, and not on the Chinese mainland.

Like many RV builders, I spend quite a bit of time on the Vans Air Force website. There is always a lot of interesting reading to be found, along with many, many technical tips for building and maintaining the RV fleet. I happened across an article a few days ago in which an instructor pilot using standby instruments, the position information on his Apple iPad, and a handheld radio, successfully flew an instrument approach with simulated failure of all the avionics in his Cirrus SR20 (yes, the simulated failures were on his Garmin avionics!). The iPad, a fairly new product from Apple, is revolutionizing consumer electronics. And it has the potential to do the same for pilots of light airplanes.

The Electronic Flight Bag, or EFB, is a concept that has been pursued by manufacturers, the airlines, and business aviation for the last several years. The idea is to put all the information from your Jeppesen binder, and all the information in the various manuals kept in the cockpit into the EFB. With an internal GPS, moving map display, satellite weather, manuals and approach charts, the iPad can become an EFB. I talked to a guy last week who had Jeppesen charts for the ENTIRE WORLD on his iPad. While it takes some planning to use it in a small cockpit, the information the iPad can provide is limited only by your imagination.

Like any major aircraft program, the A400M military transport requires testing in extreme cold and extreme hot conditions. Since it is winter in the northern hemisphere, we have begun cold weather testing of the A400M in Kiruna, Sweden. Kiruna is known for the largest underground iron ore mine in the world. It is also known worldwide for its IceHotel. After working for long periods in cold conditions, I would want to sleep somewhere warm. Unless the Swedes have invented a new type of ice, the IceHotel is not going to be heated!

Kiruna is above 67degress North latitude, and about 100nm north of the Arctic Circle. It is a little over 1700nm north of Toulouse, and at 480 knots ground speed, it is more than 1 hour flying time north of Stockholm. I flew our A340-300 test airplane into Kiruna last Thursday night with the support personnel and equipment required to conduct the

cold weather campaign for the A400M, which landed about an our after our arrival.

Temperature on the ground was -12C, or about 10F. The aviation weather was reporting 4 miles visibility in light snow and ceiling at 2800 feet. What got our attention was that the Kiruna airport was reporting a runway condition of thin snow over ice with sand. It was completely dark at 1600 as we flew the VOR DME ILS approach to runway 21. Since we are in the test business, we decided to measure the deceleration the anti-skid system could produce with thin snow over ice. We touched down, deployed the reversers and applied full pedal braking down to a full stop. Deceleration was a little worse than what we would expect on a wet runway, and we were able to stop after using a little more than half the 8200-foot runway length.

After landing, I asked Kurt Maki, the Airfield Manager, if we could go out onto the runway and feel the runway surface with our hands (the guy in the picture with shiny stripes on his suit, and no hat...like it wasn't cold or anything). During rollout, we could easily see the centerline markings and joints in the surface. So where was the ice and why had the deceleration been better than expected? Sure enough, when you put your finger down on the surface and polish away a quarter inch of dry snow, there is pure ice below, a coating less than an eighth of an inch thick on the bituminous surface.



The ice forms three ways. During the transition to the Arctic Winter, there is a period where the sun heats the runway and melts a thin coating of snow, which quickly freezes at twilight. In the deepening Winter and lack of sun, the ice becomes permanent. They use large brooms to keep the surface clear of snow, which generate enough heat to melt some of the snow, which then refreezes on the surface. The third source was surprising.

Knowing that the surface was already ice covered, and knowing that at extreme cold temperatures chemical deicers would not work, the Swedes have developed a technique where they mix sand with boiling water and spread it very evenly on the runway surface. The water freezes instantly and traps the sand in the ice that is formed. The result is a skid resistant surface that they can duplicate over and over. And the sand they use is not sand at all. It's finely crushed rock measuring about an eighth of an inch, originating from the tailings of the iron ore mine, so they have an endless supply.

In general, I was quite impressed with the ability of the Swedes to maintain the airport and operate all their equipment in the Arctic. They were friendly, well-organized, and very positive about solving tough problems. The only difficulty we had on departure was that the A340-300 is a long airplane, 197 feet long, and it is kind of difficult to execute a 180 turn into position for takeoff on an ice-covered runway only 148 feet wide. Using a small turning area on the left side, full tiller, and a little thrust on the outboard engine to keep 4-5 knots, we made the turn into position right on centerline and departed for the four hour flight back to Toulouse.



There was no moon last Thursday night, so we turned the instrument lights down as far as they would go, and from FL400 enjoyed the light from the billions of stars of the Milky Way. And had thoughts of warmer weather! When the snow begins to melt in Michigan, and the sun begins to feel warm, remember your fellow aviator and lend a hand when you know that it's needed.

TOP AIR SHOW PERFORMERS MAKE EARLY CONFIRMATIONS FOR EAA AIRVENTURE 2011

EAA AVIATION CENTER, OSHKOSH, Wis. — (Jan. 5, 2011) — Many of the world's top air show performers have already given early confirmations to participate at EAA AirVenture Oshkosh 2011, "The World's Greatest Aviation Celebration," on July 25-31 at Wittman Regional Airport.

ALL-STAR CAST WILL LIGHT UP SKY AS NIGHT AIR SHOW RETURNS FOR EAA AIRVENTURE 2011 Aerobatics accompanied by pyrotechnics, fireworks highlight event's final evening

EAA AVIATION CENTER, OSHKOSH, Wis. — (Jan. 12, 2011) — Fresh off last year's extremely popular debut, the Night Air Show and Fireworks with the "Wall of Fire" return on Saturday, July 30, to light up the sky on the final evening at EAA AirVenture 2011. "It instantly became a signature, must-see attraction at AirVenture, and the perfect way to celebrate the final evening of what will be a week filled with highlights."

Following the Night Air Show, performers will be available for a meet and greet alongside their aircraft. Additional activities surrounding the Night Air Show will be announced in coming weeks through the event's extensive website at www.airventure.org.

Several top-level attractions and events will also commemorate the Centennial of Naval Aviation at AirVenture 2011, which has been classified a Tier 1 event by the U.S. Navy for its year-long celebration. 
