Election Time

This fall we will be electing four new chapter officers. The positions of president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer will all be open. We need candidates for all four positions. AirVenture Oshkosh

This year's event turned out very well. Oshkosh 2015 was very well attended. Quite a few chapter members attended – including a few for the first time! A summary from the EAA website shows: Attendance: Approximately 550,000, with a total attendance increase of approximately 2 percent. Total aircraft: More than 10,000 aircraft arriving at Wittman Regional Airport in Oshkosh and other airports in east-central Wisconsin.

Total show planes: 2,668 (up 1 percent over 2014) – including 1,031 homebuilt aircraft, 976 vintage airplanes, 350 warbirds, 130 ultralights and light-sport aircraft, 101 seaplanes, 30 rotorcraft, and 50 aerobatic aircraft.

Forums and Workshops: A total of 1,048 sessions attended by more than 75,000 people.

Guests registered at International Visitors Tent:

2,299 visitors registered from a record 80 nations. Oshkosh 2016 runs from July 25 – 31. You can look forward to these events at next year's event: Burt Rutan bringing his SkiGull, hoping that the B-29 *Doc* is flying and ready to come to Oshkosh, the 30th anniversary of the RV-6 design, the most successful kit design ever, led by 4,000-hour RV-6A pilot Paul Rosales, anniversary of the F-16 and the centennial year of Boeing. Mark your calendars now!

Third Class Medical

Registration to eliminate the third class medical has been working its way through Congress this summer. Unfortunately legislation could not be passed in time for the August congressional recess. EAA and AOPA will continue to work through the summer to push for a successful conclusion of this bill this fall. The bill has significant support in Congress and came tantalizing close to passage. A recent setback occurred when unexpected opposition was voiced by the Air Line Pilots Association. EAA and AOPA continue to work with congress to reintroduce the bill as a stand-alone bill this fall.

After every visit to Oshkosh, it's easy to say, "That was the best Oshkosh ever!". Well, wait a minute. How can every Oshkosh be the best one ever? The answer is because each visit is in some way unique. It may be in terms of airplanes, or in terms of people who were there, or in terms of presentations and awards, but each one is unique. Oshkosh 2015 was no exception. Everyone will have his or her own personal observations, and here are mine from the world's greatest aviation celebration.

First of all, it didn't rain, and the temperature was just about perfect. If you were camping as we were, the weather was great for sleeping after a long day of kicking tires. Someone said that there was a full scale Spitfire replica on the ramp, so after doing some volunteer work in the sheet metal pavilion on Monday morning, I went looking for it. What I found was absolutely spectacular. On first glance, it IS a Spitfire. But the fuselage is a steel tube structure, skinned with aluminum and flush riveted. It looks just like an all-aluminum fuselage. The unique elliptical wing was created from wood, and only the lack of rivets gave that away. For an engine, the builder used an Allison V-1710 producing around 1,300 hp. The three-bladed propeller was from a DC-3. So while there were some visible differences from the original, the airplane was very much a Spitfire.

While admiring that beautiful British design, four Hatz biplanes pulled into parking next to it. If anyone ever wanted a homebuilt biplane, the Hatz would be the one to buy. Just the right size, with just the right performance, the Hatz is as close to a Waco or a Great Lakes as you can get in a homebuilt. I noticed some differences in their cowlings, and inquired about that to one of the pilots. While all 4 airplanes had O-290 engines, two of them had earlier

versions with a rear-mounted starter. The other two had the later O-290 D2 engines with the large starter ring gear and forward mounted starter, which accounted for a more bulbous nose bowl.



About 3pm on Monday, the Airbus A350 arrived and performed a terrific flight display. The crew landed on Runway 36L and braked so that they could taxi up to and just short of Boeing plaza. When the stairs were in place, out came Airbus test pilots Frank Chapman and Thierry Bourges, along with flight test engineers Sylvie Loisel and Jaime Angoloti, and test flight engineer Bruno Bigand. You may have seen Bruno in the overhead hatch waving the American flag. This was Bruno's last Airbus trip, as he officially retired on July 31st. He was really pleased when someone said he looked like Harrison Ford up there with the flag. I was overjoyed to see my friends and colleagues from France.

On Tuesday, the A350 was open to the public, and once again EAA volunteers made the difference to keep the visitors flowing and secure their strollers and backpacks under the airplane. The Airbus team invited me to join them, and I spent the greater part of Tuesday giving cockpit tours to VIPs, which included any American Airlines or United Airlines pilot, as they would be among the first to fly the airplane in the U.S. Others who came to visit were aerobatic pilot (and former Northwest Airlines pilot) Julie Clark, and Christine Walsh, one of Boeing's test pilots. The next day, a Seattle paper carried the following headline: "Airbus Secrets Revealed on Boeing Plaza".

On Tuesday evening, I hosted my long-time friend (and RV-8 builder) Thierry Bourges at the EAA

Lifetime Members Banquet. The event was held in the EAA museum, and the guest speaker was Gene Kranz, the NASA space flight director who was so firmly in charge during the flight of Apollo 13. The title of his presentation was "Failure Is Not An Option". This was particularly interesting for Thierry, who closely follows space flight activities. Gene gave us a detailed account of how the mission team focused its mind and resources to save the crew, including 3 riskyrocket motor burns to correct the trajectory.

It was amazing to hear about Gene's very young team (some around 30 years of age) as they worked bring Apollo 13 back to earth. They were people with iron wills, brilliant minds, and emotions that refused to accept anything but success. If you happened to walk by the EAA F-86, parked near the Homebuilder's Hangar, you may have noticed the name "My Darling Marta" painted on the nose. That's how Gene's F-86 was painted while he served in post-war Korea. Along with his team and the Apollo 13 astronauts, he

is also the recipient of the Presidential Medal of Freedom, our nation's highest civilian honor.

On Wednesday morning, the A350 was open from 9am until around Noon, and I was able to give a few more cockpit tours to VIPs. While outside on the stairs, I spotted Jeff Skiles and shouted "Hey Jeff!". As he waved, another man turned around and it was the Captain of the Hudson River crew, Sully Sullenberger. Standing next to him was Qantas Airlines pilot Richard DeCrespigny (Captain of the A380 that suffered an engine explosion near Singapore). All three of them came to the cockpit for a look at the A350. Then, as if the day couldn't become any more interesting, Erik Lindbergh, the grandson of Charles Lindbergh, appeared in the cockpit. That evening, I went to a barbecue hosted by the Society of Experimental Test Pilots (SETP). The chief cook (but not bottle washer) turned out to be Jim Doolittle III, and I was somewhat amazed to think that on that day, I had shaken hands with the grandsons of perhaps the two most famous aviators in history.

On Thursday, I taught two more sessions in the sheet metal pavilion, then attended the Homebuilder's banquet in the evening. Each year, EAA and SETP give the "Spirit of Flight Award" to the person who most represents the spirit of research, development, and flight-test. Since the President of SETP was unavailable, I was asked to present the award. It went to a very deserving individual, who I recalled had once ridden a mini-bike down the TEW taxiway, in pitch darkness, with a roman candle shooting fire out the back. An individual who in the past year has set 6 new FAI records for speed, time to climb, and time over a recognized course, in addition to racing an airplane at Reno that he and his new bride worked so hard to develop. Yes, it went to our "own" Elliot Seguin!!


But hold on a second. When I was at the museum on Tuesday evening, I happened to look at the Spirit of Flight Award trophy in the lobby. The 2015 award winner was already engraved on the trophy and, well, um, it read: Lisa Turner. Whoops.... It turns out that EAA presents two awards at the Homebuilder's Banquet, the Spirit of Flight Award, and the Tony Bingelis Award, which is given to an EAA Technical Counselor for dedicated service and significant contributions to members who are building or restoring airplanes. Lisa Turner was selected to

receive the Tony Bingelis Award, and when the brass plates were engraved, the names were somehow switched between the two trophies. We'll get that fixed, Elliot.

Friday was my only real day to kick tires and watch the airshow. The end of the airshow was one to remember. A lot of Viet Nam era airplanes were flown, including the A-1E Skyraider, A-4 Skyhawk, and F-4 Phantom II. The airshow concluded with the flight display of the F-22 (marvelous, truly marvelous), which ended with a rejoin to a Heritage Flight, led by a P-51, with a P-38 and the F-22 on the wing. The P-51 was flown by Vlado Lenoch, and if you watched carefully, his landing was one of the best wheel landings in a Mustang you'll ever see.

After the airshow, we took our chairs to Boeing Plaza, and about that time an American Airlines Honor Flight landed carrying nearly 100 Viet Nam veterans from Washington, DC. These veterans deplaned, walked through a crowd of cheering Americans and were given seats in front of the stage as Gary Sinise and the Lt. Dan Band prepared to perform. With the Viet Nam aircraft as a backdrop and the Goodyear Blimp overhead enjoying perfect weather, the Lt. Dan Band provided the energy and really good feeling about our country that truly is missing in everyday life. I guess for me, that feeling is what really makes each Oshkosh the best one ever.

Have fun for the rest of the summer. The last few weeks have been Pure Michigan, whether it be for flying or watching a sunset. Don't sit down too long, though, because no doubt there's a fellow pilot out there that just might need a bit of help.

TEW RULES & REGULATIONS: CRAA approved a change to the rules and regulations with regard to Unmanned Aircraft Systems. Copy attached.

RAFFLE TICKETS: Vickie Vandenbelt has Mason Area Chamber of Commerce Raffle Tickets available for purchase; \$10.00 each. The MACC has been very good to EAA Chapter 55 in promoting all of our chapter events to the chamber members and to the public. The complete change should be in place by December. DTW will be scheduling some Pilot-Controller meetings in the next months to help communicate to the pilot community.
