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EAA Chapter 55 Board of Directors Meeting, Wednesday, April 10, 2024

meeting was called to order at 7:02pm by President Rick Laub. In attendance were Rick Laub, Gilda Tucker, Drew Seguin, Jeff Shaud, Gabe Blosser, Ken Drewyor, Greg Hover, and Gary Nicola. Absent were, John Kuchar, Warren Miller, Michael Rosencrans, Dave James, and Bob Clark. Non board member present was Doug Koons. → Secretary's Report for March; Greg Hover made a motion to accept the minutes; seconded by Gary Nicola; motion carried. >Treasurer's Report was reviewed by Treasurer Drew Seguin. Specifics of various portions were discussed and explained. Part of the report reflects member dues. Drew noted that there has been a drop in renewal dues received, a few each year since 2022. Discussion ensued over this and what to do to reverse the trend. Nothing definite was decided. Drew is using a new computer format (to compile the report) which is less expensive than the old one, yet accomplishes the same purpose. Gilda made a motion to accept; seconded by Greg Hover; motion carried. Doug Koons gave the Ray Scholarship report. Our most recent winner, Cal Hayslette, has yet to complete his final check flight – due to weather. Part of the problem is that only one flight date can be scheduled at a time. If that date doesn't work out, (mainly a weather issue) there is a two week wait for another flight date. The next flight date for Cal is scheduled for April 19th. >Jeff Shaud mentioned that the last youth meeting was upstaged by a concurrent meeting of the Civil Air Patrol (CAP). Most of the youth are members of CAP. The next youth meeting is scheduled for this Sunday in the builder's hanger. April 28th is Drone Safety Day, an event of Lansing Community College. Our youth group will have an EAA55 table set up there on the West Campus. → C.A.R.D.S., (a local chapter of Model Aeronautics, a national organization) will be invited to present a program for our chapter member meeting in September. → The issue of the roof leak in the chapter hanger was

brought up by Doug Koons. Insurance is the hurdle that must be resolved. EAA doesn't cover maintenance insurance on the buildings. Drew Seguin will check into this issue. The roof needs to be addressed as soon as possible. Board members will have an email meeting upon resolution of the insurance issue, so that we can move forward hopefully before the next board meeting. →Drew Seguin is responsible for meeting closeout this month. → Advertising for Dawn Patrol was discussed. Rick mentioned that Facebook is a very effective advertising venue and plans to take out a Facebook Ad. → Gilda Tucker mentioned that the April Leadership Conference at EAA National is next weekend. She is registered and plans to attend. John Kuchar had planned to attend but is still in rehab at Sparrow Hospital. →Two recent member donations were made to the Newberry Scholarship Fund. One by Terry Lutz and one by Clark Borgess. → Repairing taxi lanes at Mason Jewett Airport begins Monday, April 15th. Rob Bernstein from Capital Regional Airport in Lansing will be attending the member meeting Saturday to explain what to expect. → meeting was adjourned at 8:12pm. → Respectfully submitted by Gilda Tucker, Secretary.

EAA Chapter 55 Membership Meeting, Saturday, April 13, 2024

→ meeting was called to order at 9:30am by President Rick Laub. → After the National Anthem was sung, Rick thanked the breakfast team: Paul Creger, Don McAlister, and Dave Trojan. The breakfast team for next month includes Ralph Gregus, Tim Martinson, Pat Salow, Chloe Miner, and Frank Garcia. → Today's guests include Robert Miller, Claus Buchholz, James Weber, Steve Morena, Rob Bernstein, and Pat Ryan. → There is a correction in the Secretary's Report for March. It was stated that Karen Meirndorf sold 50/50 raffle tickets for \$5.00 each. Actually, the tickets are 6 for \$5.00. Joe Mazadar made a motion to accept the report; Mark Bathhurst seconded; motion carried. (Note: Karen approached Secretary, Gilda Tucker prior to the meeting regarding the correction.) >Treasurer's Report was noted. Gabe Blosser made a motion to accept the report; Greg Hover seconded; motion carried. → Rob Bernstein, Chief Operating Officer at Capital City Airport in Lansing gave a report on the repairing of the taxi lanes at Mason Jewett Airport. The project has been held up over what exactly was to be done; a reconstruction, or a rehabilitation. The

FAA has different guidelines for each. Capital City Airport and the FAA finally came to an agreement on Thursday, April 11th. Funding for the project comes from a five-year grant from the FAA, paid out in \$150,000 annual installments. Each annual installment has a deadline. This year's deadline is in May; thus construction must begin immediately. Work will begin Thursday, April 18th. The project will take approximately two weeks to complete, with a few extra days for touch-up - grass seeding and line painting on the taxi ways. During construction taxi ways #3 and #5 will have continuous access to the runway. All other taxi ways will be closed. Other projects forthcoming include: terminal ramp rehabilitation beginning the summer of 2025, fuel farm gas tank replacement to begin June 2024, and tree removal as an ongoing project. Rob concluded by saying that core samples of the taxi ways will take place Wednesday, April 17th, and may partially block taxi ways temporarily. → Youth Leader Jeff Shaud is absent so there is no youth report. → Doug Koons announced that April 19th is the next date set for Cal to take his final check ride. Cal is our Ray Scholarship recipient who has been trying to complete requirements for obtaining his private license since last fall. → Margie Clark is absent but Rick Laub announced that several pilots are lined up to give rides to Young Eagles in Owosso on May 18th. Additional pilots are welcome if they have completed the Child Protection Form available on the EAA website. >Roof resurfacing is a "must do" project. If we use available manpower from within our own ranks, the project will cost approximately \$5,000. If we hire it done professionally the cost jumps to around \$22,000. Effort is being made to accomplish the task through use of our own manpower. The first step is to power wash the roof. Afterward, new water proof paint can be rolled onto the roof. Doug Koons has taken the lead in this project. He will be available until June. →Gilda Tucker reminded members to fill out and return by email or in person "member profile" forms to her. Each month two members are featured in the Member Spotlight of the newsletter. → Two of our members, Terry Lutz, and Clark Borgess made generous contributions to the Newberry Scholarship Fund. Thank you Terry and Clark! → Relay for Life is coming up soon. June 14th is the start date ending the following day. This is a fund raiser for the American Cancer Society. Proceeds from the sale of 50/50 tickets also go to the American Cancer Society. Karen Merindorf is also selling luminaries

for the relay. Contact her in advance to make your purchase krmdorf@yahoo.com. Frank Garcia was this month's 50/50 raffle ticket winner. Dave Trojan suggested a way to add funds to our coffer. At the upcoming Dawn Patrol breakfast, we could hold a sale of Aviation memorabilia, parts, etc. Members can bring in whatever they have on hand that they no longer want or use to put into the sale. 

APRIL 2024 AVIATION STORIES

<u>PEAK AVIATION, APRIL 8TH ECLIPSE</u> MISSION:

3.5 hours in the air. Motor 120 miles to I95, near Findley & Lima, Ohio, into the center of the zone. Loiter. The disk of darkness approaches. Shut off the engine. Glide silently in dead, cold air. A line of dark races in from the southwest. Blackness envelopes. But from 6,000 feet, a distant horizon shows through as a circle of twilight. Above me, the Sun's crown glows in companionship with Jupiter and Venus. After three, both long and short minutes, the black disk moves on and life returns to the Earth. An experience beyond words, beyond worlds.



This picture is from a video. Unfortunately, the GoPro wasn't running when I thought it was, so the disk of totality was caught only as it moved away to the northeast at 1,500 mph. The zone of totality is shaded in yellow:




MONDAY APRIL 22ND DOWNWIND DASH:

The soaring forecast (from skysight.io) wasn't that great, but I decided to try a distance soaring flight regardless, a downwind dash with strong gusty SW winds. An AIRMET for turbulence was in effect. The air was very dry, 20% relative humidity, hence cumulus clouds to mark lift were lacking until pretty late. So, I waited until 2 pm for more puffies to form. It was a too-exciting start, being that the first takeoff attempt was aborted when a badly timed southerly gust almost put me into the weeds. The reported 240 deg 12G18 was just a guess. But the lift was strong and I shut down the engine about 7 minutes after the second (successful) takeoff run.

My in-air average cross-country speed of ~30 mph was mediocre but a 15-20 kt tailwind gave ~109 miles in 1.9 hours. The good lift band was 6,000 -7,500' with excursions to 4,000 and 8,300' (OAT was -8C degrees up there, and there's zero cabin heat!). Threading the gap between Flint Class C and Detroit Class B airspace was a bit of a challenge, but eventually, NE progress was blocked by the Lake Huron. There was plenty of height and lift remaining to make Bad Ax, but Cu's were disappearing. And I was tired. Turning back from Sandusky City at ~4 pm, I restarted the engine. It took almost as much time to motor back to Mason as to glide up there. The ride at 95 kt was extremely rough, tolerable at 80, but that gave a 60 kt groundspeed. Still, at least three hard negative G jolts were noted upon various parts of my aged body. Worth every moment ...

Chapter Taxi Lane

If you wish to nerd out, here's a link to a quite powerful interactive glider flight analysis program using data recorded on my glide computer. The flight can be replayed like a video, or by clicking the time line, or dragging the blue line to different positions. Shown parameters can be selected on the pull-down menus. "Engine noise" tells when the engine is running. The red line segments on the starting map shows when the computer thinks it's off. Select "3D" and "play" and the flight is re-lived with an outside view of the glider shown over a Google Earth satellite map. It's fun.

April 8th, Doug and I had planned to go back to Seneca County Airport (16G) in Ohio to see the eclipse since that was in the band of total coverage of the sun by the moon. The early morning didn't look too promising, and some cloud cover had developed over night. Doug had broadcast to a number of other flyers that we would be going but only John and Connie had replied in the affirmative. John had mentioned that they would fly into Coldwater (OEB) for lunch about 11:30 am and if the cloud cover was getting less, fly on to Seneca County. This sounded to us to be a great plan, so we joined them. As reported last month, the restaurant there had changed hands and the lunch provided by the new proprietors was quite good. After lunch, we checked the oil and did a preflight and headed east southeast to Seneca. We arrived there about 1 pm with no problem getting in the uncontrolled field. We taxied up to the fuel pumps and topped off since the fuel there was about \$1.00 cheaper per gallon than Mason. They pump it for you even at the cheaper rate. They then put us on line parallel to the runway. John and Connie parked right next to us so we could watch the eclipse together. We had packed chairs and a cooler with snacks and pop to see us through the event. Doug had packed the cooler so all I had to do was eat and drink! By the time we got settled, we counted about 40 aircraft at the airport. The nice part about owning a high wing is that we could sit in the shade but easily lean back and view the sun by looking just past the leading edge of the wing. Perfect! What amazed me most was how bright the daylight was when only a small sliver of sun was visible and then how dark it got when that little sliver was finally covered. Of course, the temperature dropped about 10 degrees and the clouds dissipated. The birds and the insects became totally quiet and I'm sure if the proverbial pin was dropped, we would have heard it. The wind which was reported at 8 knots by their AWOS suddenly died and all was calm. Quite an experience! About a half hour after the total eclipse, Doug and I packed up the furniture and the cooler. We bid John and Connie goodbye and wished them a good flight back and headed home. We had about a one-hour trip and for the first

half the air was smooth. By the second half, the winds remembered to start blowing again and we bounced along in a mild turbulence. The flight back is almost a straight line but we needed to bend it a little to get around the Toledo and Detroit airspace to stay legal. A good time was had by all!

John "Jack" Sheehan, the 102-year-old WWII B-26 pilot I wrote about last month, passed away on April 17th, one month shy of his 103rd birthday. He suffered a fall, resulting in several difficult bone fractures. Jack elected to enter Hospice care and died peacefully with his daughter Lori by his side.

Jack was an amazing man and as sharp as could be right up until he suffered the fall. Imagine getting email messages from someone 102 years old! He was an avid reader, and loved keeping up with corporate news, Boeing in particular. Jack loved the Detroit Tigers and was already enjoying the games so far this year.

Kurt Gubert and I attended his memorial service, which was held at Village at the Oaks in Muskegon, where he had been living for the last several years. Many of the residents spoke about Jack, about is whit, and about his friendly nature. His daughter spoke and said that Jack told her three things that led to his long life:

- 1. Keep moving.
- 2. Make friends with people who are younger than you.
- 3. Never stop serving others.

The ceremony ended with members of the Muskegon VFW post who held up the American flag for everyone to see. Then they precisely folded it in 13 perfect triangles. Then with steel grey eyes, the tallest veteran in the group looked directly at Lori and said these words:

On behalf of the President of the United States, the United States Air Force, and a grateful nation, please accept this flag as a symbol of our appreciation for your loved one's honorable and faithful service.



Jack will serve others for the next three years, as he asked that his body be used for medical science at Michigan State University. After that time, he will be cremated and interred at a family plot in Alabama, RIP Jack.


