EAA Chapter 55 Board Meeting, Wednesday, May 7th, 2025

The meeting was called to order at 7:10pm by President Rick Laub. In attendance were Rick Laub, Gilda Tucker, Drew Seguin, Jon Iversen, John Kuchar, Gary Nicola, Bob Clark, Ken Drewyor, Greg Hover, Jeff Shaud, and Doug Koons. Absent were Warren Miller and Gabe Blosser. Non board members present were Margie Clark, Frank Garcia, Vickie Vandenbelt, Joe Madziar, and Denise Bolen.

The Secretary's Report was noted. John Kuchar made a motion to accept the report and was seconded by Greg Hover. The motion carried. The Treasurer's Report was summarized by Treasurer Drew Seguin. John Kuchar made a motion to accept the report and was seconded by Jon Iversen. The motion carried.

Discussion of Upcoming Events

The first topic of discussion was the two events taking place Saturday, June 14th after the Member Meeting. Young Eagles airplane rides and the Michigan Flight Museum's C-47 Hairless Joe airplane tour and rides are scheduled concurrently. Much discussion ensued over the location of the C-47 set up. Margie Clark, Y.E. Coordinator emphasized that there needs to be a good-sized buffer zone between the two events. It was generally agreed to have the C-47 set up at the eastern side of the airport away from Y.E. events. It was also agreed that the C-47 crew and staff would be welcome to join us for breakfast prior to the member meeting. No other food/meal will be provided other than the usual snacks and drinks provided at the Y.E. event.

The C-47 event is not a Chapter 55 sponsored event, thus insurance concerns are not an issue for the Chapter.

Drew Seguin suggested that a door prize consisting of two tickets for a free ride on the C-47 (worth a combined total of \$360) be drawn out of the pool of volunteers working at the Y.E. event. After much discussion a vote was taken. All were in favor save for one opposed and one abstention. The drawing will take place. Funds will come out of the chapter treasury. When the drawing takes place and when the rides can be redeemed was not discussed.

(Editor's Note: In the days following the meeting, several members had "second thoughts" regarding the fair implementation of the drawing. Via email, it was moved by Rick Laub and seconded by Drew Seguin to abandon the motion. The motion to abandon was passed by a vote of eleven in favor, one opposed, and one abstention.)

Vickie suggested that we offer a dozen coupons for free breakfasts at the MAD event to participants of the Mason Area Chamber of Commerce (of which EAA55 is a member) Golf Outing this summer. The main purpose is advertising. In past years only a small fraction of similar coupons have actually been redeemed. Furthermore, the cost is relatively small – under \$20. It was agreed that twelve coupons could be handed out at the event.

Rick Laub donated \$10 for the cost of gas for the lawn mower.

Young Eagle Report - Margie Clark Volunteers are needed to assemble "goodie" bags given to children after Y.E. flights. Bag filling will take place in the "dining hanger" after the member meeting Saturday. Rick Laub obtained toy airplanes at the recent Leadership Conference he attended in Oshkosh. He has enough to give out to the Y.E. participants. They can be added to the "goodie" bags. Rick mentioned that it was encouraged at the Leadership Conference by the Y.E. National Director to have "online" registration for Y.E. flights. Margie responded that "that works for 8 to 10 people, but we have upwards of 100 of more". It isn't feasible because it requires setting a specific flight time. There are many factors that make nailing down a flight time impractical and virtually impossible.

Young Aviators Report – Jeff Shaud Two meetings took place: April 13th and April 27th. Mark Jacob was on hand to take the kids

27th. Mark Jacob was on hand to take the kids up in his plane but not before giving a ground school and pre-flight educational lesson.

Jeff attended Drone Safety Day on April 26th at LCC. He passed out event flyers and engaged people in youth activities associated with the Y.A.

The upcoming Y.A. meeting falls on Mother's Day. In deference to that special day, the Y.A. meeting will be postponed until May 25th. (Editor's Note: May 25th falls on Memorial Day weekend. Jeff rescheduled the meeting for June 1st in the days following the board meeting.)

Jeff made contact with the coordinator of Eaton County Regional Educational Vocational Education Director, Sarah Jobson. He explained our Y.A. program and emphasized that all are welcome to participate regardless of how near or far away and which county they come from.

Jeff announced his retirement as Y.A. Director effective August 31st. He is actively looking for his replacement as he is relocating out of state.

Gilda Tucker, WingTips Editor, mentioned that she heard indirectly from a member who suggested the format of the newsletter contain more paragraph breaks and other changes to make it easier to read. Gilda has followed protocol and used the format presented her at the onset of her taking over as editor. She agrees with the suggestion and would like to make changes. There were a chorus of voices saying "it's your newsletter, do what you want". That's all she needed to hear. Rick Laub mentioned that he would like a section at the conclusion of the meeting minutes listing all the motions that were passed.

Gilda mentioned that a report received from Michigan U.S. Senator Gary Peters indicates that Selfridge Air National Guard Base is receiving 21 new F-15EX fighter jets and a squadron of 12 KC-46A refueling tankers (to replace the eight aging KC-135 refuelers).

A reminder was given regarding the Warbirds of Glory Museum Open House on May 17th.

Gabe Blosser was not available to give an update on the fire extinguishers he is to have recharged. Rick spoke with him and he is still in process of accomplishing this.

Gary Nicola is responsible for May close-out. June close-out is being handled by Gary Hover. Jeff Shaud is taking on July close-out.

Motions Passed

The Secretary's Report and Treasurer's Report was accepted.

A drawing will take place and a door prize of two tickets to ride the C-17 will be given to a volunteer who worked at the Y.E. event.

The motion to give a door prize of tickets to ride the C-47 was rescinded via email subsequent to the meeting.

Young Eagles Report – Margie Clark Margie began by handing out Certificates of Appreciation to several volunteers from 2024 who were absent at the December Awards Presentations. Those receiving rewards included: Connie Bobcik, Greg Hover, Janet Samson and Vickie Vandenbelt.

There are only two pilots who have signed up to fly Y.E. in June. That isn't enough to handle the number of flights needed. Pilots do not have to be chapter members; however, they do have to be Child Protection compliant and have \$100,000 liability insurance. Pass the word around to any that may be interested and available on June 14th. Mike Rosencrans is in charge of ground crew security. Connie Bobcik will be in charge of registration. Set up is on Friday, June 13th. Many hands make light work. Included in the setup on the 14th Margie would like a static display plane next to the registration table. The pilot would demonstrate the walk around and preflight procedures while kids wait for their turn to fly.

C-47 Hairless Joe

Drew Seguin coordinated with the Michigan Flight Museum to have the WWII C-47 Hairless Joe come to Mason Airport on June 14th. The event will run concurrent with Y.E. but will be set up at the east end of the airport away from Y.E. events. Cockpit tours will be on a donation basis. Rides will be given for \$185/person.

Dawn Patrol

This event takes place Sunday, June 15th. Two people are needed at the airport at 5:00am to help Joe Madziar set up for breakfast. Frank Garcia volunteered on the spot. Another volunteer is needed. Surplus and food expenditures for this event amount to \$1100 including the health and water permits. Vickie has contacted 1500 pilots via Facebook. An advertisement has been submitted to the City Pulse newspaper and multiple flyers have been distributed.

CRAA – TEW TENANT MEETING Summarized by Gilda Tucker

The quarterly tenant meeting hosted by officials from Capital Region Airport Authority took place Wednesday May 7th.

Operations Manager Blake Roy gave an update on cheap flights available: \$79 flights Lansing to Orlando is one example. Others may be viewed by going to "Apple Vacations". Maintenance Manager Steve Ball mentioned that the excessively long 75' fuel hose has been replaced by a 65' hose.

Cameras are being installed around Mason Jewett Airport near the entrance, fuel pumps, etc. They are monitored from the Lansing airport.

A concrete pad is being installed in front of the fuel farm. New wheel chocs have also been installed.

Ramp construction is slated to begin in August. Federal approval is the last hurdle in the process before work begins. Runway grading is scheduled for 2028. State funding (MDOT) is being sought for that project.

A recently installed power outage sensor should alert of power outages.

Utility work is currently taking place along Airport Road to install updated Internet to the airport.

Wildlife: Cameras near the pond by the runway indicates that from January through March, geese, ducks, cranes, small mammals, and a deer were spotted in the area. All were dealt with or eliminated. (Note: A Chapter 55 member suggested that eliminating the pond would eliminate the water fowl; a common sense albeit "politically incorrect" solution.)



May Program Presentation by Dave Trojan

"Secrets of the U-2 Dragon Lady, and the beginnings of Area 51, plus the Search for U-2 #001 the "Dirty Bird". (Summarized by Gilda Tucker)

The U-2A is a WWII reconnaissance jet. It flies at up to 80,000' with a 2,200 mile range. They are still in service. These birds were built and tested in a remote and classified area in the California desert. The area was called "Area 51". The site is nestled in the middle of restricted military property. The area is still restricted, however "Area 51" was declassified in 2013. The site is seventy-five miles north of Las Vegas and northeast of a Nevada test site. The area has been known for "UFO" sightings.

In 2020 a private pilot flew a Cessna 150 along the border of the restricted area and was able, with a telephoto lens to capture pictures of "Area 51". Those pictures, along with several others, are included at the conclusion of this article.

In March 1956 there were nine aircraft and six pilots. Two to three tests per day were performed. Pilots were on 100% oxygen, which required one to two hours of preparation for their bodies to adjust.

The planes were initially silver and flew high enough that they were not visible from the ground. Sun reflecting off of the planes could be seen on the ground and accounts for some of the "UFO" sightings.

Article #341 also know as "Dirty Bird" was the first ever stealth aircraft. It wasn't effective and did have a dirty appearance. It served solely as a test aircraft. It couldn't be brought out of a stall above 35,000'. It was painted on the belly with a wallpaper like substance. It was intended to be radar absorbent but weighted the plane ruining its aerodynamic ability to perform as intended. Pilot Tony LeViev was the first test pilot. He completed eighteen flights. Tony survived eight crashes during his career and one mid-air collision. He worked at Lockheed until retiring in 1974. When he retired he was Director of Flight Operations. On April 4, 1957 the Article #341 Dirty Bird crashed killing pilot Robert Sieker as he attempted to bail out. Dave Trojan went to search for the crash site. He, of course, found it and brought back pieces of the plane. Pictures of which are later in this newsletter.

If you enjoy Dave's presentations:

Dave Trojan will be the featured presenter at the next EAA Chapter 77 meeting in Flushing (Dalton Airport).

The date is Thursday, June 12th. The meeting begins at 6pm, presentation is at 7pm.

The topic is the B-29 Bomber Superfortress that crashed near Flushing Michigan on December 22, 1951.

I was surprised to find that the museum consisted of a single hanger. The sole occupant is the B-25 Sandbar Mitchell, or should I say "parts thereof". The plane is in process of restoration. WWII aircraft restoration is not a quick and easy process. Restorations often take years. This restoration is projected to take ten years or more. Restorations for those that will become static displays take less time than those which are restored to flying condition. Static displays don't need engines for example. The B-25 restoration at the museum is for the purpose of flying; thus every part must be fully functional. (With the exception that bombs will not be added.) The plane will have added safety features such as fire extinguishers, up-todate safety belts, and modern avionics. (As much as possible modern features will be hidden.) The plane will appear as it was when it was first built.

The first person I talked with was a young man named Sebastian Cosma, a student apprentice. As you will see in the pictures I took at the museum, there is an area where apprentices use machinery in the restoration process. Experience using the machinery will serve them well in any restoration effort. Next I talked with a docent Joe Ventimigila who explained the wing assembly and described the fuel tanks inside the wings. The fuel tanks were made of a type of rubber which when punctured (by a bullet for example) would selfseal. The wing assembly was most interesting. Hanging on the wall to be added to assembly are the framework for the rudders and ailerons. Joe also told me that along with the plane, the tug that pulls the plane is also being restored, when the plane is completed. Joe mentioned that there is a B-25 being restored to static display status in Iowa, I believe. That plane has a functioning engine, or that is able to be restored to a functioning level. That engine is being exchanged for the engine in this plane that isn't restorable.

Museum Vice President Sean Farelly was the next person with whom I spoke. A young man, he is very knowledgeable of not only this B-25, but a handful of other similar models including a Russian model. He explained that this rebuild is probably a ten year project, not so much as lack of manpower but of funding. The project is estimated to cost \$1-2 million.

Student Apprentice Sean Cushing explained about the guns and ammunition used on the B-25. Those guns are still being used today.

What impressed me most about this experience was the enthusiasm of the young apprentices working on this project. In talking with those mentioned and to several others not mentioned here, they were knowledgeable of the history of WWII. They understood the role of not only the planes and other artillery used, but of the people who built and flew the planes. They understood that there was a common purpose and goal across the United States to work together to protect our nation and our freedom. Furthermore, these young people have a desire to educate their generation of this history. They referred to the people of that era as the "greatest generation". I fully agree! 






