New free courses released by King Schools

"It's critically important that drone pilots, just like all pilots, know what is legal and what is not and how to fly safely," said Martha King. "A savvy pilot is a safe pilot. And a savvy pilot, of any aircraft, is always learning.

Additional course information and free registration is available at <u>KingSchools.com/Drone-Regulations</u>.

The second new free course, Private Pilot Ground Reference Maneuvers, is taken from the King's Private Pilot Maneuvers course, designed to prepare a student pilot for their flight lessons by showing how to nail Turns Around a Point, Rectangular Patterns, and S-Turns Across a Road to FAA checkride standards. "Ground reference maneuvers can be a source of a frustration for student



pilots," said Barry Knuttila, the course's video instructor. "We show tips and tricks you can use to deal with wind to fly good patterns over the ground. This skill is best learned if first understood on the ground. Watching these video will save time and frustration in the air, while impressing your flight instructor with what you know."

King Schools has also posted a new YouTube playlist, "How To Become a Pilot." The videos are designed to clear up confusion and give people who are considering learning to fly a path to success, according to company officials. "The videos break down the sometimes-complicated process into 12 short, easily understandable and digestible parts," King Schools officials explained. "The first installment explains what a medical is, why it's important, and how to get one. Part two outlines where one can learn to fly, while part three is about what you need to do to find an instructor that suits your learning style."

The series is narrated by Samuel Golden, King Schools' digital marketing manager, who also holds a commercial pilot certificate.

Pre-flight Self-Briefing

- Prior to every flight, pilots should gather all information vital to the nature of the flight
- Using automated resources, pilots can conduct a regulatory compliant preflight briefing without contacting Flight Service
- Pilots who prefer to contact Flight Service are still encouraged to conduct a self-briefing prior to calling
 - Provides familiarity of meteorological and aeronautical conditions applicable to the route of flight
 - Promotes a better understanding of weather information

Cautions & Tips

- · Don't fixate on the equipment
 - Cockpit displays don't tell the whole story
 We still have to look outside
- Understand what the displays tell you... and what they don't.
 You may not see all the traffic in your area
 - or all the weather ahead
- · Make weather avoidance decisions early
 - Don't wait till you're close to choose a route
 - Refine your decisions as more information becomes available

Pre-flight Know Before You Go

1) Adverse Conditions	Weather advisories (SIGMETs, AIRMETs, Convective SIGMETs, Center Weather Advisories, Aviation Watch Notification Messages) NOTAMs (airport/runway closures, TFRs, etc.) IFR conditions, Iow-level windshear, thunderstorms, reported icing, frontal zones		
2) Synopsis	Weather systems and/or air masses		
3) Current Conditions	Current observations (e.g., METARs, PIREPs) for departure, en route, and destination Satellite and radar imagery		
4) Forecast Conditions	Forecast information (departure, en route, and destination)		
5) Winds Aloft	Winds aloft forecast (interpolate between levels and stations) Temperature at proposed altitude		
6) Notices to Airmen (NOTAM)	Departure, en route, and destination		
7) Restricted or Special Use Airspace	 Prohibited Areas P-40, P-56, and the Special Flight Rules Area (SFRA) for Washington, DC 		
8) ATC Delays	ATC delays and/or flow control advisories

- · Flight Service (FSS) en route weather
- Frequencies depicted on VOR data block
 - FSS transmits & receives on 122.2 (VHF) and 255.4 (UHF)
 FSS receives on 122.15 & transmits on 109.6 (VOR)

Q: What's the biggest plane to land at Midway? Hint: It's not a 737

Chicago Midway Airport is a one-mile square piece of land in the middle of a neighborhood. This airport has been affectionately referred to as a 'postage stamp' due to its tiny footprint relative to most other airports in the United States. The airport features four runways at each corner of its one mile square. The longest runway tops out at less than 6,500 feet. While it is long enough for daily operations of single aisle airliners like the Boeing 737 and Airbus A320, it's not really large enough to handle much bigger.



Back in the late 1990s and early 2000s,

the Boeing 757 was a daily visitor to Chicago Midway Airport. American Trans Air regularly flew both the Boeing 757-200 and even larger 757-300 into the field. The jet stuck out like a sore thumb because of its size but its well-known short field performance meant that it was a relatively benign operator into the field. While 757s are less common today, both United and Delta still occasionally fly their 757s into Midway on charter flights.

Even Bigger: An Airbus A300 Flew into Midway on October 3rd 1973 as part a promotional tour. Fully loaded, an Airbus A300B weighs 300,000 pounds. The A300 typically seats 210 to 250 in a three class, dual aisle arrangement. Many people incorrectly assume the A300B was the largest plane ever to land at Chicago's Midway Airport.

So, what's the Biggest Plane at Chicago Midway?

EAA Aviation Museum Introduces 'Inside The Hangar' Self-Guided Tours



Visitors to the EAA Aviation Museum in Oshkosh can now easily get more in-depth information on museum exhibits as the initial set of self-guided QR codes have been added to select aircraft exhibits.

The "Inside The Hangar" tour offers visitors the opportunity to scan a QR code via their smart device and receive additional background regarding the exhibit, without downloading a special app. The Synthesia software can be opened to extra features such as the exhibit's background, archival photographs not on display, and other information not found on museum signage.

"Museum visitors throughout the nation are now seeking more interaction with displays and exhibits they see and the Synthesia software allows EAA to bring far more depth to an exhibit than we could fit on a sign," said Amelia Anderson, the EAA Aviation Museum collections curator. "This system also offers a way to bring additional and behind-the-scenes information about an exhibit as we discover it. As this proves more popular, we will add it to more exhibits in the coming year."

EAA museum visitors will find the first QR code at the entry to the museum, explaining the selfguided tour option and its benefits. Current QR codes are available at some of EAA's "foundational" aircraft, such as the *Mechanix Illustrated* Baby Ace, Little Audrey, and Little Bonzo. It is also available at the Huey helicopter exhibit in the Eagle Hangar.

About EAA Aviation Museum - The EAA Aviation Museum is located just off Interstate 41 at the Highway 44 exit in Oshkosh. The museum is open daily from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. EAA members receive free museum admission year-round. A 579 Chapter Membership Form is included as the last page of this newsletter.





A: The C-17 Globemaster III.



The Air Force C-17 is massive, with a length of 174 feet and a wingspan of 169 feet. The C-17 has the ability to land on relatively short runways, as little as 3,500 feet. The C-17 typically lands at Midway to support VIP movements. The C-17 can still pick up cargo and comfortably land and takeoff from the airport, however fully loaded at 580,000 pounds it would require more distance for takeoff.
