KNOW YOUR FELLOW MEMBER-Tony Rizzio (Number 3c)

Tony Rizzio, like many of his fellow members, got the flying bug on having his first airplane ride furnished by his uncle, Pat Rizzio. Pat was known to many of us locals as having owned among other planes that cute little bug of the '30s known as the Buhl BULL PUP, much admired by this writer. It is obvious that, since the PUP was single-place, he didn't ride in it; rather his first was in Pat's Luscombe or T-craft

or Piper CRUISER. Anyway that bug bit hard and he immediately began building models of his favorite planes.

Being the tenacious type, he stuck with his new hobby and his models got progressively larger, one of his most recent being a 1/4th-scale one of the Beech Staggerwing which still hangs in his garage...still his favorite.

In 1976 he got into RC flying and soon became a master at it; today he instructs newcomers in that art and serves as trouble shooter for builders who want their model test-flown or modified for better flying characteristics. Sometimes a new model won't fly right because of a twist inadvertently built in and he is able to diagnose the trouble and correct it. He is a very active member of the LAZY 8s Model Club.

That first ride took place long ago at Nellis Field in Fort Plain. More recently he has taken flying lessons in a Cessna 152 from Richmor.

His first venture into flying Ultralights was a bit abortive; he bought a poorly designed one, the MAC, which had a basic flaw built in. It was so bad that the manufacturer was forced into bankruptcy and "back to the drawing boards".

One flight with Ed Di Rossi in his 2-place KING COBRA last fall was what he needed for encourahement. He got rid of the MAC and bought Di Rossi's QUICKSILVER and looks forward to a good season with it. When he has mastered that he will consider what to do next...possibly building an IN/ADER or an FP 202.

Since the closing of Sears Roebuck's Gloversville store Tony has been employed in their mammoth store in Colonie Center where he enjoys his work in their Display Department. His wife, Linda, is most helpful and supportive in his hobbies, for which he, like the rest of us who are so blessed, is grateful. Meanwhile he is impatiently waiting for the arrival of those great, warm blue days of spring so he can get back into the air.

His three all-time favorite planes are the STAGGERWING Beechcraft, the F-15 EAGLE and the Lake BUCCANEER, the first of which is illustrated here.
