Fond Memories of Earl Taylor

SWANTON- Earl R. Taylor, age 96, passed away peacefully on Monday, June 5th, 2023, at the University of Vermont Medical Center surrounded by loving friends.

He was born in Swanton on April 6, 1927, to the late George and Frances (Martin) Taylor.

Earl started his military career with the Vermont Militia which prepared him for his service as a veteran in World War II, and the Naval Seabees (Construction Battalion Reserve) for 36 years, earning the highest rank for a non- commissioned officer of Chief. Earl was a proud member of 76 Lodge #14 F&AM. One of his more recent accomplishments was working with his brother Donald to build the EAA Chapter 613 Hanger, now known as the Taylor Aviation Center. He, his father and brothers built houses on Taylor Drive. He and Donald also built and operated The Dairy Bar and were owner/operators of Tay-

lor Marine. Earl retired from Union Carbide after 30+ years. In Earl's later years, he was a devoted caretaker to his wife Betty. He looked forward to church every Sunday and the social activities at Holy Trinity. He enjoyed going out to dinner and hosting dinner parties at his house. He was a regular follower of the Boston Red Sox.

He is survived by his daughter, April Putnam and her husband, Dana; granddaughter, Ashley Putnam; several nieces and nephews; sister-in-law, Shirley Taylor; special friends, Laura and John Simon, Ann and Raymond Hakey, Curtis and Janice Brusoe, Pat Gaboriault, Tammy Tuttle, MaryRose Fahy, Betty Renaudette, Mary and John Wood, and John and Shirley Fitzgerald and too many others to mention. Earl will be greatly missed.

Earl was predeceased by his parents, his wife Betty; brothers, Kenneth, Donald, and Arnold; and sister, Norma.

MVUHS Aviation Club Wraps up its First Season by Tony Speranza


EAA 613 sponsored Aviation Club at Missisquoi Valley Union High School (Swanton) wrapped a very successful year this month. I would like to thank Mr. Barwin, our Shop Teacher & Club mentor. He posses unique experiences: technical & military; before going into teaching. Mr. Barwin really knows how to connect with the kids! I really applaud EAA National for putting together such a complete "package" starting with the PC flight simulators: one of the students managed to get it loaded & working (kids are good at that "tech stuff") and Mr. Barwin cycled all the kids through, helped them fly it.



Next we jumped into flying the first kit, a ready to fly model called Night Vapor (photo). It flies really slow, which gives the kids a chance to think before it crashes. We flew it in the MVUHS gym with super smooth floors. Some of the students managed to knock out some "touch and goes". Remarkable achievement as flying RC models can be difficult, especially when it heading directly At you (controls opposite). All the kids had a chance to fly & did GREAT.

We managed to get a lot done on the large RC model (72" wingspan). When I signed up for the this, I was expecting an AFR model kit (Almost Ready to Fly). These typically take 10 to 20 hours to do the final assembly: install radio, engine etc. What we received instead was a complete "stick build" kits, a whole different story (lots of WORK required). I've build many kits like this so not a big deal, lot of time required. The kids had never built anything like this so I wasn't sure how it would go??? The kids have been AMAZING – they all dug in, listened well & took direction as needed, then just started to build. I've been attempting to build in life lessons like: FTR – First Time Right, Quality "built in" - work fast BUT be careful and you can do

anything: just check YouTube first for a wealth of instructional videos.

Beth and Charlotte Clark walked us through each and every center that makes up the entire building and hangar. We also worked on an essay that will hopefully be published in EAA's Sports Aviation magazine. Shortly after that I was given the opportunity to visit Burlington's Air Traffic Control tower, which was an amazing experience. We ended this month's journey with volunteering as an escort to safely bring pilots and young kids to their aircrafts where the children had their Young Eagles flight and I myself was able to experience being in a helicopter for the very first time, which was a great experience. I was amazed to see the sheer amount of kids that showed interest in aviation. My instructor Kyra and I continued doing lessons involving touch and go and learning how to take off and land properly and I'm excited to see what next month's journey brings.

The month of June. Wow, we're already here! I have quite a bit to share. Over the last month, I got to turn some wrenches, get in the air, and more. To start from the beginning, I logged 1.4 flight hours this month, taking to the skies out of Morrisville, which in my opinion, gives some of the most stunning mountain views of Vermont. Getting into the air, snow still visible on some mountain peaks with most towering into the clouds combined with the golden sun rays made that flight particularly memorable.

Fast forward to the weekend where I got to work on the empennage of my little J3 Kitten. After cutting open the tubing where the tailwheel had previously attached, I found traces of rust inside the tubing. Upon further inspection with a borescope, much of the tubing was okay, but the welds inside of the fuselage had been rusted. Unfortunately, since multiple welds have previously broken as well, the airframe will not be airworthy. Upon further investigation in the (right) wing, there was a lot of mouse nesting and broken or gnawed ribs. I made the decision that I would sell what I can from the project, mainly the Rotax 447 engine (which is still available), and wait until I can afford to go for a project that will allow me to receive both flight training in and also be a great daily aircraft to fly. I take it as an opportunity to explore other aircraft, and the project was definitely not a regret as I learned so much from it that I wouldn't have known otherwise.

A few days ago in Plattsburgh, NY, I attended an amazing Young Eagle's event hosted by BETA Technologies. As a volunteer, I saw a ton of smiling faces and youth who were totally enjoying the opportunity to get in the air, myself included. I was able to get a ride in a helicopter piloted by Kyle Clark, which was absolutely amazing! I was also able to fly a Boeing Stearman, piloted by my former instructor, Bob Brunjes, which gave me the opportunity to grab some neat photos as well. In all, the event was an amazing opportunity for so many people and was just one of many things that made this month great.
