THANKSGIVING DAY

has a special connection to aviation for me. It goes back to when I was 13 and my father, Jerry Allnoch, passed his check ride. That was on Wednesday, November 25, 1981, and I became his first official passenger the next day.

It had been a long journey for him just to reach that point. He had dreamed of flying since childhood, but didn't have the funds to start training until he was past 40.

Even then, it happened in fits and starts, with three years passing between his first solo and his first check ride. That's right, the *first* check ride – it took him two tries to get it right.

He failed on steep turns and slow flight after a shaky experience en route to meet the pilot examiner. Flying from our home airport in Waycross to Moultrie, he encountered fog. He was in it for only a minute or two, but it shook him up and he was nervous when the exam began. It didn't help that, from Dad's perspective, the DPE turned out to be a bit of a grouch.

He was devastated and considered giving up the dream altogether. But his CFI, a kind and patient man named Billy Stone, kept encouraging him and agreed to send him to a different examiner for the next attempt.

So on that late-November day, Dad flew to Malcolm McKinnon Airport on St. Simon's Island and easily passed the remaining requirements. He called home



with the good news, then flew Billy's 1968 Cessna 150, N51087, back to Waycross, temporary certificate in hand.

The next day there would be no post-Thanksgiving dinner naps or football watching. As soon as the table was clear, we bolted for the airport, squeezed into the little Cessna and launched from Runway 36 into a gloriously sunny sky. Our route was due north to Dad's hometown, Baxley, then back south to Alma, and on home to Waycross, a mini-cross country of 90 miles round trip.

I would accompany my dad on many more flights in that 150, as well as another one operated by our local Civil Air Patrol squadron; a 1941 Taylorcraft that he restored from a wreck; and a 1946 Cessna 140 that he flew for three years before taking up a new hobby, antique car restoration.

I am grateful that Dad stuck with his training and instilled in me a love of aviation. Thanksgiving has passed, but my appreciation for that time in the air with him lives on every day.

### AIR SHOW UPDATE | Phaedra Childers Sponsorship Goal More Than Halfway Met; Performer Lineup Expected in December

### MARKETING

- Theme: "Cleared for Take-Off"
- New website under construction. Rollout expected in early December.
- Re-targeting campaign will begin December 21.
- Social media calendar will begin January 1.
- Weekly updates are posted on TITV's Facebook page.

### **SPONSORSHIPS**

- Currently, we have cash commitments for \$53,250 from our 2014 sponsors. We have a new sponsor, Minerva, that has made a cash commitment of \$1,000, bringing total cash commitments to \$54,250. Our goal is \$100,000, so we are more than halfway there!
- Our in-kind sponsors, who are donating advertising, goods and services for the success of the air show, have committed to \$56,000. We couldn't pull off the show without the generosity of our in-kind sponsors!
