## Third Visit from B-17

Another 690 Success Story

The B-17 touched down at Gwinnett County - Briscoe Field right on schedule, Thursday April 24th. for the third visit to EAA Chapter 690. We were ready. Joel Levine had lined up reporters and TV photographers. These people were treated to the first flight in the giant WWII bomber that played an important role in bringing the mighty German military to its knees. The media people were impressed and as a result there was extensive TV and newspaper coverage of our weekend activities.

Signs had been placed around the airport by Frank Wilcox to guide the many visitors who began coming to tour the inside of the plane for a \$5 fee or maybe just to look at

the immense size of the aircraft. For some it brought back memories of war time experiences and for many it was an opportunity to see a plane they had heard about from fathers, grandfathers or others who flew and maybe died in a B-17 while defending their country during that terrible war.

Barney Barnes was busy signing up names of people who wanted a flight in the B-17. While he was unable to fill any flights for Friday, the one sunny day of the weekend, he filled three flights for Saturday and four for Sunday. Seven people could board the plane for a flight, which included 10 minutes piloting the aircraft from the left hand seat. A large photo taken during this piloting and a lovely gray flight jacket with a B-17 plane embroidered on the back were also given to these flyers. If they had a log book, it was signed by the pilot in charge. All this for \$550 plus the cost of National EAA membership, with \$250 of the money

going to the EAA Foundation. The Saturday flights were accomplished in spite of rainy, windy weather. The weather deteriorated further and all the Sunday flights had to be canceled. The flights were scheduled for the mornings and the afternoons were left open for the ground tours.

Al Higgins coordinated the ground tours assisted by several volunteers from EAA Chapter 268 from Marietta who came to help both Sat. and Sun. In spite of the inclement weather, there was a constant stream of people coming for tours until Sunday afternoon, when a thunderstorm caused the B-17 crew to close the aircraft to prevent any danger from

lightning. Because of weather

conditions, the aircraft stayed at

the airport until Tuesday
afternoon. Barney, with the
help of President Duane Huff,
contacted all the disappointed
pilots who could not fly on
Sunday to offer a flight on Tuesday
morning. 14 people were able to come on
short notice to fill two flights. Barney has
all these interested person's names entered in
to his computer so they can be contacted for
future B-17 visits and other Chapter 690 public
events.

Whenever people gather, Chapter 690 uses the opportunity to add to the income of the chapter. Over 150 people were served at a pancake breakfast on Saturday morning from 8 to 10:30. Then the lunch food was brought out - hot dogs, barbecue sandwiches, etc. The Aviation Explorer Scout Post #533, led by Steve Haslup, helped with lunch. Mike North was in charge of the food service assisted by many members of the chapter. Lnor Levine was busy selling souvenirs. She

She sold chances on a lovely original painting of a B-17 bomber donated by Marcus Stewart, a local aviation artist. It was won by Ralph Grizzard of Norcross.

The hig highlight of the weekend was the hangar dance, modeled after the USO dances of WWII. David Posey, general chairman of the B-17 event, had engaged the *Blue Notes*, a local 19 piece band that is well known for playing music of the 40s and 50s. They set up in the EAA hangar, which had been beautifully decorated by Theresa and Bill Coleman and their committee. It was a patriotic theme with back drops of American flags, red, white and blue streamers, and strings of tiny white lights that provided just the right amount of light for a romantic atmosphere. Individual table decorations and bubble candles continued the patriotic theme.

Next door in the Zahner hangar were the heavy hors d'oeuvres. Chef Bob Zahner assisted by his wife Lynn and other chapter members provided a delicious meal— meat balls, chicken shish kabobs, trays of vegetables, bowls of fruit, cheese, crackers, nuts, and other salads, with dessert of several flavors of cheese cake. Punch and coffee also were served. Guests were seated at large round tables also decorated in a patriotic theme. The food was available throughout the evening. Robert and Steven North, dressed in white shirts and bow ties, were the servers.

The Master of Ceremonies for the dance was Steve Ashby. There was a contest for the most appropriately dressed guests. The top prizes were won by our own chapter members Tess Huff, who wore her own authentic 1946 black dress with gloves and hat, and Wayne Whitaker, who came in a WWI flying jacket with aviator cap, goggles and white flowing scarf. Both the door prize and a ticket raffle were won by the Wilcoxs. They each received a set of airplane videos which will eventually be part of the EAA video library.

When the plane left on Tuesday afternoon it flew to Aurora, Ill. The EAA policy is to award rides on the out bound flights to leaders of the Young Eagles program and supporters of general aviation and EAA. On board for Chapter 690 was Theresa Coleman, Mike North and Joel Levine. Jimmy Norton, a member of the Gwinnett Airport Authority,



represented general aviation. Larry Bishop flew to Chattanooga, where the EAA members disembarked, and brought them home.

Special recognition should go to David Posey, who was general chairman for the event, and Duane Huff, who as president is responsible for all chapter activities. The courtesy car for the B-17 crew was arranged for by Jim Estes.

The real value of the weekend was in the delight of the people who came to see the plane and the stories they told. One couple in their 80th decade drove over from Washington, Ga. He had been a bombardier on a B-17. He was shot down after his third mission and spent the rest of the war in a POW

camp. As he walked through the aircraft he became excited as the familiarity brought back his own experiences. His wife told stories of their early married life as she followed him from air base to air base during his training in the U.S. One visitor brought with her a huge notebook of details of every mission that her father had flown in the B-17. She had obtained all this from the Pentagon. Her father still lives in Kansas and she plans to buy him a flight in the Aluminum Overcast when it stops near his home during the coming tour. She was on board during one of the Tuesday flights and actually flew the airplane as her Dad had done over 50 years ago. What a unique experience! • • •

## From Squadron Leader Barnes

The Aluminum Overcast arrived on Thursday, April 24 at about 5:00 p.m. Around 5:30 they took off with a group of media representatives. On Friday, April 25, we had flights scheduled for 9.00 a.m., 10:00 a.m., and 11:00 a.m. It was a beautiful day but we did not have enough people signed up to meet the minimum 6 passengers necessary to fly. Saturday, April 26, was another beautiful day and we got 3 flights off each with 7 passengers as scheduled at 9, 10 and 11.


On Sunday, April 27 we were able to schedule 4 flights carrying 7 passengers each, but could not make any of them due to low ceilings and drizzle. The plane was opened for walk-through tours and the turn out for that was phenomenal considering the cold winds and rain. The line of people who had already paid for the tour waiting to get into the plane was stretched across the width of the ramp in front of the hangar. This line was pretty steady until the weather turned into your harms.

The plane was originally scheduled to depart at about 4:00 p.m. for the next tour stop, Decatur, Ala., but the pilots determined the the weather at both ends was too bad so they postponed until Monday morning. On Monday, review of weather at both ends again indicated another postponement was in order but the pilots said that local weather might make 1 or 2 flights possible here and that Decatur was still expecting more bad weather. The pilots decided cancel the Decatur stop altogether and go on to the next stop at Aurora, Ill. to keep that schedule. We went back through the list of Sundays dissappointee's and managed to get 2 full flights of 7 each to come back again Tuesday on the promise of iffy weather. After a delay the low skies finally broke into scattered and both flights got off so we flew a total of 35 people in 2 days. •••

We all know where you can get the best pancakes in the Lawrenceville area. That is, at least those of us who attend the monthly Chapter 690 Pancake Breakfasts. All would agree that Mike and Jennifer North and crew have gotten the art of flipping flapjacks down to a science. But where do you go for lunch? Working or spending a day at LZU often includes the proverbial \$50 (without factoring in inflation) hamburger at some far off "spot." Thanks to Charlie Sego, I can now tell you brothers and sisters that LZU has its own hot spot for lunch . . . and it won't cost you \$100! Within 2 miles of the airport, near the old railroad station, you will find Tom and Pat Mineo, owners, cooks and chief bottle washers of the Depot Bakery and Deli. Tom and Pat make some of the best lunches around. For \$4.40 - \$4.75 you can get their lunch special with the sandwich of your choice (tuna, egg salad, ham and cheese, roast beef, turkey, etc.), chips, a soft drink and a piece of homemade pie or cake.

Now let me tell you, the sandwiches are stacked high on fresh baked bread along with the standard fixins. But, that's only the entree. The piece-de-resistance are the great desserts that come with the special. Without trying to list them all, let me say that until I visited the deli I had not had French Apple pie in many years. Pat and Tom bake a great French Apple plus the standard fruit pies - apple, cherry, blueberry, etc. One day I'm going to try what appear to be scrumptious cakes! The desserts on the special vary from day to day.

The afore mentioned only covers the lunch fare. For those with less will power, you will find some of the largest apple turnovers, Napoleons and Eclairs that I have seen south of the Mason Dixon line.

In keeping with the \$100 hamburger rating system I would have to give the Depot Bakery and Deli a high 4-1/2 hamburgers, not for the food but for the fact that they have more brand "P" soft drinks than Coke.
