The program for the Chapter meeting on Friday. March 14th will be presented by Pam Hollis. Pam is a Pilot who has pursued Advance Ground Training Certificates. She is the founder of LIFT Flight Training (which is currently in application process for 141 status). Her professional educating and consulting background was previously in the highly regulated healthcare field. Ms. Hollis is acting President and Chief Operating Officer of LIFT, LLC. LIFT provides educational services to aviation enthusiasts, recurrent training to licensed pilots, and comprehensive consulting to the aviation industry. Her company focuses on classroom instruction from beginning students to certified pilots. Lift also provides customized pilot training programs for Corporate Flight Operations and Charter Companies.

A Young Eagles Success Story

The Young Eagles program was in its infancy back in 1994 when Sue Adams, Y.E. field representative asked EAA Chapter 690 to host an area Young Eagles rally. The invitation was accepted and a committee was formed. A goal was set and months of preparation facilitated a very successful rally. On March 19th, 1994, six hundred thirty-five (635) young people became Young Eagles.

After all these years, and continuing to fly many Young Eagles, one might wonder if any of these young people are bitten by the aviation bug and continue in flying. Just by chance, the following story of Jenna Onken was found out, and reinforces the idea that other Young Eagles may be pursuing a career in aviation. And now, "Here is the rest of the Story."

The Rest of the Story

I caught "aviation fever" in 1994, when Gwinnett County Airport was hosting a fly-in. One of the things being offered were airplane rides for children, called Young Eagles Flights. My dad has always had a passion for flying, so naturally he was lured to the show. My brother and I were to go on a Young Eagles Flight after we sat through the ground school. That lasted probably around thirty minutes, and I was getting impatient. I may have only been a mere eight years old, but I was ready to conquer the skies!

The plane we were to take up was a four seater, and I got the privilege of sitting in the right seat. I was expecting a short, twenty minute flight, since that's what most of the other kids were getting. We actually wound up staying up for about an hour, flying to Kennesaw Mountain, over Atlanta and Stone Mountain, and then back to Gwinnett. Even after the plane was on the ground, I was still in the skies. I was completely ecstatic and knew then that I wanted to pursue a career in aviation. I remember telling my parents I wanted to be a pilot, and they laughed and didn't believe me, but they were very wrong.

I flew a little more over the next couple of years; it was hard seeing over the dash, so most instructors advised me to wait until I was a little taller. When I was a freshman in high school, I joined Aviation Explorers, led by Mr. Steve Haslup. This program really increased my knowledge about general aviation, as Mr. Haslup taught us about everything from what an aileron does to how to plan a cross-country flight. After Explorers, I joined the Civil Air Patrol at Gwinnett. CAP really helped me to learn a lot about



myself, both physically and mentally. I was challenged constantly, and always motivated to settle for nothing less than my best. Civil Air Patrol taught me a lot, including Air Force courtesies and customs, how to wear a uniform, and most importantly, TEAMWORK. Every task can be accomplished if everyone cooperates. I took several Orientation Flights with CAP, and with each flight, my love for flying continued

In November 2000, I started working at Astron Enterprises, a flight school on the field. It was fantastic being surrounded by pilots all the time, and I loved hearing their stories. Working at Astron gave me the most insight into what a career in aviation is really like. I began taking flying lessons at Astron, and still am today. Although flying has been put on hold several times due to school, I haven't let the fire die out.

On November 1, 2002, I finally soloed for the first time. I was so thrilled, but slightly terrified at the same time. I had finally done it, achieved what I had been yearning for, for so long. I am still working on getting my license, and hope to get it by the time summer comes.

An Intro to Mountain Flying (without the plane)

Our first fly-out activity for 2003 is set for March 8th. We will be headed north to the great white expanse (or at least as much expanse that you can create with man-made snow machines) to Beech Mountain Ski Resort (www.skibeech.com) in North Carolina. Our destination airport is Avery County A/P (7A8), where the very hospitable folks at Avery Aviation (averyaviation.com) have pledged to help us in every way that they can. From the airport we will take a short drive of 15 miles or so to the slopes for a day of skiing, tubing, ice skating, or just sitting around and watching other folks struggle with the loss of friction.

The costs for the trip will be as follows: Required:

Rental van - Approx \$50 split evenly between all of us that go (or all that will fit in the van)

Lift Ticket - \$45 for the full day (less for half days, tubing, etc., see the web site)

Skis, Poles, and Boot Rental - \$12 for the full day

Optional:

Jacket Rental - \$8 /day Bibb (funny pants favoring overalls) Rental - \$7 /day Gloves - \$6 /day Obviously, if you only plan to watch, there will be no need for you to rent any equipment. We will expect you to fund your portion of the van rental.

The "Wright Stuff"

Andy Zimmerman, Aerospace Engineer, C-130 Pilot and Flight Test Engineer, Takes Us Back to the 1900s with the "Wright Stuff"

At the February Chapter meeting Andy Zimmerman, the speaker told us in great detail "What the Wrights were up to." He described how these two self taught, bicycle builders from Dayton, Ohio studied all the information they could obtain on experimental flying and over a period of 5 years developed and flew the first powered airplane. The Wrights saw how others, including the great German engineer Otto Lillianthal, tried powered flights and were killed, so they started with kites, graduated to gliders and solved the challenges of pitch, yaw and roll before they added an engine and a propeller.

They went to Kitty Hawk, N.C. for their testing on the advice of their friend and benefactor, Octave Chanute, who advised them to get away from the crowds, and find a place where the landings were soft and the wind strong. The U.S. Weather Bureau suggested Kitty Hawk offered these advantages.

They went through trying times, especially in late summer 1901 when they had not yet mastered yaw control and on one flight Wilbur was almost killed. He declared, "Man will not fly in my life time or in a



thousand years." But they did not give up. They went back to Dayton and built a wind tunnel and taught themselves aeronautics. They made great progress that winter and returned to build a permanent camp at Kill Devil Hill, from which they had many successful glider flights the summer of 1902 learning to control the gliders.

They went home that winter to find an engine for their craft. They soon found there were no suitable engines available so they set their chief bicycle mechanic, Charlie Taylor, to building one. They also had to solve the problem of the propeller. The time was now February 1903 - exactly 100 years ago. That is where our speaker left us - with a promise to return with "the rest of the story."

Andy is an engaging speaker and kept the attention of the audience. His extensive background in aviation and interest in history enabled him to provide a story we won¹t soon forget. 
come at their own expense and volunteer their time and services.


