May 21: Charles Lindbergh Became The First Person To Fly From New York To Paris

Historic Flight Took Place May 20/21, 1927 Ninety years ago, on 21 May 1927, American aviator Charles Lindbergh set the world alight when he completed the first non-stop solo flight from New York to Paris. In doing so he set an FAI World Record for 'Distance in a straight-line without landing'.

Flying a specially-built Ryan Monoplane, the Spirit of St Louis, Lindbergh flew 3,136.6 nautical miles in 33 hours and 30 minutes. He flew alone, through the night, navigating only by the compass, stars and dead reckoning.



Taking off from Roosevelt Field near New York early on Friday 20 May 1927, he was

loaded down with 1,704 litres of fuel. He headed east, flying as high as 3,000 meters (approx. 9,800 feet) to clear storm clouds, and as low as 3 meters (approx. 10 feet), skimming across the wave tops. He flew part of the flight blind through fog for several hours.

When he landed at Le Bourget Airport northeast of Paris at 10:22 p.m on Saturday 21 May 1927 he was



greeted by a crowd of 150,000 people. The 25-year-old former barnstormer pilot became an international celebrity overnight, and was feted around the world. He received the French Legion d'Honneur and was awarded the USA's Distinguished Flying Cross.

Lindbergh's flight was ratified by the FAI, the World Air Sports Federation, which was then 22 years old. Based in Lausanne, Switzerland, the FAI is the international body responsible for ratifying aviation records. To prove his flight, and to show that he had completed the trans-Atlantic crossing in one single, Lindbergh carried a sealed barograph in the body of the plane.

Barographs record air pressure, and by looking at the trace of the air pressure recorded during the flight, observers could see that Lindbergh had not landed, and had completed his flight non-stop.

The original trace, which together with other original documents from the record flight are today held at FAI headquarters in Lausanne, shows that Lindbergh flew much of the flight at low altitude. He climbed higher about one-third of the way through the flight, to avoid storm clouds.

Other documents the FAI holds from Lindbergh's historic flight include the letter from the National Aeronautic Association of the USA to the FAI requesting the flight be ratified as a world record. Dated 26 May 1927 and addressed to Monsieur Paul Tissandier, then Secretary General of the FAI, it reads: "We have the honour of submitting our report on the New York-Paris flight, flown by Captain Charles A Lindbergh, and we respectfully ask that this new record is homologated by the FAI."

The FAI, which was founded in 1905, holds an archive of international aviation records stretching back more than a century. From Lindbergh's record flight to the first man in Space, they form a unique collection of the most important moments in aviation history.







I hope we can get a good turnout of pilots and ground crew. Our ground crew was lacking in May. We will be inviting our summer camp attendees to come and fly with us on that date so we could have a large turnout.

Our youth program continues strong and we just recently received the fuselage kit from the Bede Family Foundation for the BD-6. We can still use some additional mentors and are looking for someone to take over the week to week planning for each session. We currently have two major projects, the ultra-lite Pietenpol and full size Pietenpol. We are also working on a Corvair engine to be turned into a cutaway learning tool. The BD-6 will become a major project beginning on June 3rd. We will be documenting this project closely as we progress to show the Bede Family Foundation our progress. If you would like to be a part of this project, please let me know. I want to thank Hugh Colton, Joel Levine, Art Farmer, Chuck Roberts, Dennis Crosgrove, Duane Huff, Gordon Fowlkes and Bob Higgins for the time they are volunteering as mentors to the program.

Work began recently on the wings for the RV-12. We will order the finishing kit soon. The group currently works on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons. We can also have work groups in the evening if you are interested and evenings fit your schedule better. Please let Joel or I know and we'll work on it. As we move forward with the wings and finishing kit we will need to continue with the fund raising effort to complete the RV-12. The amount remaining to complete the airplane is around \$43k for the engine and avionics. The airplane will be placed in the flying club once it is completed and will be available for rental to club members. We have not finalized all the details of the club at this time, but hope to do so in the near future. Remember that any donations made for the RV-12 are tax deductible under the chapter's 501(c)3 status.

Glider Wing Project May 13th, 2017

As most of you know the Glider located at the entrance to Gwinnett Field suffered sever wing damage last year during a storm. The wings were removed, and with magic performed by Chuck Roberts in his workshop with help from his elves, shorted to make them look aesthetically pleasing. Here are some pictures of the work done to reattach the shortened wings.



Off to a rough start with one of the bucket rigs getting into the ditch. With a lot of work and a little ingenuity, and hooking two trucks to the trailer, it finally arrived on level ground.



The let wing went in with a little coaxing, although there seemed to be a small problem with hole alignment.





To make sure the wings were secure a fair amount of twisting hammering, drilling, more drilling and more hammering was applied. All of this was interspersed with trips to hangers & hardware stores for drill batteries, bolts and other nuts, hardware. Finally it all came together.

Thanks to the crew that put in a full day to get this project completed, **job well done**.

The right wing proved problematic and, after much pushing, lifting, twisting and cajoling it finally arrived in position.







The cables used to brace the landing gear came together after some geometry and estimation
