Greetings, Chapter Members,

The clear skies in the fall beckon me to fly! October Sky, a coming of age story about rocketeers in the 50's, was put to music and film to share the idea that we aspire to things that seem impossible for reasons that are sometime unclear or unimportant to those around us. In the last six month, our EAA 690 chapter set to work on the opportunity to share a flying scholarship with a member that has the potential, inclination, and determination to become a pilot. What a challenge and opportunity!

When studying the material from EAA on the scholarship, I was appreciative of the EAA 690 members and leaders who's work positioned the chapter to be in the position to select a candidate. I also got interested in why would an individual like James C. Ray give so generously to this cause. In my research, I discovered that Mr. Ray was a very special individual with great interest in sharing what he had learned in his full life. James served as a B-17 command pilot in the 8th Air Force, 447th Bomb Group. Stationed in England he flew 30 missions in WWII. Then after the war, he flew his Cessna 170B on personal and business trips to 58 countries and to every Caribbean island with a landing strip. Further, he became a successful business man flying Citations almost 30 years a and over 3500 hours. Of significance to my question of why was the scholarship important to him, I discovered that he believed "the disciplines he obtained during flight training truly helped him become the successful individual he is today." This basis of belief drove him to provide this scholarship so that other young people "might benefit from this same type of activity and the positive, life-changing opportunities it presents."

Award part of annual \$1 million Ray Aviation Scholarship program

LAWRENCEVILLE, GA ---- SEPT. 25, 2019 - MARIA HERNANDEZ of PEACHTREE CORNERS, GA,

has received a unique full-scholarship opportunity for flight training, thanks to EAA Chapter 690 of Lawrenceville and the Ray Aviation Scholarship program administered by the Experimental Aircraft Association in Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

The Ray Aviation Scholars program provides up to \$10,000 scholarships to young people who are seeking to learn to fly. The Ray Foundation has provided \$1 million to fund the scholarship program, which seeks to improve the flight training success rate from the current industry standards of 20 percent to 80 percent for program participants. Local EAA chapters are responsible for identifying youth for the Ray Aviation Scholarship program and mentoring them through flight training. The Ray Foundation is furthering the legacy of James Ray, an EAA lifetime member who was dedicated to aviation and youth education. The initiative is designed to help meet the tremendous future demand for pilots and associated aviation careers.

Maria will be training at Aero Ventures Flying Club, based at Gwinnett County Airport, in Lawrenceville, GA. The scholarship is designed to support a flight student through both written and practical segments of flight training that are part of successful FAA pilot certification.

EAA chapters play a critical role in the success of the Ray Aviation Scholarship program. Chapters interested in participating are prequalified by EAA through an application process. If selected, they mentor and support the scholarship recipient throughout their flight training journey. Once selected as a Ray Aviation Scholarship Fund participant, candidates also commit to volunteer service with the local EAA chapter.

COVINGTON MUNI AIRPORT Update

I hope you all are staying cool and have had the opportunity to use our new runway! The project, for the most part, is complete. There are still a few items left. You may have noticed that the LED PAPI lights are not on. This is because the FAA still needs to do a flight check to "certify" them. We have requested the flight check and are awaiting scheduling from the FAA. There is also a couple of areas of grass (dirt) that need to be stabilized, especially near A4. Pittman is going to return to grade and reseed.

You all may have noticed that the lights now work like every other airport in the world. 3 mic clicks for low, 5 for medium, and 7 for high. There were 12 random defective LED lights that have been sent back to the manufacturer. We will install them when we get the replacements.

Our next project is the taxiway light rehabilitation and MALSR approach lighting system. We have received the NTP (notice to proceed) and will start on September 16th, 2019. The contractor (NAVCON) will start on the east end of 142 grading for the light towers. At some point, taxiway A will be closed. You will be able to access the runway via A2. You will have to back taxi on runway 28 to depart to the west or 10 to depart to the east. The taxi way lights are inoperable now because they are on a separate circuit than the runway lights. This will be remedied when we rehab the taxiway lights. We are also going to decommission the old electrical vault and move the segmented wind sock towards the east end of the field away from the tree line.

EAA 690 Youth Build Project Update

The middle of September marks four years since the Youth Build Project began. We started by building wing ribs for the Pietenpol Single Seater. There are now 5 projects underway with a sixth to build an engine test stand.

In April Randy Epstein handed over the reins to Hugh Colton and John Morrow, and more recently Larry Wallace has been taking an increasing role. Randy thanks for all your hard work running the program and setting up the administrative system so that we can track youth attendance.

Youth should expect to see a number of changes in the next few months. Heads up build participants, from the beginning of October you'll have to submit your work log and homework for approval each week, so don't forget to complete the log when you get home each week and do your homework. You will have received an e-mail detailing the requirements by the time you read this in the NavCom.



The Pietenpol single seater is nearing structural completion. Joel Levine, Duane Huff and Keith Oliver have been mentoring the youths in the techniques involved in putting the fabric on the smaller surfaces. Once we have procured more fabric the job of covering the other structures can begin. Everyone agrees that there's quite a transformation once the heat of the iron gets to work on the fabric.

Work continues on the Pietenpol Two-Seater. Nicolas Hammond has been doing a

sterling job getting the youths to be able to use basic math and measurements to correctly position the ribs on the spars. There was a change to the original plan from a one piece wing to a three piece wing. An attractive change that will make the wings much more manageable for handling in the hangar during the build process. The next step is to

mock up the new center section using cheap materials before committing

to expensive aviation quality wood for the final product. Nick Nichols is mentoring the manufacture of the various metal parts. Templates have been made for some of the parts and these will be used to

fashion the metal parts from the recently purchased steel.

Billy Stewart has been heading up the overhaul of the C-65 engine and it's looking very good. Max Kramer and Gustav Scheid have been working on this for over a year, and have been joined by Adon Jerald. Larry Wallace is in the process of having a group of youths design and build an engine test rig. This rig will be useable for other engine projects that have yet to begin.

Andrew Robinson has had his team working away on the Bede 6 project. The latest kit delivery from Bede is being worked on. It's beginning to look like an aircraft now with the framework of the fuselage well underway.

Ken Lightner and the RC Model makers are now well on with a second model. We could do with more mentors to keep things going every week as Ken has other commitments that he needs to attend to.

The youth program returned to being a weekly event in April. There are four fifth Saturdays annually and on this day there's no building activity, but a fun learning activity. In June Larry Wallace provided an insight into various types of welding with opportunity for each attendee to try their welding skills. The August fifth Saturday saw a number of youths come along to fly the flight simulators in hangar 1.

Members of the youth program please don't forget that to remain active in the program you need to attend at least two build sessions a month. Each build week (weeks one to four each month) when you receive an invite you need to respond even if for some reason you can't attend. Sessions last four hours and begin at 9 am. Don't be surprised if you show up late and you're asked to leave, you missed the flight.

John Morrow has been doing a grand job standing in for me during my frequent absences. Youths please make life easier for John and myself by responding to invites, showing up and working. There is a waiting list and your slot will be given to someone on the waiting list if you become inactive and you will have to join the back

of the queue to rejoin the program. Becoming inactive means you forfeit all the flying credit you may have accumulated.

We want to hear the views of our Youth Build Project participants. A questionnaire is being prepared that will be sent to all current and recently active members of the Youth Build Project. Watch out for the questionnaire arriving in your e-mail box and be sure to complete the document and return it.

WOW! This idea of learning to fly having a benefit in life hit me like a ton of bricks. I began thinking about the ideas and knowledge that I gained in the process of flying. Bear with me as I share just few from my own experience.

1. As a low time student, I would often defer to my most capable and exacting instructor, the late CMDR Warren Grafton, when I was given challenging maneuvers. The one I remember most was the power on stall/spin in that little Cessna 152 over the midlands of South Carolina. Finally, when I asked for yet another demonstration, Warren, in a clear and determined act, jabbed the yoke hard and looked at me sternly and said: "You're the pilot... YOU fly the plane!" Reflecting over the 35+ years since then, I realized how important that admonishing statement was. Often, sometimes with little notice, life requires us to take the yoke and make a decision... on our own...with whatever means we have been provided.

2. In my flight test, in Sumter, SC, I encountered Mr. Alva Henry, Jr. the designated examiner I had anticipated meeting. Warren had told me I was ready, and the flight to Sumter had been easy. As I walked into the FBO, there was a man sitting alone on a couch who I guessed was the examiner. I asked and he said yes, he was Alva Henry. Then he said, "Did Warren send you?" I said yes, there was a pause as he rose to his 6++foot height, and he said: "Tell me you didn't come in a Cessna 150!" Sheepish, I said yes...he sighed... and later carefully folded himself into the little plane. The feedback I got after the third landing (of which I thought were great, having pegged the desired airspeed) was: "If you get it slow on approach again, I will bust you." I did not believe I had and still don't, but I sure didn't "get it slow" on the last landing. He smiled and said that would be fine and let's land. In recounting this story, I believe it represents a life lesson that we all may need to be reminded of: Focus on the task at hand.

3. Finally, with still a pocket full of examples, I share this item I heard from a venerated pilot friend: "There are three useless things when you are in an airplane: Runway behind you... Altitude above you... Fuel on the ground..." Nothing to add to that!

I hope some of you will share items like this you have experienced in your aviation life with me and others in and outside your circle. With the selection of our first Ray Scholarship recipient this last month, I hope it is a reminder to us all that life's challenges are really opportunities in disguise. Mr. Ray knew this, Warren Grafton and Alva Henry as well. I am still learning it. Let's share this going forward.

Enjoy the fall flying this October and encourage the people engaged in EAA 690 who are learning and growing, at all ages and stages of life.




Heidi Grows Up!

As you can see in the pictures Heidi now has stands on which she sits and a floor mounted to her skids so that it is easy for a person to step up onto Heidi's floor and sit down while allowing the chapter member showing Heidi to stand up instead of squatting. The floor (which is covered with an anti-slip rubber mat) and its supports added only about 15 lbs. to Heidi. The stands are very light weight and include locking rails to prevent Heidi from slipping off. We have now shown Heidi with this new configuration at the Women In Aviation event at the Delta Airlines Museum with great success.
