A Look At The Past

This is what the LZU runway looked like in 1963 as the author climbed aboard the jump plane for his first parachute jump.

It was an early September Sunday afternoon. It was hot. I sat there shivering.

There in this case is the back seat in an old Tri-Pacer and I was geared up to make my first parachute jump and was looking at the 1500 feet of narrow dirt runway of the Lawrenceville airport.

After a lifetime of a ride to 3000 feet the jumpmaster locked the brakes of the wheezing old airplane and had me get out and stand on the wheel and hold onto the strut. The wind was deafening. Finally we reached the exit point and he motioned that it was time. A step backwards and suddenly it was deathly quiet. There was no wind noise and the engine sounds were gone.

Suddenly a tug and there was the most beautiful sight that I had ever seen... the canopy spread out over the sky above me. Everywhere I looked there was no obstruction to the view except down and there only my feet in the way of the Earth 3000 feet below. The Tri-Pacer was flying off into the distance.

Why was I doing this? I thought back to the time a few weeks ago when the Art Director of the Atlanta Newspapers called me and asked me to do a picture layout on a young Sport Parachutist. Of course to properly do the job I would have to take pictures of him in free fall. Therefore the training.

Almost before it had begun the ground came rushing up and I landed just a few feet from the target. Just about in the center of what is now the lobby of Hawthorn Aviation.

GlaStar comes to LZU

Wednesday October 15, Tim Johnson from Stoddard - Hamilton paid a visit to Chapter 690 with the GlaStar prototype N824Q. Sue Adams provided coffee and cake for everyone.

The weather was marginal but Tim gave demo rides to all takers. Since I last saw the airplane it has had a engine swap to boost performance. The airplane last had a Continental IO-240 but now has a Lycoming O-320 with a constant speed Hartzell prop. This gives the airplane a claimed top cruise of 167mph and a useful load of 800 lbs. Tim showed how the wings fold for saving on storage space and it can be done in less than ten minutes.

I was one of the last people around but still got to fly the airplane. As we taxied out to runway 7 Tim asked what I flew (not what I was building). When ready to take off Tim puts his hands in his lap and says "have fun". He must have a lot of faith in the airplane. The plane climbs great and before I can time our climb we are at pattern altitude. We can't climb higher due to the low ceiling but get to do some turns in the pattern because tower needed to work a Navajo in. The plane will stay stable in any bank angle I try it in and takes very low pressure. I motor down final using the 150 speeds I remember from the distant past and everything works out OK.

After the rides, Tim gassed the GlaStar and put it away in the Zahner hanger. We had dinner with Stoddard-Hamilton picking up the tab and Tim spent the night in the hanger apartment.

This is not the airplane I am building but the GlaStar does represent a logical choice for a lot of people. It has a combination of low construction time, very safe flying qualities and reasonable load, speed and range. Here is a plane that the low/no time pilot could build, learn to fly in and still have a cross-country aircraft after getting their license.

That was in 1963. At that time the Lawrenceville Airport had, perhaps, 15 operations per month. Most of them flying parachutists.

Oh, there were other airplanes landing and taking off from there occasionally but I don't even want to think about what they were doing. There were no airplanes parked there. There was not even a shed or a building. Nothing. There were no rules.

A normal takeoff was to run to the end of the runway, pop a notch of flaps, and stagger out over the corn stalks clawing for speed and altitude.

Fast forward to today ----

The Gwinnett County Airport, Briscoe Field, is now the third busiest airport in the state of Georgia. Also the second busiest General Aviation airport in the state and the fastest growing General Aviation airport in America. A far cry from 1963.

"We now have two full service FBO's and 10 - 20 aviation related businesses on the airport", said John Ferguson, the airport manager. "We have a full ILS system and there is much more expansion scheduled as soon as funding is available", he added.

The first of these improvements should be started within a couple of weeks. Work will begin on expanding all the runup bays and building a new connector in the vicinity of Atlanta Jet connecting taxiways B and D.

"We will soon begin a 4 year project to build a new taxiway along the general route of the old runway. We expect to start that in mid-1998". It will pass close alongside the EAA 690 hangar and slope upwards to the runway level. The cost is expected to run about \$4.5 million.

"Long range plans call for a parallel second runway of 3500 feet but this is still sometime in the fairly distant future," John added.

Why is all this activity taking place to transform our airport to one as up to date as today's date? "I have never heard of a company CEO coming to town on a bus. They either get here by way of Hartsfield or in their own airplane, "John said." They are a large part of the economic future of this area."

This is why people like John Ferguson is taking the Gwinnett County Airport at jet speeds into the next millennium.

Chapter 690 North Georgia Chapter 99's Gwinnett County Airport

Before there were electronic navigation aids, one of the more formidable challenges to pilots was knowing just where they were. Back in the 30s pilots were still depending on unusual structures or natural landmarks to confirm their flight plans. The history of early flying is filled with colossal navigational boo-boos. Wrong Way Corrigan comes to mind. But the reasons for all this were to radically change when Phoebe Omlie observed that "an air route without marking is like a highway without signs." The year was 1933 when Phoebe, a 99 and a member of the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics, conceived a plan to paint town names and directional indicators on the roofs of buildings throughout the United States.

Then, at Eleanor Roosevelt's suggestion, the Bureau of Air Commerce hired five well-known women fliers to scout sites and get permission for the markers from local officials and building owners.

Once the idea was approved, surveyed by the Gwinnett County Airport, and the paint delivered the North Georgia Chapter of the 99s went to work. Air marking today has become a very important part of what The Nine-Nines do. The 12 point compass rose comes directly from the 99s logo.

On Friday, October 3rd Sue Adams-99 and EAA Chapter member, Pat Underwood (Larry) Chapter 690 member, Lucy Young, 99's chapter president, and Barb Young, 99's chapter membership chairman spent the day preparing the area designated by the airport manager's office for the compass rose. From 9am to 4pm all 12 points were measured, marked and outlined for the next days painting. Then on Saturday, Oct. 4th during the pancake breakfast and long after everyone was gone, Joel Levine-690, Bob Langford-690, CAP Bruce Owings and 13 year old daughter Katy who worked for over 2 hours on the rose (she wants to be a jet engine mechanic), Jean Toxen-99, Kim Whiley-99, Carol Baney-99, Joyce Pittman-99, Lucy Young-99, Barb Young-99, completed the Compass Rose. It's located at the SW end of the old runway. It's not only a decorative item, but a useful tool as well. At this time we are waiting for our chapter logo to be stenciled in order to complete the center of the Rose.

Jim Glaeser has located the 'how to' on swinging the

compass of your aircraft.

Compass Compensation

Turn aircraft to a heading of exactly North. Adjust N-S screw until compass indicates exactly 360°.

Turn aircraft to a heading of exactly East. Adjust E-W screw until compass indicates exactly 090°.

Turn aircraft to a heading of exactly South. Adjust N-S screw to eliminate 1/2 of the error indicated by the compass. (example-if the compass reads 188°, adjust the screw until the compass reads 184°.)

Turn aircraft to a heading of exactly West. Adjust N-S screw to eliminate 1/2 of the error indicated by the compass.

Note - Two precautions:

- 1. The engine RPM must be high enough during the adjustments to insure that the alternator or generator is charging.
- 2. All metal should be removed from your person (watches, rings, metal framed eyeglasses, etc.)

Watch Us Grow!


