As I write this column, we are now entering our 5th month trying to deal with the Covid-19 epidemic and now a few race riots have been added to sort of spice things up a bit. Some of the State Government restrictions have been lifted enough for us to start implementing our plans to partially reopen EAA690 to regular chapter activities. Elsewhere in this NAVCOM you will find articles about our upcoming July 4th picnic and our weekly GOP (Grumpy Old Pilots) picnics. I also have just been notified that EAA1025 in Covington is planning a fish fry for the 4th. Our flying chapter members might want to fly over for that if the weather is good.

Our annual youth summer camp has been cancelled as State guidelines for such camps would have made compliance next to impossible. There also is no plan to start having Young Eagle Rallies in the near future. Without a vaccine there is just too great a risk to the pilots and the children to conduct such flights safely. On a brighter note, we do plan on having our youth build program ramping up in mid July with new guidelines in place.

Unless the State restrictions change for the worse, we plan to start having our monthly Pancake Breakfast in August. Because of the current 50 person gathering rule we plan to split the breakfast into 2 sittings. One seating will be from 8 am to 9:30 am and the second seating from 9:30 to 11:00 am. There will be no speaker for this breakfast. You will be given your food and beverage and syrup, butter etc. will be provided so nobody except a server wearing gloves and mask touches anything. You can have all the coffee that you want but someone else will prepare it for you.

We hope to ramp up our IMC-VMC club in July. Brian Michael is currently conducting video conferencing written exam training sessions for our members wishing to obtain their private pilot's certificate. This will most likely switch over to live sessions in the near future.

There has been minimal discussion with the County about our hangar lease extension for all 8 hangars. Hopefully we will reach an agreement to either have a permanent 10 year mutually agreed upon contract or at least an additional year Band-Aid to take us to 2022. Hanger owners will be updated as this gets resolved.

In closing, this month's Shout Out goes to Billy Stewart and youth builders Max, Gustov and Karen for finishing the welding work on their build of our new engine test stand. Max created the design for the stand. Pictures should be found somewhere in this issue.

LZU Airport News

As you may already be aware, Gwinnett County Airport is currently in the process of building a parallel taxiway to Runway 25 on the north end of the airfield. In order to continue this work, it will be necessary to close Taxiway Yankee, along with Taxiways Foxtrot and Golf north of Runway 7/25 (Area in yellow will be closed). Taxiway Yankee and Taxiways Foxtrot and Golf (North of Runway 7/25) will be closed beginning Monday, July 6, 2020.

The contractor will be removing the existing taxiway pavements and lights, installing new drainage structures and grading the area. This is all in preparation for tying the new taxiway into the runway.

NO work will be done in the runway safety areas, so the runways will NOT be effected. Also, NO work will be done to taxiways Delta or Echo. So, aircraft movements should not be effected by this work. However, you will see heavy equipment working near the taxiways and the runway safety area. Please contact airport administration at 770-822-5196, if you have any questions or concerns.

EAA 690 Youth Aviation Program

This year has been one surprise after another for the chapter. As I'm sure a few of you know, COVID-19 has put a lot of things on hold including the Youth Aviation Program. We are in the process of restarting the program. As we do that there will be some changes. About the time the virus was hitting, program leader, Hugh Colton, stepped down after leading the program, along with John Morrow, for the last year. Thanks to Hugh for stepping up and doing that. It requires a lot of effort and time.

With Hugh leaving I worked to put together a leadership team to lead the program into the future. I plan on handling the administrative side of the program while the rest of the team handles the Saturday sessions. The team consists of John Morrow, Andrew Robinson, Frank Lipinski, Keith Oliver, Joel Levine and Ken Lightner. I want to thank these gentlemen for stepping up to help lead the program.

We've held three meetings to date to talk about the program going forward and the changes that we feel are necessary. We will go back to three Saturdays each month, the 2nd, 3rd and 4th Saturdays. This will leave the first Saturday open so mentors, youth and family can attend the pancake breakfast and program. We will also expect our youth to assist in the kitchen when Terry needs help. We encourage our youth to participate in other chapter activities whenever possible. Having the fifth Saturdays open will give our mentors some time away to be with their families. Sessions will still be 9:00 – 1:00. Hours will still be credited as before and can be applied toward flight training aircraft rental with AeroVentures Flying Club. The major change to the program will be the ability to use those credits. Before any credits can be used for flight training a youth will have to present the leaders of the program with a copy of their medical certificate. The program does not have unlimited funds and we want to be mindful of that. In the last year we have expended nearly two thousand dollars on training for youth that were unable to qualify for a medical certificate. This change will prevent that from happening.

We have had discussions on how we can help those that might still want a career in aviation outside of becoming a pilot. Additional funding can help us with that becoming a possibility, but at this time we will be focusing on pilot training. If that changes, we will let everyone know.

We will be hosting a meeting with returning youth and parents to go over the new program documents and our plan for restarting.

We are planning on starting back with some tool and safety training as well as a math training session. We would like to target Saturday, July 11th to kick things off. As we solidify that date, we will add it to the chapter calendar.

I would like to take a chance to recap our success stories. Jeremy Welch was our first youth to earn a Private Pilot Certificate, on his seventeenth birthday. Jeremy went on to earn an Instrument rating and is looking forward to attending Middle Georgia University this fall. Steven Agudelo earned his Private Pilot certificate through the program and headed off to become a Naval Aviator, recently earning his Wings, recently, as a helicopter pilot. Alex Kirkland also earned his certificate with us and is a student at Middle Georgia University. Maddie Hale soloed through the program and then headed off to Middle Georgia University where she has since earned her Private Pilot certificate. Derrick Miller, another of our youth, flew briefly with us and then headed off to college at Tuskegee University in their Aviation program. He has gotten to the cross-country phase of his training and is now with the Alabama Air National Guard having completed basic training at Lackland AFB. He is currently in Tech school at Shepherd AFB in Wichita Falls, TX to become an F-16 Crew Chief. He will complete OJT with the ANG and return to Tuskegee in January to continue his college education. Another of our youth, Gustav Scheid is attending AIM in pursuit if his A&P Certificate.





Abbreviated IFR Flight Plans

An authorization by ATC requiring pilots to submit only that information needed for the purpose of ATC. It includes only a small portion of the usual IFR flight plan information. In certain instances, this may be only aircraft identification, location, and pilot request. Other information may be requested if needed by ATC for separation/control purposes. It is frequently used by aircraft which are airborne and desire an instrument approach or by aircraft which are on the ground and desire a climb to VFR-on-top.
