Program Announced for Feb. 14th - What the Wrights Were Up To

The Wrights were not the first to attempt flight in a heavier-than-air craft. Many others had preceded them, but they mostly managed to crash their craft with regularity. The Wright brothers succeeded where others failed by solving the fundamental puzzles of aircraft stability and control. It was this development for which they received their U.S. patent and are recognized as giants in the history of aeronautical science and engineering.

Their success did not occur overnight, but required years of diligent and pain-staking research and experimentation. Not trained as scientists or engineers, but self-taught, they nonetheless advanced the state of the art in the great heroic, American tradition of pioneering spirit and

innovation, financing their work with profits from the family bicycle business.

This lecture by Andy Zimmerman will describe their work from conception to the status as of February 1903, 100 years ago this month. Later follow-ups will simulate the real-life countdown to success in December 1903, climaxing with the Centennial of Flight on December 17, 2003.

A 1980 graduate of Georgia Tech in Aerospace Engineering, Andy Zimmerman is a former USAF C-130 pilot and Lockheed flight test engineer. He now practices as an independent professional engineer in the area of industrial safety, health and environmental engineering. He is also an FAA-certificated airline transport pilot, an advanced ground instructor and a safety officer in the Civil Air Patrol.

Best Bets on DVD

It's not often I review a "Home made" DVD. I generally stick to the more commercial variety. This one, however, was mentioned to me by a flying acquaintance, who felt it was worth a look. Fortunately,

shortly thereafter I ran in to the Cinematographer / Producer / Director. She was kind enough to make available a copy of "The Great Northwest Adventure."

I must admit, it was with some trepidation that I loaded the DVD into my player. What if it was a disaster? What do I do I say to my friends. Oh, didn't I mention that the Cinematographer / Producer / Director is a friend of mine.

Well, that said, after just a few minutes of viewing, I was able to relax and truly enjoy the most delightful, aviation adventure video I have ever had the pleasure to watch. For the first few minutes, you are not sure just where this is going. The opening "in cockpit" shots were limiting and the audio was a bit difficult to understand. Well, that's the end of the criticisms. From the moment the camera swings to an outside shot, and the music comes up, the adventure begins.

This exciting video captures the true sprit of recreational aviation at its best. It chronicles the four-day, cross-country (almost literally) travels of a troupe of three intrepid aviators and their companions, from Atlanta GA to Liberty MO, Yellow Stone, Jackson WY, and back. At various points you are treated to wonderful views of Mt. Rushmore (a bit shaky perhaps, but thrilling none-the-less), a trip to the world famous "Lambert's - Home of the Thrown Rolls" restaurant, Crazy Horse Rock, truly scenic wonders at Yellowstone, curious wildlife, unusual aircraft, and a great flying exhibition by "Team RV," our own local formation flying team. (Whew. That's a lot of stuff!) All of this, along with a moving musical score, will raise goose bumps on even the most skeptical.

I have yet to mention that all of the aircraft involved were "Home built." Yes, this was the finest example of the true American Sprit of flying. The aircraft involved were all RV 6s. In fact, the lead aircraft was first flown by its builder, Mike Stewart, in December 2001. It now has over 600 hours. Wow!, that's some flying. If you visit Mike's website, you can even get a glimpse of yours truly. Take a look at the "First Flight" photos. That's me in the denim jacket, looking at Mike's plane.

But, back to the DVD. Seldom can I say that I so truly and thoroughly enjoyed a "Home Made" video. The highest compliment I can think of is just how disappointed I was when it was over. I was begging for more. Perhaps that is just what the young Cinematographer / Producer / Director had in mind. Always leave them wanting. She did. Of course no video would fare so well without excellent editing and outstanding musical score. The use of various fades, cross-fades, wipes and dissolves, made even the transitions fun. Did I mention the Heart at Valentine? Even the still photos at the end are moving and uplifting. It's just fantastic.

I don't know if this is the first offering by this team. If it is, the talent displayed is undeniable. If it isn't, the talent is showcased wonderfully. Did I mention that I liked it?

If, after viewing this video, you don't want to run out and build, buy, borrow, or rent an airplane and have an adventure of your own, I would be shocked. I still thrill at the aerial shots with the wonderful music. It is truly a spirit builder and a wonderful testimonial to the American Sprit. "The Georgia Aviation Hall of Fame: A Tribute to Ben Epps" Presented by Howard H. McWhorter of Athens, Ga.



The program at The Fernbank Science Center Planetarium on Tuesday, February 7th at 6:30 p.m. will be presented by Mac McWhorter of Athens, GA.

Georgia has a glorious history in aviation, made by individuals who have vision, strength of their convictions, and the ability to accomplish the almost impossible. There is and old saying, "The difficult we accomplish immediately, the impossible takes a little longer."

From Ben T. Epps, Georgia's first aviator – who accomplished the aerial feat in 1907, to the current day individual who looks to the skies with the desire to soar with eagles, the Georgia Aviation Hall of Fame was founded to honor and preserve the memory and accomplishments of those individuals.

The story of the founding and some of the individuals that have been enshrined into the Georgia Aviation Hall of Fame is a great story and one that Mac McWhorter enjoys sharing. Colonel Howard H. McWhorter, USAF, Ret. Fighter Pilot, and founder of the Georgia Aviation Hall of Fame, is currently the Flight Director/Chief Pilot for the University of Georgia. He has been active in Georgia aviation for many years and has served on the Board of Directors of the Georgia Aviation Hall of Fame from its inception to the present. He is Vice-Chairman of the Clark County Airport Authority. Mac's aviation career has spanned more than 50 years with over 20,000 hours of flying time in numerous aircraft.

EAA CONCERNED DUE PROCESS MAY BE COMPROMISED BY NEW REVOCATION RULES

The Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA) is expressing concerns regarding new final rules issued today by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and Transportation Security Administration (TSA).

Those rules were mandated by Congress under the Aviation Transportation Security Act of 2001 and were made effective immediately without an opportunity for prior public comment. Under the rules, TSA can call on FAA to immediately revoke or withhold airman certificates if TSA deems an individual is a "threat to the transportation system or national security." An individual's certificates would be revoked or applications denied unless they can fully satisfy TSA that they do not pose a security threat.

Upon receiving an advance copy of the rules on Jan. 23, EAA's Government Relations Office and Legal Advisory Council started an initial review of provisions contained within the regulations. They have discovered a number of troubling aspects that set precedents contrary to established legal proceedings relating to the revocation of FAA airman's certificates.

"There is no question that national security is the highest priority for our government and EAA supports those efforts," said Tom Poberezny, EAA President. "We at EAA understand the mission of TSA but the process as written leaves room for abuse by those in the future who may not exercise the proper due diligence."

EAA is especially concerned about the procedural aspects implemented by the new rules. Among the specifics that must be clarified:

Unclear definition of what constitutes a security threat. For those who hold airman certificates (pilot, repairman, mechanic, etc.), the guidelines as to what would make them a security threat, and trigger TSA action against them, remain unclear.

Limited access by accused to information regarding their case. Under the rules, airmen would have little access to specific evidence that supported the revocation process. There are some options within the appeals process to request evidence, but much of that evidence may be labeled sensitive or classified, and therefore remain unavailable. Such classified information is exempt from provisions of the Freedom of Information Act.

No opportunities for hearings or impartial appeals process. EAA officials are concerned that there is no option for an individual erroneously accused of being a security threat to meet with FAA or TSA to refute the allegations.

EAA will continue to review the new rules and will submit formal comments to FAA and TSA prior to the end of the public-comment period on March 25, 2003. The public-comment period was established to provide an opportunity for the public to suggest modifications to the rules.

EAA, which met with TSA on Thursday, Jan. 23, to discuss this and other security-related issues, will also continue its ongoing communication with FAA and TSA, requesting additional clarification on how these new rules will be administered. EAA will update its members and other aviation enthusiasts on the specifics and ramifications of these rules, so that they may use the information as a resource when developing their own comments to the regulations. Jeanine Chambers, Executive Director of Angel Flight of Georgia, wanted a place to plant a tree to memorialize the Founder of Angel Flight. It was suggested that she revive a decade-old plan to build a park in the center of DeKalb-Peachtree Airport (PDK).

After looking at the available greenspace, she decided to look into making an aviation park. Ms. Chambers said that , "A key element of the park will be flight education." The park will also feature a veterans' memorial - a 1/3 scale Navy Corsair airplane sculpture, and a flag memorial with a commemorative brick plaza. PDK used to be Army

airbase Camp Gordon, and later served as the first Naval Air Station in Georgia.

The park will be located off the eastern side of the airport, just off the old tower and the Federal Aviation Administration ATC Building. Plans are to feature a playground laid out like an airport. Glider swings will allow children to "come in for a landing." Bouncy swings will help children simulate "turbulence and touching down."

The EAA Aviation Foundation offers meaningful educational and career opportunities for young women through two programs made possible by the Coffy Gregory Endowment:, the Coffy Gregory First Flight Scholarship and the Coffy Gregory Aviation Career Internship. These outstanding programs honor the legacy of Florence Gregory, one of Illinois' first licensed women pilots and a longtime EAA member who participated at many EAA Oshkosh conventions. She died in December 2000 at age 98 and bequeathed to the EAA Aviation Foundation an endowment for the purpose of advancing the future role of women in aviation.

Coffy Gregory First Flight Scholarships provide an opportunity for 10 women 16 years of age and older to receive scholarships valued up to \$2,000 each to attend the EAA First Flights Academy in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. Recipients-women who are pursuing their private pilot ratings-receive 8 to 10 hours of flight instruction.

Applicants must demonstrate an interest in aviation and should aspire to earn their private pilot rating. Scholarships will be awarded based on applicants' interest in aviation and scholastic abilities. Countdown to Centennial of Flight

From the EAA Web-Site

1903 - In Dayton, Orville and Wilbur completed the design and construction of their powered glider in June 1903. It weighed in at just over 600 pounds including its 179pound, 12 horsepower engine. The craft had a wingspan of 40 feet, 4 inches.



At 10:35 a.m., December 17, 1903, Orville Wright fired up the four-cylinder engine and embarked on the first manned, sustained, powered flight. That initial ascent lasted about 12 seconds and spanned an estimated 120 feet.

Wilbur then gave it a try and exceeded his brother's distance by about 75 feet. As any pilot knows, nothing can substitute for experience: By Wilbur's second try (the fourth overall and the last one of this fateful day), he sustained flight for nearly a full minute and a distance of over 850 feet.

2003 - EAA has contracted Ken Hyde of The Wright Experience in Warrenton, VA., to build an authentic reproduction of the 1903 Wright Flyer. It is the most accurate of its kind and is scheduled to be complete in early

To ensure the authenticity of the 1903 Wright Flyer reproduction and research from The Wright Experience, Ford Motor Company has provided technological expertise and major help for the project.

At 10:35 a.m. on Dec. 17, 2003, 100 years to-the-minute of the first flight, EAA and Countdown to Kitty Hawk presenting sponsor, Ford Motor Company, are scheduled to re-create the Wright brothers' historic moment. It will mark the first time a truly accurate 1903 Wright Flyer reproduction has taken to the air at the site of the Wrights' flight. Through a special partnership with the National Park Service, EAA's 1903 Wright Flyer is the only reproduction scheduled to re-create the flight at the Wright Brothers National Memorial.




