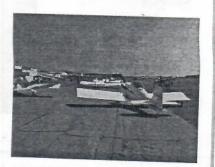

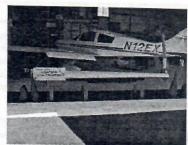

Re-creating the 1925-1931 National Air Tours in celebration of the Centennial of Flight

National Air Tour 2003 - Historic Flight Re-creation Stops in Peachtree City, Georgia.

The National Air Tour 2003 is the historic flight recreation of the National Air Tours that took place from 1925 through 1931. In the mid-1920s, at a time when there was not even a single road reaching across the United States, the Tours were conceived to promote the safety and reliability of air travel. The original Tours received significant support from Edsel and Henry Ford. By supporting the Tours and lending the Ford trusted name, they helped convince a skeptical public that passenger flight was a sensible means of transportation. In this centennial year of powered flight, the Tour celebrates the legacy of the National Air Tours as well as the innovators and innovations from the era.

Departing Sept. 8th from the Dearborn, Mich. area, the National Air Tour 2003 flew a route that was

planned, but never flown for a 1932 tour because of The Depression. The National Air Tour 2003 brought living aviation history to people in 26 cities, through the media and over the Internet www.NationalAirTour.org. Stopping overnight in Lansing, IL, the tour was scheduled to make a luncheon stop in Chicago at Meigs Field on Tuesday, September 9. Instead, with the runway in a shambles, the tour flew over the famous-but-damaged airfield in a show of support. (See story on Page 11.) The 17 day Air Tour, included over two dozen historic aircraft, the likes of which have not been seen together in Chicago since the dedication of Meigs Field in 1950. (The airport opened in 1948.)

Peachtree City was the 17th stop on the tour, and the planes and pilots stayed there an extra day due to Hurricane Isabelle. Several Chapter 690 members were among those who visited the Tour stop on September 17th. (Please see photos on page 11.)

I sat in my seat of the Boeing 767 waiting for everyone to hurry and stow their carry-ons and grab a seat so we could start what I was sure to be a long, uneventful flight home. With the huge capacity and slow moving people taking their time to stuff luggage far too big for the overhead and never paying much attention to holding up the growing line behind them, I simply shook my head knowing that this flight was not starting out very well.

I was anxious to get home to see my loved ones so I was focused on "my" issues and just felt like standing up and yelling for some of these clowns to get their act together. I knew I couldn't say a word so I just thumbed through the "Sky Mall" magazine from the seat pocket in front of me. You know it's really getting rough when you resort to the over priced, useless sky mall crap to break the monotony. With everyone finally seated, we just sat there with the cabin door open and no one in any hurry to get us going although we were well past the scheduled take off time. No wonder the airline industry is in trouble I told myself.

Just then, the attendant came on the intercom to inform us all that we were being delayed. The entire plane let out a collective groan. She resumed speaking to say "We are holding the aircraft for some very special people who are on their way to the plane and the delay shouldn't be more than 5 minutes. I was expecting some celebrity or sport figure to be the reason for the hold up... "Just get their butts in a seat and lets hit the gas," I thought.

The attendant came back on the speaker to announce in a loud and excited voice that we were being joined by several U. S. Marines returning home from Iraq!!! Just as they walked on board, the

entire plane erupted into applause. The men were a bit taken by surprise by the 340 people cheering for them as they searched for their seats. They were having their hands shook and touched by almost everyone who was within an arm's distance of them as they passed down the aisle. One elderly woman kissed the hand of one of the Marines as he passed by her. The applause, whistles and cheering didn't stop for a long time.

When we were finally airborne, "I" was not the only civilian checking his conscience as to the delays in "me" getting home, finding my easy chair, a cold beverage and the remote in my hand. These men had sacrificed for all of us and I had been complaining silently about "me" and "my" issues. I took for granted the everyday freedoms I enjoy and the conveniences of the American way of life. I took for granted (that) others paid the price for my ability to moan and complain about a few minutes delay to "me" for those Heroes going home to their loved ones.

I attempted to get my selfish outlook back in order and minutes before we landed I suggested to the attendant that she announce over the speaker a request for everyone to remain in their seats until our heroes were allowed to gather their things and be first off the plane. The cheers and applause continued until the last Marine stepped off and we all rose to go about our too often taken for granted everyday freedoms... I felt proud of them. I felt it an honor and a privilege to be among the first to welcome them home and say "Thank You for a job well done."

I vowed that I will never forget that flight nor the lesson learned. I can't say it enough, "THANK YOU" to those Veterans and active servicemen and women who may read this and a prayer for those who cannot because they are no longer with us. GOD BLESS AMERICA! WELCOME HOME! AND THANKS FOR A JOB WELL DONE!!!!!

A New Source for Annual Inspections at LZU

Good deals are hard to come by. When they are in our own backyard it makes it even better. Former Chapter 690 member Robert Starnes operates Flight Maintenance, Inc. at LZU behind Piedmont Hawthorne which caters to General Aviation aircraft. Robert is EAA savvy, doing restorations as well as the normal wrench turning type of "stuff." He's offering an interesting special - \$50 off or a free Biplane Ride with an Annual Inspection. If nothing else, stop by and see the two neat Chinese basic trainers that frequent his hangar.

LZU Weekend Closings Update

Matt Smith, Airport Director has e-mailed the following update as of 9-26-03:

FYI. The work on the runway will be done in three phases. Phase I will be to remove the center 25 feet of pavement completely, repair the underlying subbase (gravel that supports the asphalt), and then repave to the height of the bordering pavement (so the runway is usable during the week).

Phase II will be to put down a 2 ½ inch overlayment of pavement over the entire runway. We will also be doing things like repainting the runway markings, etc.

Phase III is to groove the runway, which removes water from the runway quicker to prevent hydroplaning.

Our current plan is to have the airport closed this weekend, (9:00 p.m. on 9-26-03 through 7:00 a.m. on 9-29-03). We expect that the runway will be open promptly at 7:00 a.m. The first weekend should complete Phase I.

The contract calls for a \$3,000 dollar penalty if the runway is not available at 7:00 a.m. If the runway is not available at 8:00 a.m. the contract calls for an additional \$3,000 penalty (total of \$6,000). If the runway is still not available at 9:00 a.m. the contract calls for a \$4,000 penalty (total of \$10,000). We included the high dollar penalty to show we were serious about re-opening the runway on time.

Weather permitting, and contractor availability permitting, the runway will be closed at the same times mentioned above starting 10-3-03 and going through the morning of 10-06-03. The intention is this will complete Phase II.

If for some reason the contractor cannot finish Phase II over this weekend, there is a provision to allow a third weekend of closure for Phase II. The entire time the runway is closed during that additional weekend it is a penalty for the contractor and will cost them \$200 per hour. So, if we need to use the additional weekend, I would expect the closure will not last the entire time but only a portion (i.e., Friday night though Saturday afternoon and then we would reopen).

After the final pavement is put down, we are required to wait 30 days for it to cure. After 30 days we will schedule the last weekend closure (Friday night through Monday morning) to cut the grooves in the asphalt. This weekend would have the same penalties at the first two weekends (\$3,000 1st hour, \$3,000 2nd hour, \$4,000 3rd hour). The very first weekend we could schedule for Phase III would be November 7-10th. If we use the 3rd "penalty" weekend for Phase II, the Phase III weekend would be pushed back to November 14th -17th.

That is the best information I have available right now. Hope it helps everyone with planning.

One Chapter Member's Memorable First Trip to AirVenture in Oshkosh Submitted by David Tulis

On Saturday July 26, I flew my WWII-era vintage Ercoupe, a two-passenger 85hp airplane built in 1946, from Atlanta to Oshkosh, WI for the 50th Anniversary AirVenture airshow at Oshkosh. It's one of the biggest airshows in the country and pilots have been telling me it's just one of those things you have to do.

It took 3 fuel stops and two-days to get there, but included an overnight for burgers and beer with my brother-in-law in Madison, WI. The plane flies at about 110-115 mph so I spent about 10-hours each way in the air. My 'Coupe was restored in 2000-2001 while I took my private pilot lessons and learned the ways of the skies. I intended to use the Ercoupe for my lessons, but it really needed a lot of work to bring it up to snuff and fly safely in the busy Atlanta area.

It's an unusual airplane because it's the only plane built without rudder pedals, which normally help steer the plane. The Ercoupe does have rudders, in fact two of them, but they are simply interconnected to the control wheel so it steers in the air and on the ground like a car. The plane's designer was way ahead of his time and thought everybody would have an airplane in their garage (or farm, don't forget this was the late 1940's). Fred Weick, the designer, went on to design the very popular low-wing Piper Cherokee line of light planes, which you can see at most small airports.

Some of the airshow attendees ribbed me for not entering my plane in the judging events but I just didn't think it would pass muster. After all I flew about 1000 miles, some oil dripped here and there and I've spent more time flying than polishing and sprucing it up. I do have to admit it's a real nice airplane and the interior and instrument panel rivals more modern planes while still keeping the art-deco look of the 1940's.



I was finally convinced to enter the 'Coupe into the judging at the urging of a retired Delta pilot who I met while hanging out and watching the daily aerobatic airshow from the shade under my wing. Sure enough, some judges came by in their golf carts and began checking things off a list and snooping around a bit. I asked if I should clean things up but they chuckled and said I wasn't headed for that high of a category.

There were some really beautiful airplanes at Oshkosh. It brings out the best of the best, including a few Ercoupes similar to mine that were so clean you could use their fuselages as mirrors.

I didn't think any more about the airplane judging and elected to cut out of the week-long event mid-week due to incoming weather, because it was another two-day flight back to Atlanta.

When I got back home my cell phone rang on Sunday night and it was a fellow 'Couper at the awards ceremony. With applause in the background I could hear his excitement as he told me that I won the 2003 Most Outstanding Ercoupe Award! There were several dozen really nice examples of the Ercoupe up there so I didn't even believe it until I saw the plaque.

The trip was spectacular even before the award and I'm proud that I helped bring a little bit of aviation history back into the air.

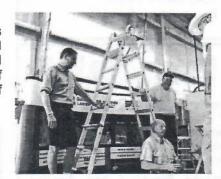

Banners Welcomed (Such As They Were Able) The National Air Tour to Chicago



The National Air Tour (www.nationalairtour.org) visited "The Coolest Little Airport on the Planet" Tuesday, September 9th, coming as close as it could to landing, but ultimately having to bypass Chicago. Members of the Executive Committee of the Friends of Meigs Field were on the ground at Meigs with banners welcoming the tour to Chicago. Tour pilots planned to drop flower petals over the lake adjacent to Meigs in solidarity with the Friends of Meigs Field's efforts to reopen the famous airport, but were "dissuaded" by representatives of the FAA at the last moment. Sentiment for Meigs was high among the pilots of the historic craft.

It's OK," said Ed Hoit, flight planner for the group. "The symbolism is what counts; we want to see that airport reopened so we can share these types of historic aircraft with Chicago in the future." The Friends of Meigs Field are working on win-win proposals to re-open the airport and also benefit local Chicago parks. 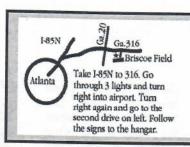

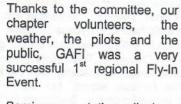
