

Note from Sue Adams: "When I received this aviation biography from Barney there was just no way I could edit any of it. He has a great story to tell to all of us about that burning desire to fly no matter where you are, how old you are, or who you are".

My first serious interest in flying came as a result of listening to the short-wave radio conversations between Dick Rutan, Jeanna and Burt Rutan on my Ham Radio station during the flight of Burt Rutan's Voyager round the world flight in 1986(?) and I talked to Frank Wilcox about it. I inadvertently stumbled across their operating frequencies while hamming around.

I started listening to the Voyager when they were just off the coast of Brazil after crossing the South Atlantic and then followed them for the next three days work permitting as they flew over Aruba and up through Central America and into China Lake.

I had known Frank Wilcox since March 1953 when I started to work in the Electrical Group of the Quality Assurance Laboratory at the Columbus Ohio facility of North American Aviation (later known as Rockwell International). We built F86 SaberJets, F100 Super Sabers, FJ-2s, 3s and 4s which were the Navy versions of the F86. We also built T2 Buckeye Navy trainer aircraft and many other planes. Frank was in the Hydraulics Group of my department but he left for other endeavors while I stuck around. After a few years Frank would show up sporadically for a short-term consultant's job and then disappear again.

Chuck Miller presented his Altitude Tracking Module (ATM) device during the program of the June chapter meeting. Using our new audio-visual equipment, he graphically illustrated the sensitivity of the module to altitude changes. These were produced on the spot with a bell jar, vacuum pump and monitored by a sensitive altimeter. Great job, Chuck.

A major addition to the technology resources in the chapter building is the installation of a computer system. Through our telephone line DUATS will be available to pilots. Our WEB page will be stored and available to the world. The system will also be used for production of copy and illustrations, for chapter literature and records. Thanks to the donors of this equipment and to Bill Curtis for producing a working system.

Do you wonder who our 150 members are - yes, we now have more than 150 members, - where they live and their phone numbers? A Visit to Van's by Dick Seiders

Last August I had an opportunity to visit Van's Aircraft while I was in Seattle. Actually we went to Seattle to have some fun with Bill Bailey and his wife Neva, but the likelihood of a visit to Van's was high on my list. I wanted to see what they were about as I was very interested in an RV6A kit as a project. As it turns out we (April and I) did get to drive down to North Plains, Oregon for a quick look. I want to tell you that these are really nice folks. Ken Scott met us in their office and I mentioned that we had sent notice about a visit earlier for a tour and possible flight in an RV. No problem. We were treated to a grand tour of the airplane factory, and got a full impression of the amount of business they are doing. They have a full inventory of kit parts, and quite a few Quickbuild Kits as well (my major interest). They are very busy, but not too busy to take care of interested visitors.

After our tour, Ken took us out to the grass strip where Van started it all. We (separately of course) went up in "Old Blue". That's the bilious blue RV6A you have seen in their ads. It was a great ride. Ken treated me to first a slow roll, then a very abbreviated one. I tried the controls for a few minutes and it was no surprise as the 6A handled as you would expect after reading Van's ads. Much to my surprise April (wife) went up next, but only on the promise that Ken would not bank the airplane. Needless to say he did no rolls with April, but he did explain that he would have to bank a little to turn back otherwise they would have to fly across the Pacific. She did enjoy the ride. Next Ken flew the RV8 with a young fellow (18 years) who was not ready to deal with the cost, but was making plans for his future RV. Ken also took a United pilot (Tom) up in the RV8 and upon their return Tom stated he was ordering the RV8. (It was the yellow bird many of us saw at Sun & Fun last year.)

Ken also told me he built his RV6A using a rebuilt 0-320, yellow tagged instruments, (strictly VFR) and painted it himself as well getting it into the air for under \$20,000. Quite an airplane for that cost.

As some of you know I chose the Quickbuild (in May of this year) as I figured I needed all the help I could get. Several RV builders have been extremely helpful thus far as well.

I heartily recommend a visit to Van's. It's only 26 miles west of Portland, and an easy ride. If any EAA folks are in the NW part of our great country it is something to see even if you are not planning on building a kit. These people are so nice it is worth it for that reason alone. Also Mt. Hood in Portland is not pocket change either. Anyone who looks at it and is not moved is rare indeed. If you are in the Seattle area, a wonderful city, (be certain to visit Pike Place Market on the waterfront) it's only a few hours to Portland, and on the way you can hang a left and visit Mt. St. Helen's on the way. Another awesome sight.

All in all, a great place to visit, and a great part of our country. I enjoyed it so much I went back to pick up my kit, and drive it home.

Chuck Miller Demonstrates ATM at June Meeting

Another Chapter 690 member stepped forth to provide an interesting and educational program for the June chapter meeting. Chuck Miller who has developed and now markets an Altitude Tracking Module (ATM) demonstrated this new instrument using a video camera and our new TV.

This instrument is designed to alert the pilot to altitude drifts that can easily occur unnoticed if he or she is distracted by radios, engine instruments, passengers, weather, etc. Placed within the pilot's field of vision a light will blink when there is an altitude change. The instrument can be set for a 100 or 200 ft mode. Once the reference altitude (pressure) is locked in, it will watch for a change in pressure that indicates that the altitude has changed. When the limits are reached the HI or LOW Led begins to blink. There is an "early warning" when you have drifted half (50 to 100 ft) of the limit from the set altitude. The instrument is designed for non-pressurized aircraft, but is accurate to 30,000 ft.

Chuck felt the need for such an instrument when he was on a trip to Florida and discovered that a precipitous altitude change had gone unnoticed. So he went back home and developed the instrument using his knowledge of manifold pressure gained from working on engines and his experience in electronics. Powered by a 9 volt alkaline battery, the pocket sized instrument can be used in any aircraft. Best of all it does not require a Form 337 since it is not a part of an installed aircraft system. Minutes of last meeting accepted as published in the chapter newsletter.

Treasurer's report: More donations needed for interior work on chapter meeting place. President Frank Wilcox noted that efforts are still underway to get a building permit from Gwinnett County.

In 1982, the company transferred me to the Missile Systems Div (Rockwell International) plant on Satellite Blvd in Duluth and I became a Damyankee. I was involved in the transfer of technology from the Columbus plant to Duluth, Dog gone if Frank didn't show up there one day. Through all that time working for an aircraft company I was still only casually only interested in flying and considered it beyond my capabilities and finances. I would visit Stone Mountain Airport on Sunday afternoons to watch those crazy pilots, but really didn't get hooked until I started talking to Frank about the Voyager radio conversations and then Frank took me for a ride in his Cessna and invited me to the EAA690 meetings at St. Mt. Airport which really set the hook.

Before I could do much to get started in flying lessons, I was stricken with diabetes but ended up as being diet control and no medication required. I enrolled in the ground school taught by Garey Burns at the Gwinnett High School evening classes. I attended most of those classes on crutches as a result of infection of the foot from the diabetes. I finally got off the crutches and passed the written test and then the medical certificate. Of course the diabetes caused a hiccup in the medical certification but a little additional documentation finally overcame that obstacle. I then signed up with a Stone Mountain instructor who moved away after just a few weeks. I was turned over to another instructor but after a while I bogged down in my flying abilities and work at the Missile factory became very demanding, so I quit flying lessons for a while.

After a few months, work eased up and I met a co-worker who had his own plane at LZU and was a CFI and so I started over again. He got me through my first solo but after I retired in 1991, the CFI had to sell his plane so I was without an instructor. I contacted my original ground school instructor Garey Burns who finally got me through my check ride in November 1994.

Also, I am a member of the Stone Mountain Aircraft Restoration Team, Inc. (SMARTI), a group of EAAers who are rebuilding a 1947 Cessna 140 airplane. It started out with ten members but it now basically just Frank and myself. We generally work on the plane at Frank's hangar at Lenora but can change days if we can get some more help. We are getting ready to paint and reassemble the wheel brakes and put the plane on its feet. My major activity in EAA690 is as the chapter Video Librarian. I did turn it over to someone else for a while but had to take it over again when that person disappeared. I really have neglected this job and need to get back at it. It seems that I can never find any time to do that job since I retired.


