## January Program: "Large Aircraft Security Program - A Dilemma in the Making"

Our guest speaker this Friday evening, January 8th, needs no introduction to the Atlanta aviation scene. Alan Armstrong has presented educational and informational programs at both our EAA 690 1st Saturday breakfast meetings and our regular Chapter meetings over the years. Yet this presentation may raise a larger red flag than the "Red Rising Sun" on the sides of his Nakajima "Kate" torpedo bomber.

Early last year a far reaching piece of legislation began to circulate in Washington and beyond,

known as the "Large Aircraft Security Program" or LASP. This program and its subsequent re-write(s) would impose "a host of security burdens on operators of aircraft weighing in excess of 12,500 pounds." Two months later the TSA said, in a then classified report, that there was little evidence to suggest terrorists were turning their attention to General Aviation. In addition, Security Directives employed by the TSA (to bypass due process rule making requirements imposed by the Administrative Procedure Act), under the auspices of "national security" interests would allow: TSA employees to appear at airports and subject pilots, their cars, their persons, their planes and their hangars to random searches; and Relax Fourth Amendment protections and uphold warrantless (administrative) searches at airports in



the interest of security. All this, after the Office of Inspector General for the Department of Homeland Security in a report of May 27, 2009, found the threats TSA purports to combat with its initiatives are largely "hypothetical." 1

In his presentation, Alan will review the LASP proposal as it currently stands and where it is heading in Congress. Of most importance, Alan will help us understand what we as an organization and as individuals can do to help minimize this attack to our freedom of flight.

This is sure to be an informative and thought provoking presentation that you will not want to miss, especially in light of events of this Christmas Holiday.

The monthly meeting and program will be held in the EAA Sport Aviation Building at Gwinnett County Airport, and is open to all. Come join us for an educational, informative program beginning at 8:00 P.M., with people gathering for some "hangar flying" around 7:30 P.M. #### March 31st Deadline for Plastic Pilot Certificate

Paper pilot certificates will no longer be valid after March 31st, so be sure to upgrade to an updated, tamperproof plastic version. The FAA mandated the change because it says the plastic certificates are more counterfeit resistant. Pilots can request the plastic certificate through the FAA's Web-site or by mail. The cost is \$2, but if you change your pilot certificate number from your Social Security number (recommended for personal identity security) the switch is free.



Temporary, student, and flight instructor certificates are not affected by the rule.

# Amended Airworthiness Certificates and Important Deadline

Mike Huffman, EAA 690 member and owner of Sport Aviation Specialties in Lawrenceville, has announced the availability of two new FAA Designated Airworthiness Representative (DAR) services.

One of Mike's new DAR services is to issue amended airworthiness certificates and operating limitations for experimental light sport aircraft (ELSA) whose airworthiness certificates will otherwise expire in early 2010. During your original ELSA airworthiness certification, if you chose to have the privilege of doing flight training for compensation or hire, your airworthiness certificate will show an expiration date of January 31, 2010.

WHETHER OR NOT YOU WANT TO DO ELSA FLIGHT TRAINING FOR HIRE AFTER THE DEADLINE, YOU MUST OBTAIN A NEW AIRWORTHINESS CERTIFICATE AND OPERATING LIMITATIONS. IF YOU WAIT UNTIL AFTER THE DEADLINE, YOUR AIRCRAFT WILL BE ILLEGAL TO FLY AND WILL NOT BE ABLE TO BE RE-CERTIFICATED!

If you do NOT want to continue flight training for hire, all you will need is a new airworthiness certificate and a new set of operating limitations that removes the flight-training-for-hire privilege. In that case, Mike can issue the new paperwork without a physical inspection of your aircraft.

If you do want to continue flight training for hire, in addition to a new airworthiness certificate and operating limitations, you are required to apply for a Letter Of Deviation Authority (LODA) with your local FSDO. Note that DARs are not allowed to issue LODAs, so it is probably best to work through the FSDO in those cases.

Mike's other new DAR function allows him to perform conformity inspections of prototype aircraft, engines, propellers, and parts during FAA design approvals such as type certification and supplemental type certification programs.

Mike continues to provide his original DAR services, which include issueing airworthiness certificates for experimental amateur-built (EAB) aircraft, experimental light-sport aircraft (ELSA), and special light-sport aircraft (SLSA). He reiterates his offer to perform such services for EAA 690 chapter members at half price, with the proceeds being donated to the chapter treasury."



### FLYING THE NORTH AMERICAN B-25

Many of you will remember the story of the B-25 recovered from a field in a Cincinnati airport and eventually restored at Air Acres airfield in Cherokee County. Some of the work was done by David Posey and other EAA members. It was flown to Gwinnett

Airport where more restoration was completed in the A.I.M. hangar. After final work and new paint it returned to the A.I.M. hangar on November 15. Many 690 members were present to see it fully restored as a WWII bomber. As I walked around it, memories returned of my months of final flight training for the Air Force in B-25's.



That made take-offs on instruments difficult enough, but they had the old World War II directional gyro that swings in the horizontal plane like the free compass in your own airplane. It took a while to lose the urge to use the brake on the side to stop the gyro from turning since the airplane was turning the other way. Once I mastered the take-off, instrument training was a confidence builder.

I remembered the sound of those

1600 horsepower Curtis-Wright engines. In the cockpit the engines were so loud you could only communicate with your instructor on the interphone. My first take-off after months of flying in small single engine trainers was both exciting and frightening. The airplane is so pilot- friendly that after only six flights

of air work, take-offs and landings we began instrument training. Did we use a hood? Not a chance, as the urge to peek is well known to all students and instructors. The Air Force had orange-colored isinglass panels that were placed in each window and windshield and the students wore goggles with blue lenses.



The instructor could see outside fine but we students could only see the instruments. Then the B-25 became a handful to fly. Some of my classmates met

Instrument approaches in those days were limited to ground controlled approaches (GCA) and ADF using an old crank-frequency receiver. The rest of the time in training included several cross-country flights, along with more instrument practice. One was a three day which was a treat after flying only from Lubbock,

the end of their training in the instrument phase. Flying

by instruments was harder than in small trainers but

Texas. After 10 or 11 flights we were soloed with another student. One would fly about an hour and a half, land and change seats so the other guy could fly the same amount.

The final challenge was to pass an instrument flight test with another instructor. After this I only had to fly a few more solo flights to complete the minimum requirement of 65 hours in the TB-25 to graduate and

receive my Air Force pilot wings, which I wear proudly to this day. The B-25 was fun to fly, a true combat airplane and certainly a favorite of all I've flown.



To the Editor:

EAA was disappointed to again see USA Today's failure to present the total picture when it comes to airport funding, in regards to Thomas Frank's November 2 articles.

The stories failed to acknowledge that each airport, whether or not it has airline service, is an important link within the nation's transportation infrastructure. The continuing inference that the only airports that are worthy of support are those with commercial service is similar to saying the only roads worth maintaining are those used by passenger buses.

Airlines are vital and serve dozens of communities, but general aviation serves hundreds more – places where air carriers cannot or will not make passenger service viable. Support for local airports makes economic development a greater possibility for those communities, and also serves as a necessary network of facilities that takes pressure off major metropolitan commercial airports.

According to FAA's own figures, airports with airline services already receive the vast majority of funding – seven times the amount that each general aviation airport receives on a yearly basis. Aviation fuel taxes paid by general aviation users have also annually exceeded the grants distributed for all airport improvements.

GA users also pay five times more fuel taxes as the airlines to support the air traffic control system – of which the airlines are the overwhelming primary user.

We know the reporters and editors at USA Today have been supplied with this information. Why it has not been included to present the full picture is a disservice to the newspaper's readers.

I am looking for a good home for the material which is in Savannah. The price will be well worth the effort even if someone wants to pick it up. There is also a trailer that could haul it in Savannah.



## Ford Narrates Documentary about Sully, Flight 1549

December 10, 2009 — Former EAA Young Eagles Chairman, actor Harrison Ford, provided the narration for a new documentary that features one of the new cochairmen who succeeded him. "Brace for Impact," scheduled to premiere on January 10 on The Learning Channel (TLC), examines the landing of US Airways Flight 1549 in New York's Hudson River in which Capt. Chesley B. "Sully" Sullenberger, III, safely ditched the Airbus A320 airliner on the river after a bird strike caused the plane to lose power in both engines on January 15, 2009.

The one-hour program features interviews with Sullenberger, passengers, air traffic controllers, and first responders who assisted in the extraordinary landing in which no fatalities occurred.

"I'm honored and gratified by the attention I've received as a result of this event. On January 15, we had a remarkably good day, and I'm proud that my crew and I were up to the task," Sullenberger said in a statement. "I am sure that this documentary will convey the ongoing power of this story and its ability to touch and inspire people around the world."

## **EAA, Members Critical of FAA's New TTF Policy**

December 22, 2009 — The general aviation community has responded strongly to the proposed FAA policy on residential through the fence (TTF) agreements at public-use airports. EAA has been collecting comments from members and has compiled them in a letter to the FAA asking the agency to abandon its proposed one-size-fits-all policy.

"The prior FAA policy, which allowed adjacent residential property through-the-fence agreements on a case-by-case basis based on the economic and operational needs of the public airport, and when safety, security, and equitable compensation issues were addressed, must be continued," EAA wrote in\_a December 21 letter to Charles Erhard, FAA's manager of airport compliance and field operations. EAA wrote that the new policy tries to address a few isolated instances by imposing an inflexible set of rules to cover all situations. EAA also asserts that the FAA's stated goal of making airports economically self-sufficient would be hampered by the new policy since TTF agreements serve as funding sources for many general aviation airports.

EAA members have been unequivocal in their displeasure of the policy in comments submitted to a thread on Oshkosh365.

I live and operate through the fence and I feel that my operations are an asset to the airports safety, security, and promote the city's fine airport. My property is located immediately adjacent to the airport taxiway, and the hangar (is) located on my property which has been used to house transient aircraft in need of shelter from storms, etc.

All pilots have the opportunity to be great ambassadors of aviation and we all have an obligation to help with safety, security, and airport promotion to the general public at every opportunity. Please do not restrict us from our ability to help. - John Glynn, Bloyer Field, Tomah, Wisconsin

In hoping to draw on the positive past working relationship it's had with the FAA in resolving this contentious issue, EAA wrote, "We are confident that working together, we can find a way to allow for residential through-the-fence operations while addressing the need to protect the future vitality of general aviation airports." EAA also looks forward to working closely with the Airports Division at the upcoming annual EAA/FAA Winter Summit meeting "to address the concerns of the aviation community."




